The Slightest Places in the World.
Prof. Whitney says that from the summit of Mount Hamilton in California more of the earth's surface can be seen than from any other spot on the globe, though it is only about 4,500 feet high. The view extends around it in every direction, and the snow-capped range of the lofty Sierras can be plainly seen 200 miles away against the northern sky. To the south, nearly as far away, the San Bernadillo range limits the view, and between the two lie room for all the eastern states, with their rivers, lakes, mountains and sea coasts.

KILLED BY THE CARS.
A Man Falls Under the Wheels at Drain and is Killed.
[Special to the Capital Journal.]
DRAIN, Or., May 29, 1889.—After the freight train had passed through, and about ten o'clock last night the body of a well-dressed man was found dead and badly mangled on the railroad track a half mile from town. He appeared to be about thirty years old and had a letter on his person indicating that his name was Geo. Reckest and that he was from Sandusky, Ohio. It is supposed he fell off the freight train last night here at nine o'clock. Several cars must have passed over him as he was badly mangled and bruised.

Inquest of Bishop.
NEW YORK May 28.—In Bishop, the mind reader's inquest this morning Deputy Coroner Jenkins testified to having examined the body of Bishop, and reopening incisions previously made. He found the body well preserved. He found many vital organs, including the brain, which all seemed to be healthy and in appearance presented no cause for death. Portions of the brain and other organs were missing.

OTTOWA, May 28.—Reports received here state that the Mormon influx into the northwest counties, though mounted police are in the vicinity of Teas Creek. No proof has been obtained that the new arrivals, who form considerable of a colony, are given to the practice of polygamy.
