SEALED PROPOSALS will be received at the office of the secretary of state until 12 m. of June 21st, 1889, for the delivery on the capital grounds on or before August 1st, 1889, of all or any part of 65 cords of oak and 60 cords of fir wood corded closely.

Oak must be sound body timber cut from 12 to 18 inch trees and not more than six months cut.

Fir must be cut from large live trees.

All wood must be four feet long, reasonably straight and not less than 2 1/2 inches in diameter.

Separate bids will be received at the same time and place for cutting into three lengths the above wood and storing the same in the capital building, storage to be completed by September 15th, 1889.

All bids will be opened at the above office at 2 p. m. June 19, 1889.

FIRE AT VANCOUVER!

Twenty-Nine Buildings Burned. Entailing a Heavy Loss.

THE LOSS WILL BE ABOUT \$75,000.

The Fire the Work of an Incendiary—Now Under Control.

[Special to the Capital Journal.]

PORTLAND, June 22, 2:45 p. m.—The fire which broke out at Vancouver, W. T., at about 2 o'clock this morning, is now under complete control. Portland sent two engines to the rescue and the home departments worked with an undaunted vigor.

The work of the fire is now known and twenty-nine buildings are found to have been entirely destroyed. The total loss will amount to \$75,000 on which there is but a small insurance.

The fire was the work of an incendiary and came very nearly doing much more damage than it did.

It is now under control. The Exchange hotel, Commercial bank, telegraph office and four restaurants were in the path of the fire and were consumed. The fire burned towards the wharves.

Big Fire at Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, W. T., June 22, 2:10 a. m.—A fierce fire, which broke out shortly before 2 o'clock, is now raging with constantly increasing volume. The local fire department is powerless to stay the progress of the flames. The following appeal for aid has just been sent:

To Chief Morgan, Portland Fire Dep't:—Send us two engines immediately. The town is burning up.

Brown, Mayor.

The fire is now in close proximity to the telegraph office and the operator is making preparations to tear out his instruments.

3:15 a. m.—The Exchange hotel Commercial bank and four restaurants are gone. The fire is going toward the wharves.

The engines were sent from Portland, by steamer, and as they left Portland at four o'clock the sky was red in the direction of Vancouver, showing the fire to be an extensive one.

Public Opinion Divided.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 21.—In the railroad offices around town, which are engaged in the carrying trade in Oregon and adjacent states and territories, opinion is divided as to whether Villard has helped the Northern Pacific by the course pursued by him at the meeting in Portland on Monday last. It is claimed that, by permitting the Union Pacific to lease the Navigation company, and to complete its unfinished lines, he has given the Union Pacific a better foothold in Washington than it has ever held before, and has enabled it to compete more strongly, not only for local, but for through business, to which the Northern Pacific has always heretofore strongly objected.

Albany Points.

ALBANY, June 22.—Mike Schlosser was taken before Recorder Henton and fined \$30 for resisting an officer, and \$5 for being drunk and disorderly, and costs. In default of payment of fine he was consigned to the city jail for thirteen days.

A young man giving the name of Geo. R. Lee, claiming to represent Wallace's comedy co., has been in the city a couple of days. He secured the opera house for the company in July, and employed two or three different young men to travel as advance agent for the company. From each of these he attempted to borrow sums ranging from \$5 to \$50 and even made away with one young man's valise. He was arrested at Tangent and is being tried here.

More Trouble at Johnston.

JOHNSTOWN, June 21.—A species of hives has broken out among the people here. The ailment seems contagious. On account of the hot weather to-day the suffering is intense. Five bodies were picked up near the bridge this morning. Up to noon to-day thirteen bodies were found.

Beer Is Bad.

BROOKLYN, June 21.—Mayor Chapin to-day received a communication from the Women's Christian temperance league calling his attention to the law bearing upon temperance instruction in the public schools. The ladies inform the mayor that a committee of the league had visited sixty-six schools; in only eleven of them were temperance tea books used, and added that several teachers admitted that the boys and girls were often stupefied from the use of beer at noon meals, so that they could not study.

Mrs. Hayes Paralyzed.

CLEVELAND, June 21.—Mrs. Hayes, wife of ex-President Hayes, was stricken with apoplexy this afternoon at her home in Fremont. The attack came on about four o'clock while Mrs. Hayes was sitting in her room sewing. Paralysis of the right side resulted, rendering her speechless. Medical help was immediately summoned, but all efforts to restore the lady to consciousness have thus far failed.

The Cronin Murder Case.

CHICAGO, June 21.—The Cronin grand jury this morning heard the testimony of Mrs. Phibbin, an aunt of Martin Burke, the Winnipeg suspect. She scorned the idea that her nephew was a murderer, and described him as a weak, rattle brained young man, who lacked courage to engage in a plot of such a character. She was unable to enlighten the jury as to Burke's movements a short time previous to the murder, as he had ceased living at her house.

Found a Woman's Hand.

HALIFAX, June 21.—While the fishing schooner Hattie D. was on the banks one of the men caught a large halibut. The fish was of such huge proportions that it took several of the crew to haul it aboard. Upon opening the halibut a portion of a woman's hand, with the thumb and first and second fingers, was found. On the second finger was a plain gold band ring, on which were engraved the letters "G. W. G."

Boulanger Again.

PARIS, June 21.—The senate commission, which has been inquiring into the charges against Boulanger, has finished its work and forwarded all the documents to the public prosecutor.

Floods in France.

PARIS, June 21.—The rivers have overflowed their banks and partially submerged the town of Barleddur and surrounding country. Many houses are destroyed and crops and vineyards ruined.

Train Robbers Sentenced.

PRESCOTT, Ariz., June 21.—Chief Justice Wright yesterday sentenced Dan Harwick, William Stiren and James Halford, the Caned Diablo train robbers, to twenty-five years each in the penitentiary.

MEHAMA ITEMS.

Two stages are running from Mehama to Turner and both seem to get all they can do.

R. A. Pratt is putting a new front on his residence, which is very attractive, to say the least.

Rev. Jones and Hulbert are conducting a camp meeting at Mehama. Those who have attended say they are having an interesting time.

The writer having just returned from the lower part of the county took particular notice of all growing crops. Fall wheat is splendid everywhere, oats are short in the hills, spring wheat will fall far below the average yield and potatoes will be scarce this fall although there is a large acreage planted. Early potatoes are turning yellow already.

TURNER ITEMS.

Campmeeting will continue, perhaps, for another week as the attendance and interest are good.

On Friday afternoon the State Sunday School convention met at Turner campmeeting grounds.

Yesterday the people of Turner gave grandma Reid a birthday party in which the old and young took part. The restaurant on the campmeeting ground was closed up and a good dinner was set for all the guests. She was seventy-eight years of age.
