COLONEL CROCKER SAYS NO.

A Railroad to Astoria Will Not Be Built by The S. P.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 4.—Colonel C. F. Crocker, vice president of the Southern Pacific, stated in answer to an inquiry: "Our company has not decided to build a road into Astoria. It seems William Reed has given rise to an impression in certain quarters that we were interested with him in the Astorian project, but we are not. Such proposition has not even been discussed by the directors. Some rough mountains would have to be climbed to get into Astoria, and we are not prepared to spend money on such a venture."

"I will say, however, that by reason of our purchase of the Oregon & California road, we have a land grant for a road to Astoria from Portland. It is a part of the former line's land grant. A survey has been made over this land to Astoria, and this projected road is down on the maps as the Oregon Central railroad. If we build it, I suppose the land grant along its line would belong to us. At the time the Holladay and Villard interests controlled the Oregon & California there was much talk of building it. Since our company got control there has not been any earnest agitation for its construction. The immediate prospects are not favorable for reaching Astoria."

ELLENBURG DESTROYED BY FIRE.

Only Two Buildings Are Standing in the Business Section.

ELLENBURG, W. T., July 5.—At midnight fire broke out in J. S. Anthony's grocery on Main street, between Fourth and Fifth, and fanned by a brisk west wind rapidly destroyed the whole business portion of Ellensburg, with exception of the First National bank and the Lynch block.

The fire spread quickly among the residences in the southeastern part of the city.

The streets were crowded with teams and drays, moving goods to places of safety.

The water supply was inadequate and there was nothing but a hand engine with which to fight the flames.

There were no fatalities, nor was any one injured so far as known.

About fourteen blocks were destroyed. The loss cannot fall short of \$1,000,000.

The burned district is bounded on the east by Sprague street, on the west by Water, and extends from Fifth to Second.

The fire was under control at an early hour this morning and there is no danger of its spreading further.

The citizens are organizing for the protection of their property.

Beet Sugar.

WATSONVILLE, Cal., July 4.—The first price of \$500 offered by Clause Spreckles to farmers producing the largest per cent. of sugar per acre of sugar beets, was awarded to J. B. Hudson. Amount of sugar per acre, 8417 pounds. The second prize was awarded to William M. Foshen, amount per acre, 7652.

This doubles Germany's production. W. N. Gaffey has contracted to plant for ten years 2000 acres of rich sediment land producing at least four tons of sugar per acre.

The Fire at Hailey.

HAILEY, Idaho, July 4.—The fire which destroyed this city started in the Nevada bakery on the corner of Main and Carbonate streets, and spread with alarming rapidity. Everybody thought the Merchants' hotel, next to the corner, would stop the flames, but owing to a high wind, the fire swept through the row of frame buildings to the hotel, a frame building, and then along Main street, consuming buildings that were supposed to be fire proof as if they were tinder.

A Railroad Bombshell.

BAITMORE, July 4.—The Baltimore & Ohio railway has issued notice that, commencing July 6, it will take action independent of the trunk lines, and will make a rate on wheat and corn from Chicago to New York of 20 cents. This is a good deal like a bombshell.

Astoria Is All Right.

ASTORIA, July 5.—"Astoria Must Wait," say the telegrams. Astoria has no intention to wait. She is up and dressed, and sends greeting to her big sister on the Willamette. The road goes.

ALBANY'S BIG CELEBRATION.

Fifteen Thousand People Witness an Excellent Program.

ALBANY, Or., July 5.—The celebration in this city was a great success, fully fifteen thousand people being present. The parade which was a mile long was a grand pageant. Governor Pennoyer, Senator Mitchell and other distinguished visitors were present.

The oration by Hon. M. C. George was able and full of lofty, patriotic sentiment.

The sham battle in the afternoon was witnessed by about 10,000 people. The commanding officer was Colonel T. C. Smith, and the companies taking part were A, B, E, F and I. Company E supported the artillery and maintained the defense. The attacking party was led by Major S. L. Lovell. The defense was led by staff officers, Lieutenant M. L. Hunt and Lieutenant G. W. Smith. No accidents occurred and the battle was greatly enjoyed by all.

In the afternoon the hose race wet test was won by the Corvallis team in 3:31.

The exercises concluded with a fine display of fireworks and a grand military ball at the armory.

The Bright Mississippi Girl.
