LATEST BY TELEGRAPH

Albany Points.

ALBANY, June 27.—In the circuit court yesterday the grand jury returned a true bill against John Wilson, charged with attempting to burglarize the meat market of Shultz Bros. The prisoner pleaded guilty and was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.

The street car line on Lyon street is nearly completed the track being laid to First street and the curve put in. Work on the First street line is being prosecuted as far west as Ellsworth. Here it will be stopped until after July 4th, so as not to have the street torn up on that day. The entire line will be completed by July 15th ready to receive the cars.

It is reported that a fierce fire is raging in the mountains near the tunnel on the Oregon Pacific railroad, which threatens to destroy much valuable timber.

Governor Foraker Again.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, June 26.—At the republican state convention today Joseph Benson Foraker was nominated for governor on the second ballot. Great confusion prevailed, but partisanship was finally overthrown and Foraker nominated. The nomination was made unanimous. The committee was asked to bring Foraker before the convention. After considerable delay Foraker was brought in and was received with enthusiasm. He said he understood the nomination meant that he was to be candidate for governor and that alone.

Electrical Executions.

AUBURN, N. Y., June 26.—Electrical executions will not occur in this state without a long preliminary struggle. The present case of Komar, who was to be executed by electricity, came up before Judge Day this morning, who decided that expert testimony concerning the effect of electricity on the human body must be taken. A referee was appointed and the case continued until July 30.

Death of General Cameron.

LANCASTER, Pa., June 26.—General Simon Cameron died at 8 o'clock this evening.

The general's condition during the day was rather encouraging, and death came suddenly during a weak spell.

Up to the last attack he was conscious and had no trouble to swallow the food given him and which he appeared to assimilate.

The News in New York.

NEW YORK, June 26.—The control of the Oregonian railway company has been secured by the Southern Pacific. The terms of the agreement have not been definitely arranged, but the price is said to be \$1,500,000 of which \$1,000,000 will be in stock and the balance is supposed to be the amount of the receiver's certificates.

Germany and Switzerland.

BERLIN, June 27.—The North German Gazette, in an article on socialism in Switzerland, charges that the spread of social revolutionary doctrines is mainly due to the facility with which Swiss officials allow the Social Democrat and other revolutionary prints to circulate.

A Woman Hanged.

PHILADELPHIA, June 26.—Mrs. Sarah Jane Whitting was hanged here.

The crime for which Mrs. Whitting suffered the extreme penalty was the deliberate poisoning of her husband and two children for the purpose of securing the small insurance which she carried on each of their lives.

Boulanger's Pension Stopped.

PARIS, June 26.—The Figaro says that at the request of the senate committee which made an investigation into the charges against Boulanger, payment of Boulanger's pension will be stopped. Boulanger will bring suit against the government to compel payment.

The Chemawa School.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—The interior department is advised that the superintendent of the Indian training school at Salem, Oregon, has forwarded his resignation by mail. The Oregon delegation have united on Rev. G. M. Irwin of Union City, Oregon.

Phelps to Germany.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—The president has appointed William Walter Phelps minister to Germany.

The New National Flags.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—The navy department directs that on and after July 4, 1889, the national flag of the navy shall consist of forty-two stars in honor of the new states. The war department takes a different action and will not alter the flags till the formal admission of the four new states.

Chinese Exclusion.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—Assistant Secretary Tichenor denies that the treasury department has approved Solicitor Hepburn's opinion to the effect that there is nothing in the Chinese exclusion act to prohibit Chinese emigrants from passing through the United States in transit to other countries, and denies that such permission has been given.

A Sensational Charge.

THREE OAKS, Mich., June 26.—Fred White an influential farmer of Berrien county, has filed a complaint with the interstate commerce committee against the Lake Shore & Michigan southern railway company, charging them with carrying on a gigantic system of robbery, by taking five pounds of wheat from every load weighed at their elevators by means of false weights.

Indians in War Paint.

RAVALLI, M. T., June 26.—The powwow has ended and the chiefs have refused to assist in the capture of the murderers. The troops are called upon but will not attack without orders from headquarters. The Indians are on the mountain sides in bands near Ravalli, watching the movements of the troops. If they decide to turn over the murderers, the trouble will end at once. If not the renegade following of the fugitives from justice will be wiped out.

Damage Done by Floods.

PHILADELPHIA, June 26.—The board of directors of the Pennsylvania road to-day held their first meeting since the recent floods. The result of the examination of the several main lines was discussed, and, while no accurate estimate was submitted as to the cost of making repairs and repairing the property on the same, reports sufficiently in detail were presented to show that on all the lines of the Pennsylvania system the damage done would not exceed from one and one-half to one and three-quarter million dollars.

Portland Points.

PORTLAND, June 27.—Frank Jarvis of Rooster Rock was tried in the criminal court yesterday for rape. The complainant was his own daughter, Mrs. Josephine Ross, who is twenty-one years of age. Jarvis denied his daughter's charges.

The case was given to the jury at nine o'clock last night, and at eleven o'clock a verdict of guilty of incest was returned.

Marshal Frank Bowers of Manitou Springs, Col., yesterday passed through the city on his way to Salem to get the necessary requisition papers for Walter Jules, alias Rockwood, who is wanted there for embezzlement. Jules was manager of the Manitou electric light company and absconded with the funds, going to Canada.

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.

The governor of Connecticut has signed the secret ballot bill.

About 25,000 people are still daily being fed by the state commissary department at Johnstown, Pa.

Russia has occupied Deer Island at Corea, as a coaling and naval station, thus getting advantage of England.

A number of the sufferers by the Johnstown flood have combined to retain counsel to bring action against the South Fork fish club, owners of the fatal dam.

A man named George E. Brooks now comes forward in Chicago and declares he distinctly saw three men load the trunk into the wagon from the cottage, in which Dr. Cronin was murdered. He says he can recognize the men, and his testimony is believed to be valuable.

And now scientists say that fish have no more phosphorus in them than has meat, and hence as a brain food it has no advantage over other kinds of flesh. Thus it is that one cherished dream after another fades; the realities of life turn out to be mere illusions and all the years we have wasted in disposing of fish, which we abhor, might have been profitably spent over juicy and delicious beef steak.
