SUPERINTENDENT PORTER of the census bureau has received the application of Mrs. Kate C. Cothran of California, to be appointed supervisor of the census for the Californian district. The fact is notable because it is the first application of the kind ever made by a woman.

It is reported from Washington that Secretary Noble has approved the plan for continuing the irrigation survey along the arid lands of the West. The area to be included in the plan of survey for California is the unmapped portions of the drainage basin of the Yuba, American, Consumnes, Mokelumne, Stanislaus, Truckee and Carson rivers.

At the state and navy department little credence is put in the report telegraphed from Canada that several English war vessels had been ordered to Behring sea with instructions to prevent U. S. vessels from seizing English sealing vessels in those waters under the president's March proclamation. Inasmuch as the assumption of full and sole authority over those waters by the United States government has been received by the governments of the world without even the slightest diplomatic protest, it is hardly probable that England would attempt to forcibly resist what has never been peacefully objected to.

A GLORIOUS MARCH.

"Let's put a stop to it." "Well, say we do. How shall we go about it?" "Just wait till the legislature meets and we will get a law made to prevent it."

The legislature meets and the "law," as they call it, is made.

But laws do not enforce themselves, although when public opinion is unanimous for a law it comes pretty near doing so. Laws require a considerable structure, a whole system with active agents to carry them out. There must be a prosecutor, an informer, a court with all its adjuncts and paraphernalia.

Very soon human ingenuity, which is inexhaustible, finds methods of evasion, and these methods are not only legion, they are infinite.

And now the wise reformers are amazed. "Why, the thing is just as bad as it was before. We must amend the law." Accordingly some very simple amendments are made. Time passes and 'tis found that the evil exists even greater than before. In fact there is a perfect army of people engaged in evading and violating the law. People who a few years ago would have shuddered at the very idea of violating a law are now bold shameless violators. More over a generation is growing up, educated, yet educated into this system of outlawry. Glorious school for American citizenship!

Again is the legislature appealed to. We are determined to put a stop to this even in doing so we drive over constitutions and all natural inviolable rights. If necessary no one shall go out after dark without a permit; no one shall print or publish anything to call attention to it; no advertising, no carrying. People are imprisoned at hard labor for the simplest act of business. "Tis war between laws and "outlaws." A thousand Constables pervade the land; all strangers are suspected and deadly hatred exists between neighbors. But the evil still exists. Drinks are sold everywhere on Sunday; vile literature is carried by mail; lotteries flourish and are advertised; cigars are smoked; opium is sold, betting and gambling are common, horse run races, etc., etc.

We are now at our last resort. Next we must do as China has done—make the penalty death. Yes, hang, shoot, decapitate whenever a gambler uses opium as the Chinese. We shall then have a people so intensely law abiding that they will submit to have their heads cut off while at the same time so strong is their obedience to custom that no one ever dreams of using less opium and everyone gambles openly in the public streets knowing that their lives are forfeited.

Method in His Madness.

One of the most remarkable characters Cincinnati ever saw is dead. It was Dr. Joseph Garretson, of west Eighth street. For sixty-two years of his life he never drank a cup of coffee nor sipped a little tea. For fifty years of his life he ate no meat. For twenty-six years of his life he never took so much as a pinch of salt. He came of English stock, and was born in that county of long lived people, York, Pa., Feb. 27, 1808. His ideas were very simple, but on the subject of diet he believed strictly in a vegetarian diet. Nature he used to say, has supplied this food, and it is against nature when a man eats meats. To those who would eat meat, however, he insisted that it should be boiled. He used to point to the Indians as proof of this, claiming that they were never sick unless from wounds. He trusted no cooks to prepare his food, but did it himself. When he went upon a journey he took his food with him, only a few weeks before his death he was in New York city, going the entire distance with his food. He claimed that everything greasy was injurious to the human system, and of all things horrible was a piece of meat fried. Dyspepsia and all the ghosts and nightmares of indigestion he attributed to frying. His only drink during his long life was water, or sometimes a lemonade. He was continually experimenting on the subject of diet, and attributed his long life entirely to his diet and habits.

The Oregon Census.

Superintendent Porter, of the census bureau, and Representative Hermann have been in consultation for some time, as to the advisability of dividing Oregon into one or two districts, and it has finally been concluded to make two districts, dividing the summit of the Cascade range of mountains, which forms Eastern Oregon as one district, with a supervisor of census for it, and Western Oregon as another.

There will be, it is estimated, about 290 enumerators for Oregon, who will each have separate divisions, composed of precincts, whose employment will be limited to one month, and who will be allowed \$6 per day.

In the eastern countries the compensation will be based on the number of names and industries enumerated. These enumerators will be under the direction of supervisors.

Primitive and Happy.

Nojima, a small island about five miles from Mitagerie, has about 800 inhabitants who live in a most primitive manner. Not more than one-sixth till the soil, the others being fishermen, and although the island is very fertile the people draw their supplies of rice, wheat, etc., from the mainland. Azaleas are extremely plentiful, all the hillsides being covered with them—in fact, in olden times the place was known as Azalea Island. There are neither horses nor dogs on the island, and consequently the children, when shown a picture of one of these animals, mistake it for a cow. The young people pass the time dancing and amusing themselves, and are without care. Quarrels are rare, and when they do happen the offender makes his peace by smashing an earthenware pot in front of the injured party by way of apology.

Dangers of Kerosene.

Very few who use the coal oil can see a fire kindler, understand where the danger lies in such a practice. Coal oil of itself does not perhaps carry an extraordinary amount of danger with it, as it does not ignite rapidly enough to account for the myriad of fatal and terrible accidents that are inscribed upon demolished and exploded cars, but the vapor arising from the coal oil, and from which it is almost invariably attended, is among the most inflammable articles known. One gallon of petroleum spirit is enough to render 10,000 gallons of air inflammable representing a space exceeding 2000 cubic feet. The penetrating nature of the vapor increases the risk—a fact which has been proved by a direct experiment, as well as indicated by actual misfortune. 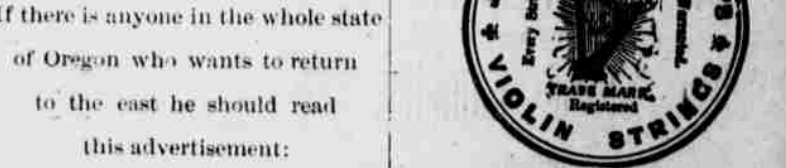
