Coming To Oregon.

John E. Shepherd, the representative of Oregon immigration board at San Francisco, is in Portland on a brief visit. "Immigration at present, though steady," says he, "is not very heavy. The indications, however, are that immigration will be very large again this fall. At present from 500 to 600 immigrants bound for Oregon and Washington territory leave San Francisco each week. Most of them come from the East over the Union Pacific, but a great many also come from Southern California. There is scarcely any immigration to Southern California and things are pretty dull there. In Los Angeles and Pasadena, and also in other cities, the largest hotels are closed. In my opinion the next few years will witness an immigration to Oregon and Washington territory that will surprise people."
