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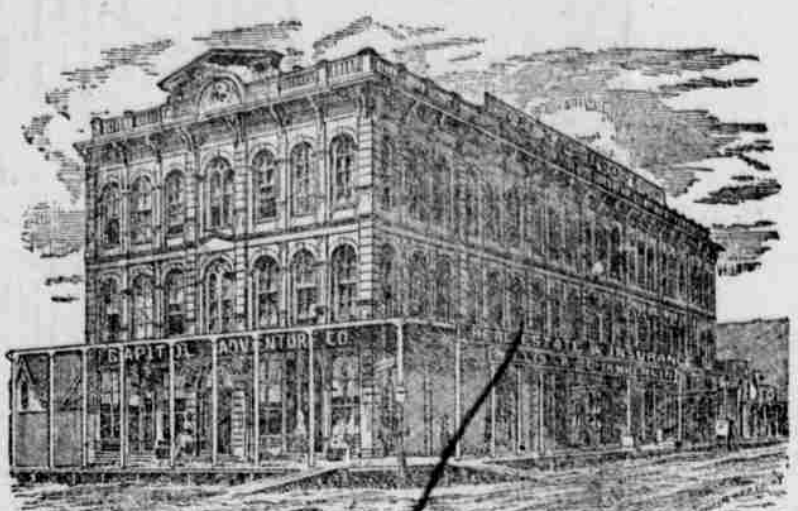

LATEST BY TELEGRAPH

A Rich Mining Discovery. BLACKFOOT CITY, Mont., June 30.—Grave fears are entertained of a general uprising and wholesale butchery in the Oro Fino mining district, on account of claim jumping by two brothers named Moore, who have taken cowboys in their employ. Saturday one of the Moores, in sinking an artesian well, uncovered what is supposed to be the richest vein of gold, and silver bearing quartz in the territory, and they jumped the whole townsite of Champion, near Deer Lodge, under the mineral laws. Dozens of claims have been staked out on the lead by jumpers, and a messenger has been sent to Helena to enable them to retain possession of the property. An old miner, who saw the quartz, says it is richer than that of granite, and estimated it to be worth \$5,000,000.

Colorado Bank Robbers. DENVER, Col., June 30.—A special from Telluride, Col., says: Deputy Sheriff Knouse and Sheriff J. Love, brought in two men—accomplices of the bank robbers. They were staid-looking and found carrying ammunition and provisions to the robbers, who are hidden in the hills between the Dolores and Mancos rivers. He says he is sure that Bert Madden, Bob Porter, Mat Warner and Tom McCarty committed the robbery, and that they have been preparing for this for some time. They are still in the hills, surrounded for miles with a heavy growth of brush, and no trails have been seen except at times on the outskirts. Some twelve or fifteen men are still in pursuit.

Transcontinental Travel. SAN FRANCISCO, June 30.—Travel to the east is very quiet, and first-class travelers are few and far between. From the east, however, travel is better, and the Pullman tourist cars seem to hit the mean between first-class sleeper and immigrant very happily. During the last week arrivals on this coast by the Philippines excursion, using tourist cars, were twenty-two for Portland, fifty-four to this city, and thirty-eight to Los Angeles. The outlook here is said to be very good for a heavy fall and winter travel to this coast.

A Flood at Hong Kong. SAN FRANCISCO, June 30.—The steamer Rio de Janeiro arrived late to-night from Hong Kong and Yokohama. One of the most destructive rain storms in the history of Hong Kong occurred May 29 and 30. The total rainfall for thirty-three hours was twenty-nine and a half inches, at times the fall measuring nearly three inches per hour. Hong Kong papers do not venture to mention the loss to private property, such as residences, stores, etc., but place the estimated loss to public property at about \$200,000.

Clan-Na-Gael. PHILADELPHIA, June 30.—Dr. Peter McCarty, acting for Clan-na-gael here suspended eight camps of that order, comprising the Sullivan faction, for refusal to contribute \$75 each to aid in the prosecution of the Cronin murderers. It is apparent that serious differences have arisen between members of the Clan-na-gael proper and the Irish nationalist faction, which will result in the expulsion of the latter element from the order in this city. About 3000 members are in the order here in good standing.

Royalty and Labor. BRUSSELS, June 29.—The shah of Persia made a visit to the works of the Zurich to-day accompanied by King Leopold. A delegation of workmen waited upon the king. His majesty shook hands with them and addressed them, saying: "You work in your sphere and I in mine. All workers are members of the same family and should join hands. Tell your comrades my feelings are in behalf Belgium, of union and strength."

Northern Pacific Plans. ST. PAUL, June 30.—T. F. Oakes, president of the Northern Pacific railway, in an interview in this city, denies emphatically that his company proposes to withdraw from their Canadian relations. He says they are building rapidly through Montana, and admits that negotiations are under way looking to the purchase of the Northern Central railway.

Terrified Negroes. BALTIMORE, June 30.—The negroes of Southern Maryland are panic-stricken over meteoric displays seen in that section during the last two nights. Reports were received from Prince George's county of a large meteor seen. The information comes that hundreds of superstitious negroes in the lower counties are so terrified that they will not work, and are spending their time in prayer and singing hymns in the belief that the world is coming to an end.

Accident to a Sleep-Walker. SAN BERNARDINO, June 30.—Early this morning Mrs. Samuel Cunningham of Cucamonga, who has been here for the past ten days, stopping at a private hospital, walked in her sleep and jumped from a three-story window, breaking her arm and jaw, and injuring herself internally. She lived about six hours.

Mackerel Growing Scarce. CHICAGO, June 30.—People who like mackerel will have to pay big prices for them next winter, for this summer's catch is almost a complete failure. Old fishermen think they have crossed the Atlantic and there seems to be some grounds for believing so, as many mackerel are now being caught off the Irish and English coasts.

Articles of Incorporation. Articles of incorporation were filed with the secretary of state to-day as follows: The Mineral Mining Company of Portland, with B. P. Cardwell, J. W. Minto and C. P. Church incorporators. Their business is to buy, sell, hold, lease, own and work mines.

Estates in Probate. In matter of the guardianship of M. Veazy, a spendthrift, Frank Buskey appointed guardian and files bond in sum of \$850, which is approved by the court. John C. Booth, Ed. N. Edes and L. H. Tarpley are appointed appraisers. In matter of the estate of Henry Steinhauer, John Calvert, administrator, files application for final settlement.

His Trial Postponed. The trial of James McClelland, for drawing a revolver on Ike Ford on last Saturday night, was postponed until seven o'clock this evening. McClelland is the young man who has been employed as waiter at Hellenbrand's eating parlors, and the charge against him is that of drawing a revolver on young Scott, whom he met walking with a party friend. Scott escorted the birdie home and at once put the officers on track of McClelland.

Attention has been called to the little-appreciated value of soapstone as a protective disintegrating influence of the atmosphere. It has long been used in China to keep sandstone and similar materials from deterioration, and perishable obelisks have been preserved in that country for many centuries by a paint made from powdered soapstone. The substance is said to be especially adapted as paint to prevent the corrosion of iron and steel.

The American execution company has been incorporated in Chicago, its object being to execute criminals sentenced to death. The idea is to employ hangmen and open correspondence with all the United States with a view to executing criminals "with neatness and dispatch."
