Gold Found Near Salem.

News of what promises to be rich gold discoveries comes from the Capital City fruit farm, three miles east of Salem. Mr. Willis, who owns and lives on tract forty-one, has been prospecting considerably of late, and a few days ago his labors were rewarded by the finding of a good ledge of quartz. He brought specimens to this city and those who saw it said it will pay well. An old California miner looked the claim over and said the prospects were excellent. He offered to buy a small strip of it, near the creek where the old saw mill used to stand, and offered \$700 cash for less than half an acre. He is sure gold is in those hills in paying quantities. Mr. Willis continues prospecting and is finding many good indications of rich gold-bearing quartz.

Glanders and Gleet.

Horsemen and others are alarmed over the appearance of a few cases of glanders and gleet among the horses of Oregon. Marion county has one isolated case of glanders. Al. Herren, county stock inspector, has the animal carefully quarantined and under treatment. When the first symptoms were exhibited the horse was removed to isolated quarters in South Salem and measures of quarantine enforced. The state veterinarian, who is at present in Umatilla county, has been sent for and will arrive to-morrow, when he will make a thorough examination. These are diseases which the state should use all efforts to stamp out, and the first symptoms should be followed by quarantine.

Bannon Heard From.

Yesterday Mrs. Bannon, wife of the wagonmaker who so mysteriously disappeared from Salem a few weeks ago, received word from him. He is sick in a hospital at Los Angeles and his attendant writes that he is recovering nicely. Mr. Bannon asks his wife to remain in Salem until he returns or sends her word to join him elsewhere. The letter says the mysterious conduct will all be explained soon, in fact in an early letter. In the mean time Mrs. Bannon is about well again and is anxious to learn how her husband should happen to be sick in Los Angeles.

A New Enterprise.

One of the enterprises of no little importance to be established in Salem at an early day is a cigar factory, together with a cigar box factory. Of the former Salem has one, while of the latter there is none on the coast and there are no less than 150 cigar manufacturers to be supplied with boxes. For this reason the business if properly managed cannot fail to be a success from the start. The JOURNAL was in conversation with the projector of the enterprise this morning, but is not at liberty to speak further on the subject at present.

Pretty Galatea Tonight.
