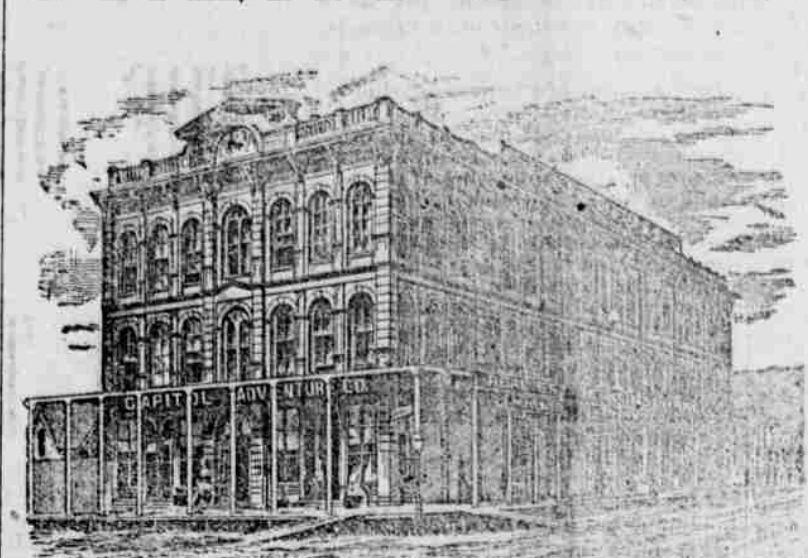

Blocked by Bees.
A swarm of bees took possession of Main street in Meriden Connecticut the other day and blocked traffic on that bustling city's busiest thoroughfare for over an hour. A few venturesome drivers sent their horses through the buzzing mass, but those that made the trip paid the penalty of the folly of their owners. People in the neighborhood were compelled to shut down their windows, for the day was hot and the bees were angry. The bees banged themselves against the windows in attempts to get inside. Staid business men threw their handkerchiefs over their heads and ran skipping away like school boys.

The bees were a stray swarm just let loose, although at one time they occupied a space as large as a load of hay they finally became compressed into a half-bushel wad and lit on one of the low branches of an evergreen tree in the Baptist Church lot. At sundown the church janitor spread a white cloth on the ground under them and placed a large keg at an angle on the cloth. The low-head of the keg had been knocked out and the inside smeared with molasses. Then the limb was sawed off and the bees dumped on the cloth. The queen bee made for the keg and in an hour the royal swarm was housed.

LATEST BY TELEGRAPH

Albany Points.
ALBANY, June 28.—The Oregon Pacific will begin track laying on the portion of the road, which is already graded between the end of the track and the beginning of the new contract between the 5th and 10th of July. The latter contractors will also begin work about that date. Their contract includes all the bridges on the twenty mile division let to them.

Though harvest is here again fully half of last year's crop of wheat and oats stored at this city has not yet been sold. In many cases money has been borrowed in order to carry it over, and yet 75 to 78 cents could have been obtained for several weeks last year.

Active operations have begun on the woolen mills. The excavations for the foundations of the main buildings are completed and the stone is being hauled from the quarry ready for the masons.

A Regular Duel.
ASTORIA, June 27.—Fishermen John Boldt and John Lucas quarreled this morning about salmon. Arriving in town they agreed to fight it out. They went beyond the cemetery and fought, Boldt knocking out Lucas. Lucas told Boldt he was best that way and now they would have a contest with knife and pistol.

The second duel began by Boldt drawing a pistol and shooting Lucas in the neck. Lucas was taken to the county hospital in a very weak condition. Boldt has been arrested.

A Young Fiend.
UNION, Or., June 27.—William Michaels, the 15-year-old boy who murdered the little daughter of Elmer Phillips has been held to await the action of the grand jury. The young fiend hails from Walla Walla where his mother and stepfather, named White, reside. The boy shows all signs of a vicious and depraved life and shows himself to be uncontrovertible. He has admitted the shooting. The mother of the murdered girl would have made short work of him with a rifle but for the interference of bystanders.

Skeletons Found.
ASTORIA, June 27.—A dispatch from Fort Klammath, Oregon, says: The skeletons of two white men have been found on the shore of Diamond Lake. One of them was an old and the other a young man. With them were remnants of clothing, shotgun, rifle packsaddle, fishing hooks, etc. A diary was found on their persons bearing date of September, 1886. Also a rubber stamp giving the name of Nathan Fubard, Jacksonville, Or., a postal card never posted, addressed to Mrs. A. V. Burns, Santa Cruz, Cal. The names of several Jacksonville people on papers, which had become somewhat intelligible, were found.

The Stricken City in Need.
JOHNSTOWN, Pa., June 27.—The relief committee has issued an appeal to the country not to delay or withhold contributions which are being held by mayors of cities and others which will in a degree alleviate the sufferings of the stricken people. It is greatly needed and should be sent at once in order to be most available.

Jeff Davis's Body Servant.
SUTTER CREEK, Cal., June 27.—Charles Hawkins, an old pioneer citizen, colored, was buried today. He died yesterday, after an illness of several weeks. Deceased was Jefferson Davis's body servant during President Pierce's administration and at the time that Jefferson Davis was in the senate. The deceased was highly respected.

And now comes the intelligence that the anarchists of Chicago are anticipating early news that progress is being made in the spread of their ideas on the Pacific coast. This is because Albert Currin, the notorious agitator, who has made some of the most violent speeches ever delivered in Chicago, is now in San Francisco to spread the doctrine of anarchy. The socialists of that city, according to advices, have received him with open arms, which is anything but cheering news to society in general.

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.

Six corpses were blown up in the Johnstons ruins yesterday.

Patrick Egan, minister to Chili, has arrived at Panama on his way south.

The committee of the French chamber of deputies have approved the bill for the relief of the Panama canal company.

Among the wreckage which came ashore on the coast of Massachusetts yesterday were several life preservers marked "City of Rome."

A board of arbitration is now endeavoring to settle the difference between the Union Pacific railroad and the Brotherhood of Locomotive engineers. The meeting is being held in Omaha.

At a wedding dinner, given at the restaurant Tromblaine, in Paris, fourteen of the guests were poisoned, after having eaten custard. One of them is dead and several others are expected to die.

The Chicago & Alton road, which recently opened a through line from Chicago to Denver, in connection with the Union Pacific, claims it is unable to sell tickets, owing to its rate of manipulation, and threatens to make an open reduction.

A Novel Snake Puzzle.

An astronomer from Harvard Observatory some time ago propounded this problem to a number of his fellow savants: suppose that three snakes, each two feet long, should catch each other by the tips of the tail, thus making a circle six feet in circumference. Suppose that each snake should begin to swallow the one in front of him. In what way would the resultant figure, after each snake had swallowed the one in front of him, differ from the original circle? There were many diverse opinions upon the subject, some of them entering the consideration of the fourth dimension of space, because any one of the snakes would have swallowed the two in front of him and yet have been swallowed by the two in back of him, and therefore, would be both inside and outside of his two fellows.
