A Man Inside a Snake. A strange discovery—one that is causing the thoughtful to ponder over the written past—was made recently by a French citizen near Gainesville, Texas. Having occasion to sink a well, Mr. Sommer, the Frenchman in question, selected a spot in a valley near a ravine of great length, and which, during heavy rains, is transformed into a raging torrent, depositing into the valley, limestone, gravel, mud, and other debris to a depth of four feet, and while in a formation of limestone gravel that had continued almost uninterrupted from the surface down, Mr. Sommer came upon the vertebrae and ribs of an animal. The ribs were about the size of a small pig's and rapidly tapered. Carefully unearthing the bones and the neighbors gathered in and the work of unearthing the monster was prosecuted with vigor. After laying bare nineteen feet of the remains of the monster of other time, imagine their consternation at finding the entire skeleton of a man of tremendous stature in the stomach of the skeleton of the snake. The remains of the man and the serpent, as far as the serpent has been exhumed, are as perfect as when first denuded of flesh, and were doubtless covered with lime and gravel soon after death.

LATEST BY TELEGRAPH. JOHN L. SULLIVAN ARRESTED. The Officers Capture and Jail Him at Nashville, Tenn. [Special to the Capital Journal.] NASHVILLE, TENN., July 11.—John L. Sullivan was arrested this morning at the depot here, on requisition from the governor of Mississippi. He was hurried to jail, amidst the wildest excitement. Yesterday morning Sullivan and party took a carriage at New Orleans and drove away. It was not positively known, at the time, but it was believed they took the Southern Pacific train for Houston, Texas, to avoid going through Mississippi. The sheriff of Marion county, Miss., went to New Orleans yesterday morning for the purpose of arresting Sullivan and Kilrain. He went to Baton Rouge to get a requisition from the governor, and returned to New Orleans in the evening. The Mississippi authorities anticipated Sullivan's arrival in Nashville and had him arrested as soon as the train pulled into the Nashville depot. THE CRONIN MURDER CASE. The Appeal of Burke Will Not Amount to Much. [Special to the Capital Journal.] WEXFORD, Man., July 11.—It is not believed here that the appeal of Burke from the decision of Judge Bain on application for a writ of habeas corpus will amount to much. The counsel for the defense assailed the evidence, which they held did not connect the prisoner in any manner with the murder of Cronin, or prove that Burke knew Cronin, or had any malice against him. The prosecution contended that the evidence made a clear enough case to justify the extradition. Judge Bain held that a sufficient case had been made out. He committed Burke to jail to await extradition. The full court, he said, was now sitting, and he could be brought before them immediately on application for writ of habeas corpus. An application will be made to the department of justice at Ottawa for this extradition, but the prisoner will be given fifteen days' grace in which to appear from Judge Bain's decision.

CONGO RAILROAD SCHEME. King Leopold Favors It—Huntington Invests a Half Million. [Special to the Capital Journal.] NEW YORK, July 11.—A special from Rome says King Leopold urges the construction of a railroad throughout the new Congo. He gives as his reason that it is the best way to suppress slavery. Another special alleges upon authority of the Catholic News of Rome that C. P. Huntington has offered to invest half a million dollars in the scheme of building the Congo railroad.

Kilrain Is Badly Bruised. LITTLE ROCK, Ark., July 11.—Kilrain's party passed through Little Rock yesterday evening. They were passengers on the Iron mountain train from the south, en route to St. Louis. Kilrain was very sick, and from all appearance was badly used up. The fact that he was sore from ring punishment could not be better illustrated than by noticing him when he attempted to put on his coat. This was difficult, and was not accomplished without the assistance of Mitchell, who carefully helped him on with it. Mitchell was not careful enough and when the coat was being pulled on it was noticed that the pugilist flinched as if in great pain. He was finally supported by big, fat pillows, being wearied of the ride from New Orleans. His face was discolored and resembled mahogany more than anything else, while his left eye was black and blue, and just under his right eye he wore a cut in the shape of a crescent, and that optic was also highly discolored.

Albany Points. ALBANY, July 11.—The city tax collector is now on his annual rounds. The value of the taxable property of the city, indebtedness within the city being deducted, is \$1,640,000.00. The levy is seven mills and the tax to be collected will be about \$8,148. Wm. Hoag, vice-president of the Oregon Pacific railroad, was in the city yesterday and went to the front with Mr. Antonelle, the contractor, who has just commenced work on the eastern extension. Now that the Fourth is past the annual exodus to the mountains and to the seaside has commenced.

Floods in New York. JOHNSTOWN, N. Y., July 11.—The water which had stood over the village since last night was subsiding all day yesterday. Desolation is everywhere. The water rose fifteen feet and overflowed everything. The sudden flood was the result of a water spout or cloud burst. Ten people working on a bridge were washed down the stream 500 yards. The New York Central track was washed away, also telegraph wires all torn down, and service prostrated.

Quiet at Hayti. WASHINGTON, July 10.—A dispatch has been received at the navy department from Admiral Gherady at Port au Prince saying that affairs at Hayti are quiet. There is no fighting of moment. It is also reported that there has been no change in the political situation. Legitimate holds Port au Prince. Hypolite remains outside of the town. Fifteen Persons Drowned. AMSTERDAM, N. Y., July 10.—It is now reported that fifteen persons were drowned at Johnstown, N. Y. There is no telegraphic communication between this city and Johnstown, but the associated press has sent reporters from Albany, Utica and Schenectady. Violence Among Strikers. CHICAGO, July 11.—More violence is reported among the Blue Island strikers. Yesterday evening seven strikers brutally assaulted workers, two of whom were seriously injured.
