Proposals for Wood.

SEALED PROPOSALS will be received at the office of the secretary of state until 12 noon of June 10th, 1889, for the delivery on the capital grounds on or before August 1st, less of all or any part of 50 cords of oak and 50 cords of fir wood corded closely.

Oak must be sound body timber not more than 12 inches in diameter.
Fir must be cut from large trees.
All wood must be four feet long, reasonably straight and not less than 2 1/2 inches in diameter.

Separate bids will be received at the same time and place for cutting into three lengths the above wood and storing the same in the capital building; storage to be completed by September 15th, 1889.

SEATTLE'S SAD DISASTER.

Relief Boats and Trains Arriving at All Hours of the Day.

SEATTLE, W. T., June 8. — The queen city of the Sound presents an appalling sight. The awful disaster swept down on it so suddenly that in less than twelve hours 120 acres of the business portion of the city were wiped out of existence, nothing remaining but blackened walls where two days ago were busy scenes of business activity.

Beginning at the foot of University street the boundary of the burnt district runs east to Front street, thence south half way to Spring street, along Second street to James, on James to Third, and thence along South Third street to the water's edge. In this immense territory not a single building escaped the fury of the sea of fire. In this property was included the water front, or commercial wharves of the city, the whole loss representing \$10,000,000, upon which there is an insurance of but about \$1,000,000.

But a single important business building, the Boston block, in which the postoffice is located, is left standing, and it was greatly scorched by fire. The residence portion of the city remains practically untouched, and the heaviest portion of the losses will fall upon those best able to support them and to replace the property which has been destroyed.

The steamer Quickstep arrived from Tacoma loaded to the guards with canned meat and other provisions, accompanied by the committee of citizens who had been instrumental in raising the large subscriptions.

Again the same steamer arrived from Tacoma, with 5000 loaves of bread, 1000 pounds of beef, and ten tons of other provisions—the gift of Allen C. Mason.

The steamer Cora Brown arrived from the same city with blankets and ten tons of needed goods in charge of Mayor Wheelright, while a special train from Tacoma, in charge of the Chamber of Commerce, brought two car loads, or twenty tons of provisions. The fire steamer Fairhaven came in with Nelson Bennett and party, from Bellingham bay and Port Townsend, with twenty tons of goods, and with a notification by Mr. Bennett that \$2500 had been raised at Port Townsend for the relief fund.

The early trip yesterday morning of the Quickstep, from Tacoma, was the first relief boat to reach the doomed city with provisions. The people crowded on her and asked for food and water. All day long steamboats were passing each other on the placid waters of the Sound, coming and going for help for the stricken city. Enough has arrived to make everybody comfortable, and the Tacoma committee propose to open a boarding house tent and keep it going for at least a week or ten days.

A Plague Threatened.
JOHNSTOWN, June 7. — "Are the horrors of the flood to give way to the terrors of a plague?" is the question that is now agitating the valley of the Conemaugh.

To-day opened warm and almost sultry. The stench throughout the city is almost overpowering. Sickening, in spite of the precautions of the sanitary authorities, is on the increase, and fears of an epidemic grow with every hour. Five cases of malignant diptheria were reported this morning in five different houses on one street, and the health authorities anticipate typhoid fever and kindred diseases, especially as the weather is growing warm. The scarcity of vegetables adds to the danger.

An Ostrich Farm.

Sells Brothers recently bought all the ostriches on the famous Santa Ana, California, ostrich farm and will carry the full flock of ostriches with their big show this season, after which it is their intention of establishing an ostrich farm either at Columbus, Ohio, or Topeka, Kansas, at both of which cities they have vast real estate possessions.

An experienced keeper travels with the birds and will explain the details of ostrich breeding. The feathers of these birds last year were sold to a New York firm for \$15,000, but this year they were not plucked and their beautiful plumage will attract the admiration of all who see them.

To Note the Speed of a Train.

Inquiry is frequently made as to how the speed of a train may be estimated. The traveler, especially, is curious about the speed his train is making and we give two methods by which the speed may be guessed with remarkable accuracy, as follows: 1. Watch for the passage of the train by the large, white mile posts with black figures upon them, and divide 3,600 by the time in seconds between posts. The result is the speed in miles per hour. 2. Listen attentively until the car distinguishes the click, click, click of the wheel as it passes a rail joint. The number of clicks upon one side of the car in twenty seconds is the speed in miles per hour, where the rails are thirty feet in length, and this is the case generally.

The Genuine Shetland Pony.

The real Shetland pony is only thirty or at most forty inches high. Those commonly seen in the country are from the north of Ireland, being bred with the horses there, and are larger than the genuine Shetland, for the genuine pony is difficult to rear, the country of which he is a native is bare, and the farmer is sharp, and when the little creatures survive the rigors of the climate, and the effect of having so little to eat, the farmer values him so highly he only sells him at a high price.
