Proposals for Wood.
SEALED PROPOSALS will be received at the office of the secretary of state until 12 m. of June 14th, 1889, for the delivery on the capital grounds on or before August 1st, 1889, of all or any part of 65 cords of oak and 60 cords of fir wood cut closely.
Oak must be sound body timber cut from 15 to 20 inch trees and not more than six months cut.
Fir must be cut from large live trees.
All wood must be four feet long, reasonably straight and not less than 2 1/2 inches in diameter.
Separate bids will be received at the same time and place for cutting into three lengths the above wood and storing the same in the capital building storage to be completed by September 15th, 1889.
All bids will be opened at the above office at 2 p. m. June 14, 1889.

LATEST BY TELEGRAPH
THE SADDEST SCENE.

Situation at Johnstown Grows More and More Serious.

JOHNSTOWN, June 9.—The pestilence permeates the atmosphere and disease is spreading. In the interest of the general welfare, upon the recovery of remains they should be immediately interred. Supplies are pouring in from every quarter, and thousands of workmen have renewed their attack on the wreckage that gorges the streets. All that human sympathy and practical help can suggest, or do, is carried into effect. One man, reputed to have been worth \$100,000 before the flood, is now penniless and has to take his place in line with others seeking the necessities of life.

The workmen were not paid as they expected, on account of the delay of statements from the foreman. The workmen now have all the provisions they require, and are under excellent discipline. Only one instance of an outbreak was noted this afternoon. Alien workmen unearthed eight barrels of liquor, which they began to drink. They rebelled when ordered to break in the heads of the barrels, but when a revolver was drawn they demolished the casks.

20,000 have registered. The most reliable estimates place the population of the flooded valley at 20,000 previous to the disaster, exclusive of visitors whose number will about balance those of the missing. It will be seen that the estimate heretofore given that 10,000 lives were lost was exaggerated. It is thought now that the loss will not exceed 5000.

A Woman Not a Person.
HELENA, Mont., June 9.—During the session of the last legislature, a bill was passed, in the face of strong opposition and a pronounced adverse public sentiment, giving women the privilege of practicing law in Montana.

Judge Blake, in the district court rendered a decision in a case where a lady, Miss Knowles, as a deputy constable, served a garnishee on the Northern Pacific railroad to secure payment of a judgment obtained by a grocery firm against a woman to whom the company owed a certain sum of money.

The judge held that Miss Knowles was not a "person" in the eyes of the law, and therefore unfit to perform the duties of a constable.

Leniency to Captain Ames.
WASHINGTON, June 8.—In the case of Captain George A. Ames, U. S. A., retired, sentenced by a court martial to be dismissed from the service, the president has commuted the sentence, in consideration of good service and some mitigating circumstances connected with the offenses of which he was found guilty, to confinement within such limits as the secretary of war may prescribe, and the privation of the right to wear the uniform and insignia of his rank for five years.

Robbing the Bodies.
JOHNSTOWN, June 9.—A trap was laid for Crook, an undertaker, who was robbing bodies in the Fourth ward morgue. A female body was brought in, and before it was dressed for burial a diamond ring was placed on one of her fingers. The undertaker was then assigned to take charge of the body. He was detected in the act of stealing the jewelry, and was promptly arrested by the police, who immediately took him to Ebersburg.

The Behring Trouble.
OTTAWA, June 9.—A gentleman in Victoria who is interested in the seizure of Canada vessels in Behring sea two years ago, writing to a friend in Ottawa, says: "The Canadian sealers will go North as usual in a few days, and if asked to 'heave to,' will resist seizure. If overpowered, they will be retaken by the British cruisers."

Aggregate of Losses.
SEATTLE, June 9.—The record of losses made yesterday was necessarily incomplete, but it was not so far reported inaccurate, except in few instances. The confusion yesterday was still so great that a full and correct statement of the total cannot yet be made. When all losses are stated it is believed that the aggregate will reach \$15,000,000.

The Pennsylvania state board of health has decided to saturate the debris along the Allegheny river with oil and burn it, after the bodies have been removed.

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.

The Cambria iron works lose \$5,000,000 by the Johnstown flood.

The Sioux Indians are still consulting together about selling their lands.

Governor Buckley of Connecticut has vetoed the bill providing for a secret ballot.

The late heavy rains at Bellefonte, Pa., did \$1,000,000 damage, besides causing the loss of several lives.

A whole English colony located in the Conemaugh valley have not yet been heard from, and it is believed they were all swept away in the rushing waters.

It is positively declared that the contest over the will of A. T. Stewart has been discontinued and that Judge Hilton will pay the contestants \$0,000,000. The estate is valued at \$40,000,000.

THE AWFUL FEAR OF IT.

Forbodings of a Disaster at Johnstown for Years and Years.

"We are afraid of that lake," said a gentleman who had lived in Johnstown for years; "we were afraid of that lake seven years ago."

"No one could see the immense height to which that artificial dam had been built without fearing the tremendous power of the water behind it. The dam must have had a sheer height of 100 feet, thus forcing the water that high above its natural bed and making a lake at least three miles long and a mile wide out of what could scarcely be called a pond."

"I doubt if there is a man or woman in Johnstown who, at sometime or other, hadn't feared and spoken of the terrible disaster that has now come. I remember six years ago, when I worked in Gaultier office, we used to talk of what we would do should that awful body of water break its weak barriers and sweep down the valley, and I remember also, we all decided it would be so sudden and so strong that any effort to escape would be fruitless."

"People wondered and asked why the dam wasn't strengthened, as it certainly had become weak, but nothing was done, and by and by they talked less about it, and nothing happened, though now and then someone would shake their heads as if conscious the fearful day would come some time when their worst fears would be transcended by the horror of the actual occurrence."

"If it is true that dam has given way, they the idea or even the hope for hundreds would seem out of the question. We figured out pretty clearly the actual number of barrels in the immense reservoir three miles long and one mile wide, with an average depth of sixty feet, and at the dam, of fully 125 feet."

"Just think, if you can, of the terrific rush of that ocean of water, roaring down the narrow defile, then between the narrow hills hedging in the Conemaugh. No pen and no words could describe the irresistible force of that water rushing down upon Johnstown, but a few miles away, Johnstown is in a sort of a hollow, between the two rivers, and that lake must have swept over the city at a depth of forty feet. Thousands have lost their lives, and men are to blame for it, for warnings have been uttered a thousand times, and have received no attention."

The great dam was built to form a reservoir for the old Pennsylvania canal. The dam has a base of 300 feet in thickness at the bottom, gradually narrowing to a width of about fifty feet at the top, and is seventy-five feet high and from 800 to 1000 feet long. The main portion was formed of the heaviest and most solid stone masonry. The lake formed by the reservoir is actually about two and one-half miles long, but it is generally called three miles, and has an irregular width, varying from one-half to three-quarters of a mile. The greatest depth of water is ninety feet, and over a considerable portion the average depth is seventy feet.—Pittsburg Dispatch.
