LATEST BY TELEGRAPH

A TRAGEDY AT ALBANY.

A Young Woman Sends a Bullet Through Her Friend's Heart.

ALBANY, Or., July 8.—A fatal shooting accident occurred yester-
day morning at the residence of
William Collins, three miles north
of this city. Miss Kate Fennell of
this city, aged sixteen, was visiting
Mrs. Collins. About ten o'clock
Miss Fennell saw a rifle leaning in
a corner of a bedroom. Picking it
up, she asked Mrs. Collins if it
would do any harm to snap the
hammer. The latter thoughtlessly
replied, "No," when the girl drew
back the hammer and snapped the
trigger. The gun, which no one
knew was loaded, was discharged
and the ball entered Mrs. Collins'
left breast, penetrating the heart
and coming out at her back, killing
her instantly. Deceased was aged
thirty-five and leaves a husband and
three small children. Her father,
Thomas Hunt, resides at Gervais,
Marion county, where the remains
were taken for interment this morn-
ing. Both families are grief-stricken
at the shocking occurrence, and the
girl who heedlessly fired the fatal
shot is prostrated with remorse.

Another Big Fire.

EUREKA, Nev., July 7.—The large
smelting works of the Eureka con-
solidated mining company were de-
stroyed by fire this morning. The
fire, which was accidental, origina-
ted between the boiler and the dry-
ing rooms. It was promptly dis-
covered, but got completely beyond
control in a few seconds, and in
thirty minutes the whole works,
with the exception of the refinery
had been consumed.

The total damage is variously esti-
mated at \$50,000 to \$75,000. The in-
surance, which is with San Fran-
cisco agencies, is believed here to be
about \$30,000.

Another Town Burned.

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., July 7.—
About noon to-day fire broke out in
the kitchen of the Nekeley's house,
a new building just erected in the
same block with the Southern hotel.
In spite of all efforts, it spread to
the adjoining buildings, which were
wooden, and then to the Southern
hotel.

Every business house in town is
burned, together with about forty
dwellings, involving a loss of pre-
haps \$1,250,000, with insurance of
about \$300,000.

Thirteen blocks are wiped out, and
not a hotel, restaurant or business
house is left.

Cause of the Fire.

ELLENBURG, W. T., July 8.—The
origin of the fire is unknown, but it
is generally believed that it was the
work of an incendiary. While it
was raging several placards were
found tacked to trees and buildings
in different parts of town. One read:
"We show no mercy." Another:
"Help yourselves, for God won't
help you." No one seems to under-
stand the significance of these no-
tices, and people are at a loss to
know by whom they were posted.
It is the general belief that they were
written by incendiaries.

J. S. Anthony, in whose store the
conflagration started, believes that
Indians burned his store. He left
his place at 10:15, and when he re-
turned a quarter of an hour later it
was in flames. He had no oil or in-
flammable material about the prem-
ises. He had incandescent lights.

Warlike Strikers.

Duluth, July 7.—The lumbermen's
strike, which has been in progress
here for several days, culminated
yesterday afternoon in a bloody war
between the strikers and the police-
men. Thirty determined policemen
were pitted against 3000 desperate
strikers, armed with pistols, stones
and clubs.

Four thousand men were em-
ployed on the street and sewer im-
provements at \$1.50 per day till
Thursday, when 1500 of them struck
for an advance of 25 cents per day.
The contractors refused to accede to
the demands, and the striking men
had many recruits each day, and
finally the mob increased to nearly
3000. A pitched battle was fought
in the suburbs last night between
the police and strikers and many
were killed and wounded.

The United States committee on
interstate commerce are investiga-
ting in Boston the relation of the Ca-
nadian railway with the interstate
laws and the United States railroads.

BEATEN IN NINETY-FOUR ROUNDS.

Reports are conflicting as they all
Come Via New Orleans.

THE GROUND SELECTED.

NEW ORLEANS, July 8th.—The
ground selected for the great fight is
Richburg, Miss. The men will en-
ter the ring at 7 a. m. The place se-
lected is 103 miles from here. The
reports of the fight will have to be
filed at New Orleans and will be
considerably delayed in conse-
quence.

NOT IN THE RING.

NEW YORK, July 8th, 1 p. m.—
The Evening World special says
the men had not entered the ring at
nine o'clock, New Orleans time.
This is reliable.

WIRES IN TROUBLE.

RICHMOND, Miss., July 8.—The
ring was pitched here at seven a. m.
Richburg is a hamlet of thirty peo-
ple on line of the railroad, with tele-
graphic facilities. Telephone wires
are all in trouble and it is extremely
doubtful if any news of the fight can
be obtained until the party reaches
New Orleans.

THE AUTHORITIES INTERFERE.

NEW ORLEANS, July 8.—Word
has reached here from Richburg,
the scene of the battle, to the effect
that the state authorities have inter-
fered and that both principles are
now under arrest.

THE FIGHT BEGUN.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 8, 5:15
p. m.—A private dispatch dated
from Richburg, three p. m., and re-
ceived here at five p. m., says the
fight has just begun.

JOHN L. VICTORIOUS.

NEW YORK, July 8.—An uncon-
firmed rumor says Sullivan won in
the ninth round.

BALTIMORE, Md., July 8.—Special

from Richburg says Sullivan won
the fight in the eighth round.

SULLIVAN DOWNS HIM.

NEW ORLEANS, July 8.—The Plea-
yude says John L. Sullivan wins in
the seventy-second round. Re-
ports are conflicting and reliable
information is not to be had.

IN NINETY-FOUR ROUNDS.

NEW YORK, July 8.—The Even-
ing Telegram's special from Rich-
burg, Miss., says Sullivan won in
the ninety-fourth round. Another
special says Sullivan won in the
eight round. Reports are conflict-
ing.

ANOTHER REPORT OF IT.

BUFFALO, N. Y., July 8, 1 p. m.
—Judge Stearns is in receipt of a
private dispatch from Richburg, say-
ing Sullivan won in 90 rounds.

IT LASTED TWO HOURS.

NEW ORLEANS, July 8, 2 p. m.—
Sullivan won the fight in seventy-
five rounds. Neither man was in-
jured, but Kilrain is considerably
exhausted. The fight lasted two
hours and eighteen minutes.

Albany Points.

ALBANY, July 8.—Harry Perrin,
a bricklayer from Eugene, fell from
the roof of the residence of C. E.
Wolverton Saturday evening, where
he was working, striking first upon
the balcony and then upon the
steps, thirty feet below. Two ribs
were fractured and injuries inflicted
which may prove fatal.

The Coroner's Inquest.

JOHNSTOWN, July 7.—The inquest
held by the coroner of Johnstown
resulted in finding the members of
the South Fork Laing and hunting
club responsible for the loss of life
and destruction of property caused
by the breaking of the South Fork
dam.

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.

The Fourth of July was observed
by the American residents in nearly
all of the European cities.

Michael Davitt, in his testimony
before the Parnell commission, de-
clared that the police incited many
of the outrages.

Secretary Rusk has issued a cir-
cular declaring that sanitary regu-
lations regarding the transportation
of cattle must be rigidly enforced.

The adjutant general of the state
of Louisiana ordered a company of
militia to be called out to prevent
the Kilrain-Sullivan prize fight from
coming off in that state.
