Real Estate Moving.

Election of Officers for the ensuing year—The Last Day.

THURSDAY P. M. SESSION.
Session opened with devotional exercises conducted by Mrs. Rounds of McMinnville.

After a short Scripture reading by Mrs. Riggs, followed by the reading of the minutes, a communication from President Van Scoy of the Willamette university was read, inviting the delegates assembled to visit the university at 11:30 a. m. Friday. Accepted with thanks.

A note from pastor of Congregational church informed the convention that on account of the desire of its members to hear Mrs. Kinney speak, no prayer meeting would be held at his church on Thursday evening.

Mrs. Wallace, superintendent of department conference with influential bodies, read a report outlining her work during the past year.

On motion of Miss Irvine, the rules were suspended to hear report of auditing committee.

Mrs. A. R. Thomas of Hood river, superintendent of juvenile work, read a very comprehensive report showing great activity in the departments throughout the state.

Ten minutes were then devoted to discussion of juvenile work.

On motion, the rules were suspended to hear report from committee on plan of work, read by Mrs. Narcissa Kinney.

On motion the report was taken up and adopted item by item.

State superintendent of press work, Mrs. L. A. Nash, read an exhaustive report, showing effectual work and indicating a more favorable consideration of our efforts on the part of the press throughout the state.

Mrs. Keasy gave the report of the financial committee.

The convention heard the report of Mrs. Mattie Townsend, superintendent of Refuge home, showing the crying need of such an institution and the great good accomplished already. \$203 has been contributed to this work by the local Unions.

The report of Mrs. Nora Williams, superintendent of work in Sabbath schools, was read by Mrs. Robb.

The report of Mrs. Driggs, superintendent of literature, showed that over 150,000 pages of tract or literature had been distributed by the Unions throughout the state.

After a lengthy discussion as to how the contemplated change from district to county organization would affect the district officers now in authority, the convention adjourned until 7:30 p. m.

EVENING SESSION.
Exercises were opened by prayer and Scripture reading, conducted by Mrs. Edwards.

Mrs. Narcissa Kinney then entertained the audience with a most interesting lecture, replete with temperance truths in new and attractive garb. She reviewed the field and showed that in the light of past events temperance and prohibition workers had every reason to congratulate themselves upon the results of their arduous labors.

Mrs. Robb read the report of Dr. Adair, superintendent of Heredity and Hygiene. Good work has been done in many places.

Mrs. Addison, superintendent of temperance and labor, sent a report showing how this department, if well worked, would do much toward settling the labor question of to-day.

After some important business the convention adjourned until afternoon session.

(Correspondence of the Capital Journal.)
It has occurred to me that it might also be a good plan to have the citizens use their influence with the council for the closing of High and Liberty streets, between Court and State. This would give us a complete separation of Salem North and Salem South from the railroad track clear to Commercial street.

But why not incorporate Commercial and Front in the street closing mania and have the dividing line extend to the river? This would be just right. Then the drivers of fast horses could speed down Court as far as the river bank, without fear of being run into by slow, easy going family carriages or lumber wagons which have no business crossing the race course and getting in the way of the charging couriers. Automatic gates could be arranged for the street cars, by which a big flag would be unfurled at the junction of Commercial and Court two minutes before a car would be along. This would give the racers time in which to prepare for the collision. Another advantage would be in the convenience of making two cities out of one. A man on the south side of the park who has a package to deliver just across the street, on the north side, will only be compelled to drive along the park for its full length on one side and return on the other. Oh, its a grand scheme and one which the citizens of Salem will do well in defeating.
