REMINISCENCES OF 1848.

Thread of the Indian War Stories Continued by Judge Shaw.

[Correspondence of the Capital Journal.] In my last I left off at or near old fort Walla Walla, when we were on the march to the mission known as Wyllatpugh, where Whitman and those associated with him had been murdered in November.

At this time the weather had become rather warm and we had to travel rather slow, yet we were enabled to reach the mission that day and found everything in a horrible condition. It was reported to us that the bodies had all been decently interred by those sent to attend to this matter by the Hudson Bay company but I was shocked when I went to the place called the grave of those worthy dead, and found that the bodies had been disinterred by the wolves and pieces of their bodies were strewn around as if they had been of no more value than those of wild beasts.

I must be permitted right here to express my disgust at this, one of the most revolting and blood-curdling scenes of my life. My blood first ran cold and then hot, and my rage and that of my comrades became almost unbearable at times, and the only satisfaction that we could hope to attain, was the pleasure of seeing in the engagements that followed with our enemies that our unerring rifles had done their work well when we saw some red men of the forest tumble to the ground.

It has always been my opinion from what I saw while up at the mission and from information gained afterwards that some unprincipled person or persons had been the cause of this atrocious crime, all for some sinister motive. Perhaps jealousy or some other green-eyed monster had suggested the great necessity to get rid of a rival that was too full of American principles to suit those that entertained other religious faith and held allegiance to another government which desired very much to acquire this vast domain for an inheritance for their own constituency.

We found everything around the mission in a bad condition. Fences were all down and almost everything of value had been destroyed by the Indians. The stock belonging to the mission had been driven off and appropriated and there was nothing left to represent the thrift that this mission had in the year 1844 when our emigration came by on their way to Willamette valley.

being attacked. This was all done in a few days and the next thing to be done was to build a corral for our stock. This we soon did by digging trenches around a large piece of ground and placing fence rails on end in the trench which, when the dirt was all filled in again, made a strong barricade for our stock, into which we placed them every night, which made our guard duty much lighter, but they had to be out early every morning to get something to eat.

While a portion of our command was engaged in making everything safe, we also had out scouting parties in every direction to see if we could find where the Indians had taken their stock and families. We knew they had gone towards the Nez Perce country but hoped they would not be allowed to enter that country, which fact we soon learned to be true, for about this time Mr. Craig, (who had been one of our guides all the way up until we met the Nez Perces on the day after the battle between the Well Springs and Butter creek with whom he went home to see his family), returned with a large escort of the leading men of the Nez Perce tribe, who gave us assurance that they were our friends and would not allow the Kayuses to move into their country. While they remained true to our cause yet they did not entirely keep their word, for there were many of those Kayuses that had married into their tribe and it was almost an impossibility, to keep such as those out of their country.
