LATEST BY TELEGRAPH

Plain Talk by Tanner.

WASHINGTON, June 28.—Commissioner Tanner, in an interview, said: "I do not think my dismissal from office will occur for some time yet. I had some business with the president, and after all that has appeared in the newspapers, he never once alluded to the subject of dismissal. I mentioned in the course of conversation the desperate and continuous assaults that are being made upon me. 'Tanner,' he replied, 'never mind them, but go on and do your business.'"

"If," continued Tanner, warming up as he progressed, "in any manner I have been imposed upon, if any shadow of wrong has been or may be perpetrated under me while I am commissioner, no one will jump on it sooner than I will."

Albany Points.

ALBANY, June 29.—A dispatch in reference to the salaries of the post-offices of the Pacific coast states that the salary of the Albany postoffice has been reduced from \$1600 to \$1200. This, postmaster Thompson says, is a mistake. The salary will be increased to \$1700, the volume of business exceeding \$5,000, which fixes the salary at \$1700.

Jesse Mason, an employe in the saw-mill of Allen Parker, near Yaquma City, met with a serious accident Thursday. In some manner his hand was caught in a circular saw, and it was so mutilated that it had to be amputated.

Attempted Arson.

TUSCOLA, Ill., June 28.—A few nights since an attempt was made to burn the Odd Fellows hall on Hind street, where a number of preachers said to be Mormon elders were holding meetings. The missionaries started the people up to such an extent that the Mormons have been attacked several times lately.

Effect on a Johnstown Bank.

JOHNSTOWN, June 28.—About 200 deposits books of the Johnstown savings bank are reported lost by the depositors. There was \$774,000 on deposit. Much of this is the property of deceased people having no heirs. Four bodies were recovered this morning.

They are Leaving Us.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28.—Chinese Consul Bee is absent from the city, but one of the attaches of the consulate declares that since the Scott act became a law about 6000 Chinese have left the city, and less than 300 have arrived.

Foreign Railway Matters.

BERLIN, June 28.—Germany has bought a majority of the shares of the Swiss western railway and replaced the French by German directors.

Fred Douglas Minister to Hayti.

WASHINGTON, June 28.—The president appointed Frederick Douglass of the District of Columbia to be minister resident and consul general of the United States to Hayti.

Union Pacific Extensions.

NEW YORK, June 28.—The Mail and Express, in its financial article, says that a sufficient amount of new bonds of Consolidated Oregon Short Line will be used to provide for all the branch lines needed.

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.

The banks of Portland have decided to form a clearing house.

Mapleson's operatic season in London was a flat failure.

There is fighting in Bosnia between the Turks and insurgents.

There is trouble between England and Portugal over Delagoa bay in Africa.

Many of the laborers at Johnstown have been stricken down with Typhoid fever.

Red Cloud will not sign the Sioux treaty unless he is heavily paid by the government for doing so.

Mrs. Mackay has sued two English papers for saying that her mother was a washerwoman.

Thirty years ago the Thomas Dickson, a New Bedford whaling ship, was lost in the Ochotsk sea. Last summer the bark Cape Horn Pigeon took a whale in the same sea, and imbedded in the blubber was the iron of a harpoon, with the words "Thomas Dickson" stamped on it. It was as bright and sharp as when it was first stuck into the whale, at least thirty years ago.

Automatic Spelling.

A writer expresses the hope that before the typewriter is many years older some inventive genius will have been able to compass the problem how to give it some sort of dictionary attachment, which will enable it to spell better than it does at present. The typewriter is a tell-tale instrument. It conceals nothing. It is in that respect very unlike the pen, the breadth of whose stroke, like charity, covers a multitude of sins—in orthography. Speaking generally, every body who is not a good speller should write with as broad a nib as possible. The great thing, of course is to write as vaguely as may be—to leave as much as may be to the imagination. The important question of "ie" and "ei," of "ible" and "able"—how often an uncertainty in regard to these two combinations is got over by the simple addition of a little more obscurity to the unintelligibility of one's handwriting! It is indeed, whispered that there are people who actually cultivate a rather blurred calligraphy in order to disguise an orthographic weakness which otherwise is only too apparent. The typewriter, it is clear, must be avoided by such persons—unless, indeed, the suggested attachment can be made. And then, conceive the popularity of the machine—imagine the run upon it—its almost universal adoption. Of course, the thoroughly educated person always spells correctly, but how many are thoroughly educated, or, if they ever were so, have been able to retain their acquirements?

Lots of Jam for Johnstown.

Even disaster has comic phases and charity is sometimes humorous. A funny thing about Johnstown's horror was the extent to which the pitying and generous heart of the country yielded up jam for the relief of the sufferers. Meat was scarce, there was rarely any butter, milk could be got but infrequently, and sugar was always lacking when milk was to be had, while fruit was worth its weight in gold, but there was always plenty of jam. Bread and jam was the staple diet of the greater population: raspberry jam, strawberry jam, blackberry jam, orange jam, apple jam, peach jam, cherry jam, every kind of jam except jam-jams could be had for asking by any sufferer. It is doubtful if any one man except a jam manufacturer, ever saw so many different kinds of jam as were displayed upon the Johnstown relief stores.
