AGAIN the season for cutting hay is here. Yet there are very few hay balers in this county and the same old labor wasting, fire inviting, costly mode of carrying and storing hay prevails here that is out of date elsewhere. Bale your hay and then insure your own stables.

THE Committee of Odd-Fellows appointed to visit the scene of the Johnstown disaster report a loss to the order of thirty-three members, thirty-four wives, and 169 children by the flood. 300 members lost their household goods and 225 owned houses and stores which were lost. The grand jurisdictions are sending forward their aid for the relief of the distressed.

At the last meeting of the San Diego city council a petition with 1500 signatures was presented, asking the passage of an ordinance abolishing screens in the doors of saloons and the removal of paint or screens from the windows. At a meeting of the council the committee made an unanimous report, which the council adopted, and the city attorney was instructed to draw up an ordinance to that effect.

NOTWITHSTANDING the infinite number of car couplers invented men are still wasting time and money in getting patents. Hundreds of car couplers have been made, any one of which would do provided the car makers would agree to use some one coupler. As to patents a man can get a patent for anything almost, if he has the money. Our patent office is a great humbug and imposition. It patents and repatents over and over again, the same thing virtually that has been patented before.

A CONVENTION of the secular Union at Silverton was for the purpose of devising measures to complete the separation of church and state in Oregon. An organization has been formed, called the Oregon state secular union, the sole aim and object of which is to educate the public by lectures and by literature on the subject as to the importance of taxing church property, maintaining the entirely secular character of our schools, discontinuing public appropriations for sectarian institutions, resisting Puritanical legislation in regard to Sunday, and such other measures as are necessary to effect the complete disjunction of church and state.

A WEATHER ITEM. The Holt County (Mo.) Press has this to say, after reading the JOURNAL:

"THE CAPITAL JOURNAL of Salem, Oregon, speaks of the weather there during early June as quite warm, the temperature averaging from 80 to 93 in the shade. This must be very suffocating in a damp air with no wind blowing. As a compensation they boast of cool nights there. Northwest Missouri can boast of a better climate than that. Our nights so far have been cool, and the temperature hasn't averaged that high."

The Missouri paper is careful to insert that saving clause, "so far." The figures given by the JOURNAL were for the hottest day this season and were taken at the very warmest time of day. The thermometer, however, stood that high for but a very few moments. The cooling sea breeze, shorn of its harshness by the Coast range, reaches us in the afternoon and the effect is instant, cooling and bracing. "The damp air with no wind blowing" is an error of the first magnitude. As for the nights, they are cool and pleasant. When they are sweltering in Missouri with an oppressive sun, no breeze and silver in the thermometer running out at the top they may well turn their eyes toward Oregon and weep. 100° is no great heat for that country and a breeze is the exception rather than the rule. Here we rarely see it 90° and are never without a breeze. But from a Missouri winter deliver us!

When the Seattle fire started, Hotelling & Co. rolled 100 barrels of whiskey into the bay to save it. Two barrels were drowned: the rest all safe.

Eyes as Ornaments.
