Proposals for Wood.

SEALED PROPOSALS will be received at the office of the secretary of state until 12 m. of June 19th, 1889, for the delivery of the capital grounds on or before August 1st, 1890, of all or any part of 6 cords of oak and 6 cords of fir wood corded closely.

Oak must be sound body timber cut from 12-inch trees and not more than six months cut.

Fir must be cut from large live trees.

All wood must be four feet long, reasonably straight and not less than 2 1/2 inches in diameter.

Separate bids will be received at the same time and place for cutting into three lengths the above wood and storing the same in the capital building; storage to be completed by September 15th, 1890.

All bids will be opened at the above office at 2 p. m. June 18, 1889.

LATEST BY TELEGRAPH

Prohibition Defeated.

PHILADELPHIA, June 18.—The voting on the prohibition amendment proceeded quietly. The day was clear, and there was a light vote. There was a notable absence of women from the polls, and the distribution of ice water and sandwiches was not so profuse as was anticipated. In some parts of the city the prohibition folks enlisted Sunday school children to distribute cold water tickets.

Returns from forty-four out of sixty-seven counties show a majority against the prohibition amendment of 169,454. Full returns from the whole state will probably raise the figures to nearly 200,000.

Albany Points.

ALBANY, June 18.—The June term of circuit court will convene in this city on Monday June 24th. The docket is quite heavy, consisting of sixty-two civil cases alone.

A man who was intoxicated, and whose name could not be ascertained, fell from the regular passenger train between this city and Salem last evening, receiving injuries which may prove fatal. He got on at Salem and when near Marion, where is his home, he fell from the car platform. He was taken to Jefferson and there taken off for medical treatment.

The Sinslaw & Eastern.

EUGENE, Or., June 18.—The directors of the Sinslaw & Eastern railway and navigation company held a meeting at the office of the secretary of the company in this city today. O. Boomhower was elected general agent of the company, and it was resolved to make a preliminary survey of the line between Florence and this city immediately, and the president and secretary were authorized to employ competent engineers to survey the line and complete the estimates for the same.

A Duel in Missouri.

ST. LOUIS, June 18.—John O. Manion, a young farmer near Fayette, Mo., and Richard M. Fowler, his cousin, fought a duel in the streets of that city yesterday. Manion and his wife had separated because of Fowler's marked attention to her. When the two men met on the street yesterday they began shooting at each other. Manion was killed and Fowler probably mortally wounded.

Oil in Texas.

BONHAM, Texas, June 18.—Citizens of Bonham are jubilant. In boring an artesian well for water works in the northern part of the city, at a depth of 860 feet a strong volume of oil was struck. This was examined this evening by an expert who is familiar with the oil regions of Pennsylvania, and gives his opinion that the find will prove valuable.

Trouble With Dogs.

JOHNSTOWN, June 18.—The guards at Camp Hastings, near Prospect Hill burying ground, report that they are having trouble with dogs constantly bothering the interred bodies. Over one hundred dogs were driven from the place last night and several of them were killed. The hastily dug graves are shallow and the dogs have been uncovering and devouring the bodies.

Diphtheria Prevalent.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 18.—Within the past three days twelve cases of diphtheria have been reported at the health office in Oakland, and the health officer expresses the opinion that there will be an epidemic of the disease, owing to the great number of cesspools throughout the city and the poor system of sewerage.

Pennington to Hang.

BAKER CITY, June 18.—Judge Isom to-day sentenced Clinton Pennington to be hung on August 2d for the murder of Charles Balcom. Clay Evan and Richard Duval were also sentenced to the penitentiary for eighteen months for larceny in a warehouse.

Explorer Stanley Will Lecture.

LONDON, June 17.—Stanley's agent is here arranging for a lecture tour for him for October. His return here before autumn is regarded as certain.

The Sioux Commission.

WASHINGTON, June 18.—Lucius Fairchild, ex-commissioner-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, has been appointed member of the Sioux commission.

Gauges Out His Eyes.

MILLES CITY, Or., June 18.—Private Fitzsimmons of Fifth Cavalry, stationed at Fort Keogh, went insane three weeks ago. Several days he was removed to the guardhouse to prevent him from using violence on those about him.

He gouged out both his eyes with his thumbs. One eye he pulled out and threw on the floor and the other hung on his cheek and was removed.

The most physician says the disease of his brain is such as to render him insensible to pain and he appears to suffer none, though he will probably die.

A Magnificent Court House.

SEATTLE, W. T., June 18.—The board of county commissioners negotiated the purchase of a block of land for county buildings, located between Fifth and Sixth and Cherry and Columbia streets. The purchase price was \$57,000. It is proposed to erect upon this block a court house that will cost \$185,000. The plans are yet to be submitted by architects, but the money is already raised upon bonds for \$200,000 sold by the county and it is expected that when the work is once begun it will be rushed forward to completion.

The Cronin Murder.

CHICAGO, June 18.—Chief of Police Hubbard, in speaking of the arrest of Martin Burke in Winnipeg for complicity in the Cronin murder, said this morning that he had a good deal more evidence against Burke than had been published. He said there was not a shadow of doubt in his mind that Burke helped kill Cronin. The police do not say where this information came from, but it is said that a friend of Burke has "squealed," and will accompany an officer with a large retinue to Winnipeg.

Four Large Nuggets Found.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 18.—A short time ago miners working in the Sunnyside claim near Downieville, Sierra county, took out four large gold nuggets. The largest weighs 181 ounces, and is worth \$3,200. In shape and size it resembles a small cobblestone. The other three nuggets weigh seventy to eighty ounces each, and are worth nearly \$3,000.

Burned To Death.

MANATOCK, Ont., June 18.—The residence of Richard Wilson caught fire last night, and Mrs. Wilson and two young children were burned to death.

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.

Ben. S. Burroughs has been appointed postmaster of Pendleton.

It is estimated at the pension office that there will be a deficiency of about \$15,000,000 in the appropriation for the coming fiscal year, which begins July 1st. This is largely the fault of the late Commissioner of Pensions who knowingly made his estimates too small.

Chinamen in Tacoma.

Tacoma has long made a boast that no Chinese were in that city. The citizens would not permit them to tarry there, but the following from the News of that city would indicate that the Celestials are about to win the game:

There is a Chinaman residing in Tacoma. At least that is what several responsible parties, some of whom claim to have seen him, say. The Chinaman lives in a house in the vicinity of the corner of J and seventeenth streets. Those who have seen the Chinaman say that he is a middle-aged Celestial with a queue reaching nearly to his heels and that he is doing housework for a family in the vicinity named. They think that an organized effort is being made to introduce Chinamen in Tacoma and that the one seen is the first of a party of the wily Mongolians who will try to gain a foothold here. They say that the Chinaman seen is very cautious in his movements and seldom goes out of the house until after nightfall.
