Did He Ever Reach Salem.

On January 7th J. W. Hunter left Seattle with \$2000 in his pocket for Salem, Oregon, where he intended to purchase live stock. He was last seen at the International hotel, San Francisco, where he had purchased a ticket for some point in Indiana. Since then all trace of him has been lost. His wife, in Seattle, thinks he has met with foul play, and she knows of no possible reason for his absence. Private detectives have failed to get any trace of Hunter. His description is as follows:

Height five feet eleven inches, weight about two hundred pounds; light complexion; light bluish gray eyes; sandy mustache, thinner on one side than the other; wears No. 8 boots; large hole on left cheek near the temple; born in Kentucky; short beard on chin when he left home; wears K. of P. scarf pin; has worked as a logger and teaming; has worked in mines. His mother lives in Oskosh, Wis.; has a brother there named William Hunter.

A Jackson Retic.

A great curiosity was left at the JOURNAL office this morning. It is a burlesque copper medal, about the size of an old copper cent, which was coined not earlier than 1842. On one side appear the words, "The Constitution as I understand it," together with a likeness of the animal which is neither a mule nor a horse. Above this are the words "Roman Firmness" and below it "Veto." On the reverse side General Jackson appears as standing in a bank, sword in one hand and a bag of coin in the other, saying "I take the responsibility." But few of these coins were issued, in burlesque of general Jackson's veto removing the bank deposits.

Mr. J. Macey has purchased the livery and feed stable owned by German & Wagner for the sum of \$1750. Mr. Macey takes possession June 1st and will carry on a first-class stable.

THE W. C. T. U. CONVENTION.

Proceedings of the Last Day—New Orleans, La., Etc.

FRIDAY P. M. SESSION.

After a little delay, occasioned by meeting of executive committee and also of Y. W. C. T. U., called together by state president, Mrs. Emma C. Warren, of Astoria, the convention listened to report of Mrs. Belle W. Cooke, state superintendent of lecture bureau, which showed efficient work done in the state the past year through the instrumentality of the bureau in getting good speakers in the lecture field. Mrs. Henrietta Moore was spoken of very highly as a platform worker.

Mrs. Mary S. Kinney read the report of committee on resolutions, which was adopted item by item. The most prominent features of the resolutions were clauses advocating that the W. C. T. U. make a specialty of the anti-treat pledge work, also that of social points or white cross department, and one expressing an entire faith that the only solution of the temperance question, is the education of the masses up to the point where total prohibition throughout the nation could be adopted and enforced.

A rising vote of thanks was extended to the ladies of Salem for their bountiful and delicious lunches served daily in the onsement of the church for the enjoyment of the delegates, also to Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Wallace for their kind invitation to their hospitable home.

It was moved and adopted that the convention ask Superintendent Downing of the penitentiary to prohibit the use of tobacco among his convicts, for the reason that it injures them morally, mentally and physically.

After transacting some miscellaneous business the convention adjourned to attend the reception tendered them at the elegant home of Mr. and Mrs. Wallace, where a delicious lunch was served, and the members enjoyed themselves in social converse until the evening session.

EVENING SESSION.

This session was devoted to the Young Woman's Christian Temperance Union.

The exercises closed by singing the hymn, "I need Thee every hour," led by Prof. Parvin, Miss Lulu Smith at the organ.

Mrs. Henrietta Brown of Albany read the scripture lesson, followed by prayer opened by Mrs. Newell of Salem. Prof. Parvin then sang in a feeling manner, "Save the girls," which was well received by the audience.

Miss Emma C. Warren, state president of the Y. W. C. T. U., then read her report, which showed a very prosperous condition of the work, there being 447 members in the state. Large sums of money have been raised for benevolent purposes. Many socials and entertainments had given us a means of interesting young people and keeping them amused and away from promiscuous influences elsewhere. Much good work had been done by the flower mission department. Many thousands of bouquets and a vast quantity of fruits with scriptural texts attached had been distributed in hospitals and jails throughout the state. Considerable attention had been given to alleviating the sufferings of invalids, to supplying their wants and cheering these afflicted ones throughout the state. With earnest exhortations to further endeavors, Miss Warren closed her very interesting report.

Mrs. Mary Strong Kinney of Astoria rendered a solo with violin and organ accompaniment.

The juvenile band of hope then sang "My Creed is Water Bright." Miss Grace Bork of this society recited a piece which was received with applause.

Little Miss Randle then spoke, in excellent style, a piece wondering who was doing the devil's work, since that individual had been "voted by common consent not to be."

Little Miss Fisk then sang "Charity," in a beautifully clear and touching voice.

Miss Alderson sang "The Spider and the Fly" in a manner indicating superior native talent and careful training.

After these exercises by the juveniles, Miss May Warren of the Corvallis Y's recited, "What Shall Woman's Record Be?"

Miss Dorris of the Eugene Y's sang, "Jesus Lover of my Soul." Her beautiful voice of wide range and expression for one so young, completely riveted the audience.

An essay written by Miss Lena Holt of Eugene was read by Miss Hattie Bushnell of the Eugene Y's. Mr. Epley sang in English, "The Mother's Sacrifice." The selection was then taken, followed by a quartet, "Moonlight Will Come Again."

The audience was dismissed with benediction, by Rev. N. Doane.

The superintendents for the three districts in Oregon are, for the first district, Mrs. L. M. Kern; second district, Mrs. E. E. Irvine; and for the third district, Mrs. Mary V. Marks.

The next annual convention will be held in Portland, during the month of May 1900.

A Bank Change.

An important change in bank matters has recently taken place which will have a very beneficial influence on Salem. The late William Stuart of Scotland, who died about a year ago, was the founder of the First National bank of this city and the owner of \$25,000 of the stock of the bank. He was also owner of the very handsome building in which the bank is now located. Negotiations have been lately pending between the directors and local shareholders of the bank and the heirs of Mr. Stuart, which have been culminated in the purchase of the building by the bank and the shares by the present officers and shareholders. A good portion of the \$50 shares purchased have already been replaced and the directors of the bank have wisely decided not to sell shares to any non-residents, but to confine the stock entirely to Salem and its vicinity, thus making the bank exclusively a local institution.

Mr. Holden's Narrative.

Salem people are generally acquainted with Horace Holden, who lives a few miles north on the river road. But there are few who know his history. His life is one of deep interest, he having been shipwrecked in the seas and cast among savage races where he lived for years, the slave of barbarous Indian masters. No Celebration Here.

Last night members of the different Fourth of July celebration committees met at the council chamber to make final disposition of the matter of having a celebration here. In so much as Albany had taken steps first, raised large sums to defray the expenses of a big celebration and secured the military companies, it was the general decision that no celebration should be attempted this year. Albany assured us that if we would hold over this year and assist them, that next year the compliment would be duly returned. So note it be.

The Tiger engine company are now ready to answer fire alarms. They have their harness arranged automatically so that an alarm can be responded to in the shortest time conceivable. Citizens have arranged a circuit between the alarm bell and their engine house, by which a bell will ring at their engine simultaneously with the first general alarm.

More Catfish.

A Swartz of Swartz's mill, on the Silverton road, is in the city to-day making arrangements to send to Washington for another invoice of catfish for the week. The first 250 which he put in last week are doing nicely and he thinks it will be an easy matter to make good fishing grounds in the vicinity of the mill.

Poyser Held Over.

The preliminary examination of Wm. B. Poyser on the charge of larceny by bail was concluded this afternoon before Justice Goodell. Poyser was held over in bonds in sum of \$150 to await the action of the grand jury.

Articles of Incorporation.

Articles incorporating the Douglas county fair association of Roseburg were to-day filed with secretary of state. C. Miller, G. A. Taylor, D. S. Dulck, J. F. Hamilton and C. D. Donden are the incorporators in sum of \$6000.

Drunk and Disorderly.

Mike Kelley appeared before Recorder Conn this morning, having been arrested last night for being drunk and disorderly. He deposited the usual fine, and went on his way rejoicing.
