A Baby With a Fish's Head.

The officers of the New York
society for the prevention of cruelty
to children arrested Fredericka Ep-
pinger recently, for taking infants
to board without license, and in a
second room in her house found a
curiously malformed child. The
physical formation of the little one's
head closely resembles that of a fish.
The forehead retreats at a sharp angle
and the face tapers almost to a point
at the mouth, which the child opens
and closes after the manner of a fish,
in a gasping way, in breathing. The
arms are connected to the body a
sides by ligatures that resemble
the web between the toes of water
fowls, and the legs are bound to-
gether in the same way. The child
is in the care of the society. Its
mother is said to be a servant girl,
who charges its paternity to a former
employer. She explains the mal-
formation by saying that she was
frightened by the sight of a shark
in a museum.

the women do the work and the

cock fighting.

LATEST BY TELEGRAPH

Republicans in Earnest.

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Not since
congress adjourned has there been
so many members of the senate and
house here as there are at present.

There has been more or less secre-
cy maintained in reference to these
visits, and the senators especially
have shown a disposition to throw
inquirers off by the statement that
they are simply looking out for a
few places for their friends.

It is learned, however, that the
reason of their presence here is the
forthcoming elections in the four
new states, and every republican is
exceedingly anxious that the election
shall be carried in every district
by the republican nominee.

There is a practical unanimity of
belief that congress will be called
together before the date for the regu-
lar session, and the reports of demo-
cratic successes in some of the local
elections in Montana, together with
the knowledge that the very best ef-
forts of the party are necessary to
control and maintain the organiza-
tion of the house, have set the lead-
ers to thinking that something must
be done.

A Rumor About the O. R. & N.

WALLA WALLA, W. T., July 5.—
It is currently reported here that the
O. R. & N., and the city of Portland
will make a strong endeavor to have
a clause inserted in the constitution
of the new state limiting the right
of the counties to issue bonds to aid
railroads. It is said to be a move-
ment directed against the Hunt sys-
tem of roads, and to prevent this
county fulfilling its contract with
Hunt regarding new roads he pro-
poses to build. The rumor is creat-
ing considerable feeling. Steps will
be taken at once to counteract the
supposed movement.

The Deadly Rocket.

Fourth of July celebrations, and an-
other is dangerously wounded, but
may recover. Clancy Yeager, thir-
teen years old, was killed and Kinna
dangerously wounded, but may re-
cover. It was at the time of the
pyrotechnic display last night.
Yeager was struck by the stick of a
rocket, which pierced his breast.
One of them struck Kinna in the
right side, penetrating between his
ribs.

Damage by Flames.

WOODLAND, Cal., July 4.—An-
other field fire occurred yesterday
afternoon, seven miles west of Da-
visville, on the ranch of E. A. Mc-
Millan, destroying 160 acres of heavy
summer-fallow, valued at twenty
dollars per acre. It was insured by
Wamcock & Co. of Winter, for
ten dollars per acre. The fire caught
from an adjoining stubble field,
where a threshing engine had been
the previous day.

Albany Points.

ALBANY, July 6.—Work has been
resumed on the street railway line,
and it will be finished within ten
days.

The following bids were opened
by the county court for building the
Stayton bridge: Pacific bridge com-
pany \$20,000 and \$18,500; Hoffman
& Bates, wood \$16,800 and \$15,300;
iron, \$18,250 and \$18,800. The con-
tract was let to Hoffman & Bates for
\$18,250, iron pier.

Governor Lowry Determined.

JACKSON, Miss., July 5.—In re-
sponse to telegrams, asking per-
mission for the Mississippi state troops
to pass through Alabama and Louisi-
ana to prevent the Sullivan-Kil-
lain light if necessary, Governor
Lowry has received an affirmative
reply from Governor Seay and is ex-
pecting a like answer from Governor
Nichols.

Accident at Lyons.

LYONS, Or., July 5th.—Yesterday
evening about 6 o'clock, while sev-
eral children were playing with a
road cart at the residence of James
Berry, the cart was tipped back-
ward, falling on Patrick, the four-
year-old son of J. C. Lyons, break-
ing his leg near the thigh. Dr.
Wyatt was immediately summoned
and the little sufferer is now resting
easy.

The Offer Refused.

MINNEAPOLIS, July 5.—As a re-
sult of the remarkable performance
of the three-year-old trotting stallion
Axtell at Minnehaha yesterday,
Robert Bonner of New York tele-
graphed his owner that he would
pay \$25,000 for him, but the offer
was refused.

Worse Than Reported.

ELLENSBURG, W. T., July 5.—
Letters of sympathy and proffers of
aid have been coming in all day,
and this afternoon Mayor Reed of
North Yakima arrived with a car-
load of provisions and \$1,000 in
money. These kind offers of the gen-
erous public have been thankfully
received, and, while the most hope-
ful thought our citizens might be
able to get through without assist-
ance, contemplation of the terrible
calamity convinces them of their
error.

They have had time to visit the
deserted homes and places of busi-
ness, and find the losses even great-
er than at first reported.

While the losses foot up about \$2-
000,000, the insurance is not over
one-fourth that amount. Those who
visited Seattle after the great fire,
say the burnt district here shows
greater destruction of property in
loss space.

Portland Points.

PORTLAND, July 6.—It takes a
deal of climbing of rickety ladders
and squeezing between joists to get
to the attic of the big hotel, on the
eighth floor and back. The laying
of the floors and lathing has been
pushed of late and work on the out-
side is about done. It begins to
look now as if the promise that
dinner would be served there Christ-
mas day would be made good.

Al Cody, supposed to be in jail,
spent Thursday night carousing
and assaulted three young men.

A Close Call for Judge Hoyt.

OLYMPIA, W. T., July 5.—It was a
close shave for Judge John P. Hoyt
of Seattle, notwithstanding the fact
that the republicans have fifteen ma-
jority in the constitutional conven-
tion. He was elected president by
seven majority out of seventy-three
votes. It was an unheard of pro-
ceeding in a representative body to
let that something was in the wind.

The Oklahoma Disaster.

OKLAHOMA CITY, I. T., July 5.—
The number of victims of yesterday's
disaster is greater than was at first
supposed. It is now thought that
150 people were more or less injured.
Fully a dozen were dangerously
hurt, and are now lying in a critical
condition. It has been rumored
that three of the victims died to-day,
but diligent inquiry failed to con-
firm the report.

A New Postage Stamp.

Specifications have just been is-
sued by the postmaster-general for
the guidance of bidders under the
next contract for postage stamps,
advertised for under date of June
17, 1889, and providing for bids for
two series of stamps in different
sizes, one of them being the size
now in use, and the other about one-
third smaller. In speaking of the
proposed changes, Postmaster-Gen-
eral Wamamaker said that he be-
lieved the smaller sized stamp
would be quite as useful and popu-
lar as the larger size now in use,
and by reducing the size of the
stamp a material saving would be
effected, which could be profitably
expended in a better and every way
more desirable color.

Advantage of a Trademark.

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
