## THE BEARDSLEY TRIAL BEGINS.

The Jury Empanelled and Sworn—A

Crowded Court Room.

The case of the State of Oregon vs. O. P. Beardsley for the murder of Thomas L. Perryman at Eola, Polk county, on the 14th day of March, 1889, was called this morning by Judge Boise. Prosecution and defense being prepared, arrangements were made for an immediate hearing of the case.

The court room is packed with eager, attentive listeners, among whom are a large number of women by whom the strictest attention is given to every word uttered and to every movement made. Mr. Beardsley, pale and well-nerved, sits within the bar, and gives the most profound attention to every word that is uttered. His wife and daughter are present, as well as many of the citizens of Eola and Polk county.

In this case the prosecution is being made by District Attorney Hewitt, assisted by Messrs. Holmes, Bingham and Butler and the defense by R. H. Williams, Tilford and J. J. Daly.
