Proposals for Wood.
SEALED PROPOSALS will be received at the office of the secretary of state until 12 m. of June 10th, 1889, for the delivery on the Capitol grounds on or before August 1st, 1890, of all or any part of 65 cords of oak and 60 cords of fir wood corded closely. Oak must be sound body timber cut from thrifty trees and not more than six months cut. Fir must be cut from large live trees. All wood must be four feet long, reasonably straight and not less than 2 1/2 inches in diameter. Separate bids will be received at the same time and place for cutting into three lengths the above wood and storing the same in the Capitol building; storage to be completed by September 15th, 1890. All bids will be opened at the above office at 2 p. m. June 10, 1889.

LATEST BY TELEGRAPH
A Woman's Wild Story.
SAN FRANCISCO, June 4.—The Chronicle to-morrow will print a statement that William B. Tascott, the murderer of Amos J. Snell, the Chicago banker, is now in Canton, China. The discovery of his present residence is said to have been secured from Mrs. Gantz, who arrived here from Chicago about two months ago, and who claims to be the deserted wife of Myron Gantz, formerly connected with a Chicago paper. She says she also lived with Tascott as a wife.

A Chronicle reporter represented himself as an advance agent, and made himself exceedingly agreeable to Mrs. Gantz, who finally grew friendly enough to say it was she who aided Tascott to escape from Chicago. She says Tascott was sequestered in her house two days, then two weeks in a house of her selection. She then assisted him to reach St. Paul, and about a month after the murder he went west by rail to Portland, Oregon, thence to British Columbia, and a few days later sailed on a Canadian Pacific steamer to China. Mrs. Gantz claims to have received a letter from him in China.

To Cremate the Dead Bodies.
JOHNSTOWN, Pa., June 4.—It is not believed now that the fire in the wreck at the bridge can be extinguished for a week. The hand of providence is in it. The suggestions made by the physicians yesterday that the bodies not buried be allowed to be cremated in the ruins for the sake of public health, which aroused a storm of indignation among the survivors, is viewed with more calmness to-day. There is a growing sentiment that it is after all the best solution of the problem. Weeks and months will be required to remove the stupendous mass by artificial means and in the meantime the putrefying remains of the hundreds burned there will be dealing death to all the surrounding country.

State Sunday Schools.
CORVALLIS, Or., June 4.—The State Sunday school convention met at 2 p. m., in the Congregational church, E. W. Allen of Portland president, in the chair.

There is a large and enthusiastic attendance, much larger than last year. The delegates are being entertained by the citizens of the city.

Searching for His Wife.
NEW YORK, June 4.—General Lew Wallace is very anxious concerning the safety of his wife. That lady left Indianapolis on Thursday and since that time he has not heard from her. He telegraphed to many points but without avail. This morning he learned that the train which bore his wife might have been caught somewhere in the flood.

Jack the Ripper Again.
LONDON, June 4.—A badly mutilated body of a woman was found in the Thames this morning. It is suspected that the work of "Jack the Ripper" is resumed.

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.
American Minister Swift arrived in Japan May 11.
A hog trust has been in existence in Chicago for more than two years.

The United States revenue cutter Rush sailed from San Francisco for the Behring sea.

The condition of the pope is reported as critical and his physician says he may die at any moment.

No evidence has yet been discovered that connects any secret society with the murder of Dr. Cronin at Chicago.

The American representatives seem to have had their way in the Samoan conference at Berlin, as Bismarck is reported as having yielded to many of their demands.

A Pittsburg doctor says he can diagnose ailments by examining a single hair of the patient. Two young men, as a joke, took him a hair from a bay horse. The doctor gravely wrote a prescription, and said his fee was \$25, as the case was precarious. They were staggered, but paid the fee, and after they got out laughed all the way to the apothecary's. The latter took the prescription and read in amazement: "One bushel of oats, four quarts of water, stir well, and give three times a day, and turn the animal out to grass!" Then the jokers stopped laughing.

The strawberry festival given by the Sunday school was a success in every particular. There was a large crowd present and they made several dollars by the deal. They have plenty of money now for their organ and will buy this week.

Ed. Keene met with a very serious accident Tuesday while out driving cattle. He was running after a cow and while the horse was in full speed, tripped and fell, hurling Ed. with terrible violence to the ground. He was picked up by his brother and carried home, where he remained insensible for several minutes. He does not remember when, how, or where he was thrown or the cause. After a surgeon arrived it was found he had broken one of the bones of the left arm, below the elbow, right thumb strained, right knee and left leg more or less bruised up.

Electrical Dentistry.
Boston people nowadays have their superfluous teeth drawn by electricity. The process is very simple, scarcely any apparatus being required beyond an ordinary two-cell battery with vibrator attachment.

This attachment is a thin strip of metal fastened at the ends, which is made to vibrate a thousand or more times a second by the electric current. At each vibration the circuit is cut off and renewed again, the effect being to give a perfectly steady flow of the mysterious fluid.

In order to make sure that the flow is quite satisfactory the operator tunes the machine, assisted by a little reed tuning-pipe, until the strip of metal sings "A" now, to the battery is attached three wires. Two of them have handles at the ends and the third is hitched to a forceps. The patient in the chair is given a handle to hold in each hand, and the current is turned on gradually until it becomes painful. Then he is told to grasp the handle as strong as possible, the electricity—having been switched off for a moment—is turned on again suddenly, and the dental surgeon applies his forceps simultaneously to the tooth.

The instant the molar is touched it as well as the parts surrounding become electrified and absolutely insensible to pain. When it is withdrawn from the socket the subject of the operation feels not the slightest disagreeable sensation. A jerk and the tooth is out, the patient drops the electric handles and the painless affair is over.

Unhealthy Tea Cigarettes.
A Detroit young lady entered a drug store on Woodward avenue and asked for tea cigarettes.

"Do you mean after-tea cigarettes?" asked the druggist.

"No; I mean cigarettes made of tea; all the girls are smoking them and they are just lovely."

"Then they make them for themselves," said the druggist. "They are not for sale anywhere."

A careful inquiry developed the fact that the tea smoking has become a craze and that the sallow colorless, complexions of some of our society belles is owing to a meeting at midnight, like the witches in "Macbeth," and brewing a deadly charm out of Bohemian English breakfast tea. "I can tell them," said the aforesaid druggist, "that they had much better smoke tobacco. Tea is a strong narcotic and contains a strong alkaloid known as theine, which is an active principle of caffeine. They will also inhale tannic acid with their smoke."

The girls buy rice paper and roll their cigarettes like any little man. They steep the leaves enough to unfold them, sprinkle them with perfume, and mix with rose leaves. They use the regular smoker's articles, less the tobacco, and ask each other for a light with all the mangroft of a man of the world.—Detroit Free Press.
