The stores were closed and an air of quietude settled over the city. Many of her citizens had gone to Albany, Silverton, Dallas, McMinnville or elsewhere to celebrate and many of those who were unable to go from home, spent the day in Yew or Highland parks or betook themselves and families to the country. Salem was quiet. But there is always a calm before a storm and on this occasion the calm was to show the people how vociferously Salem would pluck feathers from the tail of the national bird on the natal day of 1890.

Petty Burglaries.
The sneak thieves took advantage of the absence of householders yesterday, to get in their low down work. Early Thursday morning the saloon of Jack Halliwell was entered by members of their craft. They made their way in by removing a tin which served as a window glass. But little of value was taken, as they failed to try the safe, supposing it of course to be locked. But in this they missed it, as the safe could readily have been opened by them and no less than \$150 been taken. Several minor robberies occurred the same morning, but no valuables were taken.

A Minor Robbery.
Some time during the first of the week some unknown party entered the house of Wm. Barker at the corner of High and Ferry streets, and stole \$18 in money. Mrs. Barker had been out shopping and upon returning home put the money on her bed and commenced to get dinner. During the evening she missed the money. The front door had been left open during the day and the bold thief entered in broad daylight and took the money.

The Teachers' Association.
The annual session of the state teachers' association closed, after a profitable and pleasant three days' session, on Wednesday evening. The session throughout was of the greatest interest and the closing exercises were of the same order. The attendance was all that could have been expected or desired during the three days and a vast amount of valuable work was done.

A Railroad Note.
Noting the late turn of railroad affairs, the Albany Herald says: "In the meantime the Albany & Astoria railway company, recently organized in this city, with a capital stock of \$15,000,000, is arranging to put surveyors in the field at once to survey the route for the proposed connection at Albany, and will secure the right of way and start the work going."

Capital's Win the Prize.
The Capital engine company of this city went to Albany yesterday morning to take part in the hose contest, which was between the Albany and Salem engines. Capitals won, the record being as follows: Salem, 268 feet 8 1/2 inches; Albany, 235 feet 8 1/2 inches.

Wore it as commenced.
Antonele & Doe began their Oregon Pacific contract this morning. They have secured a plant, hired some men and will begin active operations at once, increasing their force as fast as possible.

Articles of Incorporation.
Articles of incorporation were filed with the secretary of state today as follows: The West shore mill company of Astoria, with J. C. Trullinger, P. A. Trullinger and S. G. Trullinger as incorporators. Their business is to carry on a general lumbering business and the capital stock is \$100,000, divided into 1000 shares of the value of \$100 each. Astoria Exchange company of Astoria, with J. F. Haloran, Wm. Ford and C. W. Fulton as incorporators. Some of their business is to borrow, loan and invest money. The capital stock is \$50,000, divided into 500 shares of the value of \$100 each. The Bridal Veil lumbering company, with T. H. Smith, E. L. Brown and T. L. Palmer as incorporators. Some of their business is to buy and sell timber lands and to own and operate saw mills, planing mills and all machinery connected therewith. The principle office is in Bridal Veil. The capital stock is \$100,000, divided into 1000 shares of the value of \$100 each. The Patton home for the friendless, with the officers of the Albina union relief society association. County Court Proceedings.

The Bridge at Stayton.
The county courts of Marion and Linn counties met at Albany on the evening of July 3d for the purpose of opening and considering the bids solicited for the construction of a bridge across the north fork of the Santiam river about 200 feet below the Stayton ferry. The bridge will cost a trifle above \$18,000 and the counties have decided upon building the bridge jointly, each to pay one-half of the cost of construction. The bridge is to 610 feet long and sixteen feet wide in the clear. Piers to be of sufficient height to bring the bottom of the floor beams at least twenty-two feet above low water mark. Contracts will be let soon and work will be commenced at as early a date as possible and the bridge will be completed as soon as the work can be done.
