Proposals for Wood.

SEALED PROPOSALS will be received at the office of the secretary of state until 12 m. of June 10th, 1889, for the delivery on the capitol grounds on or before August 1st, 1889, of all or any part of 60 cords of oak and 40 cords of fir wood corded closely.

Oak must be sound body timber cut from 18" to 24" trees and not more than six months cut.

Fir must be cut from large live trees.

All wood must be four feet long, reasonably straight and not less than 2 1/2 inches in diameter.

Separate bids will be received at the same time and place for cutting into three lengths the above wood and storing the same in the capitol building; storage to be completed by September 15th, 1889.

All bids will be opened at the above office at 2 p. m. June 10, 1889.

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LATEST BY TELEGRAPH

Must Lick Hayti.

NEW YORK, June 5.—The steamer Caroline Miller arrived from St. Marc, Hayti, yesterday. The Miller left Cape Haytien for a voyage to St. Marc on May 15th. When she had steamed some distance out to sea a steamer was seen in the distance. It was the Haytian ironclad ram, Toussaint l'Ouverture. The ram was evidently trying to over-haul her. The Miller's engineer was ordered to put on more steam and the vessel's speed was increased perceptibly.

No sooner was this observed on the Toussaint than a shot came whistling over the water, falling a few yards short of its intended victim. Another and another followed, while the Toussaint increased her speed. Shots now began to fly thick and fast around the Miller. Captain Miller ordered the American flag raised and the stars and stripes were unfurled at the Miller's peak. Still the firing continued. The Toussaint finally gave up the chase. The firing continued for two hours.

Albany Points.

ALBANY, June 6.—Arrangements have been made to run a Sunday excursion of five or more first-class coaches to the Yaguina Bay, leaving Albany Sunday, June 16th, at 6:30 a. m. and returning will leave the Yaguina Bay at 6 p. m. and arriving at Albany at 9 p. m. giving nine hours' stay at the seaside.

The Brownsville woolen manufacturing company advertise for bids for the work of constructing their new brick factory buildings in this city. The contracts will be let on June 14th.

The bids for the construction of the Masonic temple in this city were opened yesterday, and all rejected, from which is presumed the board considered the bids too high. Advertisements will now be republished.

The June term of county court convened yesterday, and begun the consideration of several proposed bridges. They have under consideration the plan of joining Marion county in the construction of the bridge at Stayton.

Sunday Mails.

WASHINGTON, June 5.—Postmaster General Wanamaker has sent a circular letter to the postoffices of 100 of the largest cities throughout the country with a view to ascertaining the relative importance of mails on Sunday as compared with the same on any other days of the week, in order to reduce the work on that day if it shall be found practicable. The information asked for covers the sale of stamps and wrappers, the number of callers, mails dispatched and received, number of letters, carrier collections, with the amount of matter collected and the number of employees on duty each Sunday compared with the week days during the same time.

Sound and Harbor.

OLYMPIA, June 5.—It is reported that the money has been procured for the building of the Puget Sound & Gray's Harbor railroad, and that work will begin within thirty days and will be continued without intermission until the line is completed. If Olympia offers sufficient inducements, the road will be built to this city in connection with the Montesano line.

A Corpse Comes to Life.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., June 5.—Sunday last, John Stevenson, a miner, was found cold and stiff in bed, and everyone supposing him dead, preparations were made to bury him. The body was placed in a rough coffin and a man hired to drive it to the cemetery. On the way there Stevenson pushed up the lid of the coffin and got out. He was cared for and is now all right again.

The Largest Pension Payment.

WASHINGTON, June 5.—A certificate for a pension has been granted to Philip Flood, formerly a private in Company E, Forty-second Ohio Volunteer Infantry. The amount of arrears allowed in his case is \$12,289, his disability dating back to November 14, 1862. This is the largest first payment on record in the pension office.

Latest from Johnston.

JOHNSTOWN, June 6.—The best estimate on the loss of life, based on the registry of the living and official poll, is from 12,000 to 15,000.

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.

A carload of apricots and peaches from California will be sold at auction in New York Thursday.

No light has been thrown upon the Cronin murder case through the Toronto investigations.

The Northern and Southern Pacific railroads having withdrawn from the Transcontinental association, there is a strong probability of the collapse of the association.

Officers After Schweinfurth.

CHICAGO, June 5.—A dispatch from St. Charles, Minn., says that a warrant has been received at that place from Rockford, Ill., for the arrest of Rev. George Schweinfurth, the head of the Beekmanites, and who claims to be Christ. Schweinfurth is now at St. Charles among his followers.

The Aluminum Age.

The world has had its ages of stone and bronze. We are now passing through the iron age.

Fancy houses made of aluminum instead of iron. The weight of the new metal is only a third as much as iron, with equal or greater tensile strength. The girders and the plates could be cast and readily handled in sizes far larger than those to which architectural iron is now confined. Perhaps whole fronts of modernized houses could be modeled into a single piece. This would greatly facilitate building operations which are now slow.

Aluminum is as fire-proof as iron. The larger the plates of the metal composing the side of the house the less liable they are to be warped and curled by intense heat. A building with aluminum walls, such as we have described, would survive a great conflagration in which iron structures of existing patterns would wither and crumble to the ground. As aluminum never rusts, a house constructed of it would always exhibit a silvery, glistening surface. It would require no cleaning, except as smoke or dust might gradually dim its native beauty. A sponge and water would bring all that back. Whenever aluminum is cheap enough for house-building, steamships will be made of it. This will be a revolution in ocean commerce. Hulls of aluminum ships will weigh only a third as much as iron ones of equal tonnage. They will be as strong and secure against damage from collision as iron vessels now are. Their far greater buoyancy will be to that extent an increase of safety.

Miss Alice B. Sanger is the first woman ever employed as a clerk in the White house. She is one of the most expert stenographers and typewriters in the country. She is about 22 or 23, and is inclined to be a blonde. She has large, light eyes, and a wealth of hair and a very sweet face. Whenever she speaks her mouth breaks in smiles. She has a pleasant voice and is an accomplished musician. At the White house she is one of the family. She writes all the president's personal letters, and is secure in his confidence, having been his stenographer for over two years. All last summer Miss Sanger was the only stenographer employed at Harrison's home, and part of the time she was secretary as well. Miss Sanger is related to Gen. N. P. Banks and Elias Howe.
