LATEST BY TELEGRAPH To inoculate Against Yellow Fever. PINE BLUFFS, Ark., May 30.—Dr. Nelson, member of the college of physicians and surgeons of the Province of Quebec, and late member of the state board of health of Panama, read a paper at the fourteenth annual meeting of the state medical society of Arkansas. The subject was Yellow Fever, and the result of his experiences extending over many years in Panama, Colon, Mexico, Cuba and Tampa, which led to his bold forecast of the Jacksonville epidemic, was brought out. Dr. Nelson, being personally familiar with the work of these gentlemen, boldly forecasts the day when inoculations against yellow fever will take equal rank with inoculations against smallpox. Senators Defeated by the Babies. WASHINGTON, May 30.—The morning game between Washington and Cleveland was not exciting. Cleveland won the game in the opening inning, scoring two earned runs. Score—Cleveland 2, in the first inning; Washington, 1 in the first inning. Base hits—Cleveland 5; Washington 7. Errors—Cleveland 1; Washington 2. Batteries—Cleveland, Gruber, Bemmer; Washington, Oslay and Clark, Umpire, Fessenden. The afternoon game was postponed on account of rain.

Seattle to Canada. SEATTLE, May 30.—At a meeting of stockholders of the Seattle & Eastern construction company, the capital stock was raised from \$1,000,000 to \$3,000,000. Four-fifths of the stock was represented, and the action was taken by a unanimous vote. This increase of capital stock means finally and without doubt the construction of a northern branch of the Seattle, Lake Shore & Eastern railroad from Seattle to a connection with the Canadian Pacific at Mission. A Mormon Excitement. TUSCULA, Ill., May 30.—A party of male and female Mormon missionaries is creating great excitement in this vicinity. They have broken up families, separated husbands and wives, and induced several young ladies to travel with them. One of the preachers was knocked down with a stone by Samuel Davis for having his two daughters locked up in church late at night, and Davis soundly thrashed another preacher on the street. Heavy Snows in Michigan. DETROIT, Mich., May 30.—A heavy fall of snow for this season of the year is reported from several parts of the state to-day. At Schoolcraft the snow is four inches deep and still falling, while at Portland Flint the average depth is two inches, but, owing to the heavy wind, it has drifted to a much greater depth. The damage to the crops is very great.
