Miller of the Southern board of agriculture is still in Salem arranging premium lists, etc., for the Jacksonville fair, to be held the week beginning Sept. 23d, which is the week next succeeding the State fair to be held in Salem. This morning one of the former, in full dress, passed through Salem, en route to Astoria or The Dalles. There is, after all, something in a name, as the appointment of U. S. Grant as postmaster of Dallas would prove. About the first week in July Mr. Kay of the Salem woolen mills will return, and at once begin active operations in the construction of a mill. The lines of the narrow gauge are still in a demoralized condition and mail and passengers have much difficulty in making close connections for destinations. Albert Schwab, lately from Clay Center, Kansas, has purchased through Duncan & Booth a farm near Gervais, and will permanently locate. The Roseburg Review and Herald have consolidated. Each formerly claimed a circulation ranging all the way from 1900 to 1800 and now the boast is that the combined circulation will be nearly 2000. Now the lion and the lamb which heretofore have been lying separately will lie down together. Circus day and Fourth of July are here or will soon be. Spokane Falls claims a population of 24,000. Port Townsend's motor street-car line is expected to be in running order by the fourth of July. There are more trout in the Santiam this year than known for years before. All who go fishing are rewarded abundantly. There is such a demand in the east for California raisins that there is danger that they will be scarce before the season is past. The Evangelical church of Oregon has founded a school at Lafayette, Yamhill county, to be known as the Lafayette seminary. The advertising columns of exchanges west of the mountains disclose the fact that the timber lands are being rapidly taken up by Michigan and Minnesota men. Pullman, W. T., has within the past fortnight sunk an artesian well. Water was struck at a depth of sixty-five feet, and the well throws water at the rate of fifty gallons per minute, or 730,000 per day. In Wasco county and the surrounding country the drought has burned up thousands of acres of standing crop, and farmers are obliged to bring their stock to the Willamette valley to save them from starvation. Rouge river salmon are now being shipped from Gold Hill to Portland and sold there at a good price, remarks the Ashland Tidings. They are sold as Columbia river fish, and few people who buy and eat them know the difference. It is not often that a local paper concedes a falling off in population locally, but this the Yreka Journal does, saying that the population of that town in 1756 was 5000, while now it is about 2000. There was a stampede from that section in 1861-2 after the great flood. The new game law passed at the last legislature provides that it shall be unlawful to hunt, pursue or kill any deer or elk between November 1, and August 1, thus leaving only the months of August, September and October in which deer can be killed, and they cannot be killed at any time for their hides.
