LATEST BY TELEGRAPH

EIGHT THOUSAND DEAD.

The Wildest Estimates First Made are Far Surpassed by the Actual Facts. SANG HOLLOW, June 3.—The first accounts sent out of the Johnstown disaster are far above the wildest estimates placed upon the extent of calamity, and instead of 2000 or 3000, it is probable the list of the dead will reach 8000.

It is now known that two passenger trains, two sections of an express on the Pennsylvania railroad, have been thrown into the maddened torrent and the passengers drowned. The awful torrent came down the narrow defile between a distance of nine miles, and with a fall of 300 feet in that distance, sweeping away the villages of South Fork, Mineral Point, Woodville and Conemaugh, leaving but one building standing, a wooden mill, where but an hour before had stood hundreds, and dashing on with the roar of a cataract and the speed of the wind upon the fair city at the foot of the hills.

The plain, in which yesterday sat Johnstown, sits in the mountains like a jewel in a diadem. The great Gautier steel works sat in this place, and the city below it, the railroad tracks bounding it at the base of the mountain on the north. Here is where the trains were standing when the tide of water like a catapult came down upon them with such a rush and resistless force that the heavy trains, locomotives and all, were overturned and swept down the torrent and lodged against the stone viaduct, along with four locomotives from the Johnstown round house, the heavy machinery and the ponderous frame work of the Gautier mill, the accumulated debris of more than a thousand houses, furniture, bridges, lumber, drift and human beings.

The low arches of the stone viaduct were choked up immediately, and the water backed back over the what from the water marks indicate, about thirty-eight feet. In the great sea thus formed, thousands of people were struggling for life.

Pulverized Coal as Fuel.

PITTSBURG, Pa., June 2.—The interest felt here in the cheap fuel question is intensified by the experiments now going on by which pulverized coal is brought into actual competition by a new process. It has been running for a week with remarkable results. It is claimed that 4,600 pounds of iron were drawn in an hour with a charge of 700 pounds of coal, which is alleged to be the cheapest run ever made because the refuse coal which is used costs less than fifty cents per ton. A public test is to be made.

The Bells of Shannon.

OF St. Mary's bells the lovely old legion that their maker, an Italian, because of the sweetness of their tone, had a love approaching worship for them. Being in need of money he was obliged to sell them to a convent, which in a troubled time was sacked and its inmates and belongings scattered. In his old age the maker of the bells, broken in fortune, health, and only longing once more to hear the beloved bells for which he had long and fruitlessly sought, found himself on the broad bosom of Shannon in the vessel that had conveyed him from the south. It was evening; Limerick's tower rose before him in the sunset light, and the evening peace was on all things. Suddenly from St. Mary's belfry the evening chimes rang out, chimes that made his heart leap to hear—they were his long sought darling bells! Up the broad stream went the boat, the chime still playing with tender music, the old man lying back with folded hands and a look of unutterable happiness on his face—dead!
