Mr. Benson's Funeral.

The body of Mr. Asbury S. Benson, whose death occurred at Turner yesterday, being the result of a horse's kick, was brought to this city this afternoon for burial. The funeral services were conducted from the M. E. church at 2 p. m. The deceased was but twenty-eight years of age, having been born in Illinois, May 22, 1860. He married Miss Emma Loftus, a daughter of Mrs. Carr of Turner and she, together with three small children, are left to mourn his departure. The remains were interred in the Odd Fellows' cemetery.

The Proposed Railroad.

Tonight the Salem board of trade meets for the discussion of the proposed narrow gauge railway from Salem via Dallas to Luckiamute falls and the coast. Now is the proper time to take some action in this matter, as the citizens of Dallas stand ready and willing to do all in their power to effect the construction of such a line. The line as projected would be a grand thing for Salem, as well as all the country through which it would pass.

Gone Out of Business.

Staiger Bros. of this city yesterday sold their stock of boots and shoes to Raymond, Edgett & Co. of Seattle. The sale was consummated in short order and the work of boxing the goods for shipment to Seattle was commenced at once. The purchasers were in business in Seattle when the fire left them without stock or storehouse. They desired to re-establish at once and will sell this stock from a tent which has been erected for their occupancy.

A Painful Accident.

Yesterday evening while at play Nellie Stevens, the young daughter of A. R. Stevens, had the misfortune to step on an iron rake with her bare foot, causing a bad wound. The tooth of the rake entered the bottom of the little child's foot and came out on the top, thus inflicting a wound which may prove fatal. Dr. Smith was called and the foot dressed and the patient is now resting easy. The child suffered a great deal last night.

Talking About Taxes.

Receiver C. N. Scott of the narrow gauge lines came up last night to confer with Sheriff Croisan regarding the payment of the taxes of that company for 1888. Rolling stock was attached at Ray's Landing to secure their payment, but Mr. Scott thinks they will be able to pay the taxes without letting the property be sold, as the narrow gauge has been sold to the Southern Pacific.

The Outlook Good.

Prof. Arnold says that already many requests are coming in for catalogues of the Willamette University for the 1889-90 school year. The inquiries are beginning early, and all indications point to a most prosperous year. The last term, financially and in point of attendance, was the best in the history of the institution, and there is no doubt but that the growth of the university will be commensurate with that of Salem and the state in general.

A Business Change.

To-day quite an important change in a Salem business firm occurred. The White Corner of Rosenberg & Myers has undergone the change. The firm of Rosenberg & Myers is dissolved, Mr. Myers having purchased the interest of J. M. Rosenberg. The business will be conducted as in the past at the old stand, Mr. Myers being the sole proprietor.

Among the sick.

Mrs. Richard Savage, whose health has been failing for the past few weeks, is now confined to her bed and is reported as to be in a dangerous condition. Mrs. Bud Chapman, who has been quite sick for the past few days, is a little better to-day. James Sheridan is lying very low at his home on Marion street. He is quite old and perhaps may not recover.

An Enormous Tape Worm.

Dr. Richardson has at his office an enormous tape worm which has been the cause of the illness of a Salem gentleman for four years. The worm is intact and was secured yesterday. It measures seventy-five feet in length.

Six Days in Sand and Dirt.

Deputy Sheriff Frank Wrightman returned to-day from Harney Valley, where he had gone to get the prisoner, Raymond Gribble, who had been arrested there at the request of Sheriff Croisan. Gribble is the man who stole a rope with a horse at one end of it at Aurora on April first of this year. Gribble's case will be looked into by the next grand jury. Mr. Wrightman had a long and dusty overland ride of over 400 miles. At Ontario he left the railroad and took a buckboard for Harney, 200 miles distant. This was a three days' trip through sand and dust and now Mr. Wrightman has a full appreciation of Eastern Oregon. He says crops generally up that way are burned out, there having been no rain for a long time and but very little during the spring and winter.

Suddenly Stricken.

Last evening after he had retired for the night, J. E. McCoy, the well known street railway and bridge contractor, was suddenly taken ill. He had been in usual health, with the exception of a slight pain in the head, out soon after retiring he lost his reason, temporarily, and got out of bed, jumped out of the window and ran into the yard shouting wildly. He was found wandering in a wheat field near by and returned to the house, where medical aid was summoned, and after a short time he seemed quite well again, but complained of pains in his head. To-day he is little better but will no doubt recover completely, his many friends will be pleased to learn.

The Silverton Motor Line.

At Silverton to-night there will be a big mass meeting of the citizens and farmers of that vicinity. They meet to discuss the Salem and Silverton motor line project and it would seem they are taking a great deal of interest in the scheme. The promoters are of the opinion that the construction of the line is an assurance and that at an early day. This motor line would be a great thing for the terminal points as well as the farmers along the route and it is hoped it will be built.

Into the River.

Yesterday afternoon Sam'l Graaf had the misfortune to fall off the dock at the boat house into the river, giving him a good ducking. It seemed that Chauncey Lockwood was shutting the door to the boat house and Mr. Graaf, in trying to get out of the way, slipped and fell into the river.

A River Bath.

Yesterday afternoon Archie Flatman was out riding in a sail boat and when under the Willamette bridge the craft capsized, spilling Mr. Flatman into the river. He succeeded after a few minutes in the water to turn the boat so he could get into it, thus saving him from a watery grave.

James Denham, the Burlington, Vt., gentleman who yesterday purchased the J. M. Martin residence property in this city, will immediately treat it to some substantial improvements. He expects his family and household goods within a few days, and will become one of us.

Surveying For the Drain.

Surveyor Culver has completed a survey of the vicinity of Lake Labish and is now engaged in preparing a map. This is according to the program arranged for the draining of the lake and the intention is to have the contracts let and begin work before many weeks.

A Big Meeting.

The Dallas railway committee will meet with the Salem board of trade to-night, when the matter of the Luckiamute falls narrow gauge railway to Salem will be discussed.

Sheriff John Smallman arrived in the city at noon, bringing with him John Wilson, who is to serve a two years sentence at the penitentiary, convicted of burglary at Albany.

The Indian mission school which was then begun gathered quite a large number of natives and did excellent work for some years. In 1844 the Oregon Institute, which took the place of the school above mentioned, was formally opened. This was merged into the Willamette University in 1853 and in January of that year the legislature of the territory gave the authority for the change.

Roads are necessary adjuncts, to farms, and good roads are only secondary in importance to successful farming. There is a vast difference in expense of marketing a crop over a barely passable, or over a good road. There was recently held at Atlanta, Georgia, a road convention of land owners, the object being to have the road laws of that state so amended that good roads would be made throughout the state. The Oregon farmer would do well to give road making some serious thought.

The Word "Oregon."

A word, about which there is much dispute, is the name of our state, Oregon. Several more or less plausible theories have been advanced, but to each of which, save one, there are fatal objections. The first time the word Oregon appeared in print was in 1776. Captain Jonathan Carver published in London a narrative of his travels west of the Mississippi river ten years previously, in which he applies the name to a stream which the Indians told him flowed westward from the "Stony" mountains to the Pacific. The existence of such a river had long been known by those hardy French explorers, who had for years traversed the region of the lakes and the Father of the Waters, and was indicated on the maps of the period as the "River of the West." Whence Carver derived his authority to call the river of the West the "Oregon" is a matter of pure speculation, but he probably supposed it to be the name of the stream from some half understood words spoken by the Indians.

Cheerful old Age.

"I look upon death to be as necessary to our constitution as sleep." "we shall rise refreshed in the morning."

In this cheerful vein wrote the philosopher and statesman at the age of eighty-two. His vision was at this time much impaired, and he suffered severely from gout; but these afflictions, he tells us, did not prevent him "enjoying the pleasure of society, and being cheerful in conversation."

There is something inexpressibly beautiful in old age, when thus exhibited devoid of querulousness, discontent or gloom, and free also from unbecoming levity.

We know of no good reason why the closing year of life should be sorrowful simply because they are the last. As the pilgrim's falling feet bear him tottering through the final scenes of this "strange, eventful history," the peace and happiness of the world beyond must seem to him, one would think, more desirable at every step. Even if the backward prospect be dark with errors, there is light before—light attainable; and the great truth that it may be reached should be a mighty consolation.

Four Crops a Year.

A rancher on the Wenatchee valley, just across the divide from Snohomish county, on the eastern slope of the Cascades, last year cut a field of alfalfa grass four times, getting two and a half tons to the acre each time, or ten tons for the season. This in one respect beats the record in Snohomish county. A farmer on the marsh near this place cut two crops last season—four tons to the acre the first time and three the second, or seven tons to the acre for the year. Across the divide they can beat us on crops but come in behind on yield.—Snohomish Eye.

To Stop a Runaway Horse.

The Russian method for stopping a runaway horse is said to be very effective, and is not particularly cruel. They place a cord with a running knot around the horse's neck near the neck strap. To this slip noose attach a pair of reins which may be thrown over the dashboard ready to be seized at once. When the horse starts take up the extra reins, and tighten the cord around the horse's throat. The most furious horse thus choked stops instantly, and will not kick or fall.
