LIVELY NOTES FROM ALBANY.

Work to Begin at Once on the Oregon Pacific—Other Items.

ALBANY, June 25, 1889.—A contract was let at Corvallis last evening to J. S. Antonelle and L. B. Doe of San Francisco for the construction of twenty miles of road on the Oregon Pacific eastward from this city. The contract begins five miles this side of the tunnel, including it and extending fifteen miles east of it, which will complete the road almost to the summit, about sixty miles east of Albany. The company already has about four miles of road completed at the summit. These gentlemen will begin work at once, and a thousand or more men will within a few days be put to work on the road. This resumption of work will be good news. It is said the work will be pushed with vigor all summer, and that additional contracts will be let which will take the road into eastern Oregon before autumn.

Several farmers on the Albany prairie yesterday began running their binders in their wheat fields. The harvest will be a good one. Late sown spring wheat, though, will not be of much account. The hay crop is good and is now in full sway.

There were two fire alarms yesterday, but in each case the damage was small.

On and after next Monday the town cow will not be allowed to run at large.

On last Saturday a barn belonging to B. R. Holt of Harrisburg took fire and burned to the ground. There were about a hundred sacks of oats and a lot of hay which were consumed. A dwelling house of Jerry Hay some distance away took fire from sparks from the burning barn but was extinguished before any damage was done.

UNLUCKY JOHNSTOWN.

A Fire Destroyed Most of The Few Remaining Houses.

JOHNSTOWN, June 25.—A sweeping fire broke out in the first ward at 12:30 yesterday afternoon. The flames spread rapidly and in half an hour twenty houses were burning. All the engines in the place were called on and the most intense excitement prevailed. Nearly all the houses were burning. The fire spread rapidly towards Kernville and got beyond control of the department. The fire covered five acres and consumed all but three buildings of the first ward.

To Go Over Horseshoe Falls.

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., June 24.—Carlisle D. Graham, the hero of several trips through the Whirlpool rapids, announces that he will, in a few days, go over the Horseshoe falls, which rushes over a 200-foot precipice, with what little protection his new barrel life boat can afford. This barrel boat is designed for a life boat, and is eleven feet long and forty inches in diameter. It looks a little like a torpedo, with a turret amidship, and has side wheels, storing apparatus and other appliances similar to a flying machine, for aquatic use. The craft is a cylinder in shape, and has three compartments, each of which is water tight. The center compartment is forty-three inches long and forty inches in diameter. The craft is strongly built of well seasoned oak and cedar staves, and is bound with twenty-four iron bands. But it is extremely doubtful if it can escape being dashed to pieces, either on the rocks at the foot of the falls, or elsewhere in the gorge.

Killed His Companion.

UNION, Or., June 24.—News was brought here this morning of the killing of the nine-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Phillips, on Lyons' hill, about fifteen miles south of this place, by William Michael, aged seventeen years. Michael shot the girl between the eyes with a Colt's revolver, killing her instantly. Michael says she shot herself, and has already told two stories as to how it occurred. The girl's little brother, aged five years, was the only witness to the deed, and says: "Michael pointed the revolver at his sister's head and it went off, and his sister fell over, and he told me not to tell how it happened."

The First Negro Priest.

BALTIMORE, June 24.—Cardinal Gibbons ordained a number of students of St. Aplice and St. Joseph's academy. Among others on whom the tonsure was bestowed was Randolph Uncles, a colored student of St. Joseph, who will be the first colored priest in America. The elevation of colored men to the priesthood is in pursuance of a decree passed by the last plenary council to send colored missionaries to the South to work among the colored people. The cardinal is of the opinion that men of their own race will have more influence among the negroes than white priests. The elevation of Uncles is the first step toward carrying out this decree.
