Another Horribly Mutilated
Victim at Whitechapel.

MORE LAWLESSNESS IN OKLAHOMA.

Fire Bugs Make Another Attempt to
Burn Seattle.

Associated Press Party.
SAN FRANCISCO, July 16.—A tele-
gram received to-day states that the
Associated Press party, which was
expected to leave for the Pacific
coast this week, has been postponed,
owing to the fact that it was not
possible to arrange for so large a
party within the time allotted.

The annual meeting of the West-
ern Associated Press occurs in De-
troit to-morrow, and it is probable
that an invitation will be telegraph-
ed by the State board of trade to the
Western Associated Press and the
New York Associated Press, em-
bracing every leading paper in the
country, to decide upon a date and
visit the coast at any time in the
future.

More Fire Bugs.
SPOKANE FALLS, W. T., July 16.
—Fire bugs have made numerous
attempts of late to burn the city.
This morning a frame structure con-
taining 1000 gallons of kerosene, in
the rear of a large warehouse, was
set fire by an incendiary, and but
for the prompt action of the fire de-
partment, the city would have been
in great peril, as the block is com-
posed of frame structures in the
heart of the city. A vigilance com-
mittee was organized this morning
composed of leading business and
professional men.

"Jack the Ripper."
LONDON, July 16.—The commu-
nity has been greatly startled by an-
other horrible murder, thought to
have been committed by that butch-
er of fallen women, known as
"Jack the Ripper." The body of a
woman, mutilated in the usual
frightful manner, was found to-day
in Castle Alley in the Whitechapel
district. Although the police have
used every means to apprehend the
murderer, no trace of him has yet
been found.

A Disastrous Train Wreck.
LA PASO, Tex., July 16.—Word
has reached here that a freight
wreck occurred near Sierra Blanco
last night on the Galveston, Har-
risburg & San Antonio railway.
Three cars loaded with ties were set
in motion while switching for a
freight to pass, and, it being down
grade, they rushed into the freight
train. The engineer and fireman
of the freight were badly injured.
The engine and five cars were com-
pletely wrecked.

Lawlessness in Oklahoma.
TOPEKA, Kan., July 16.—Infor-
mation has been received at the
office of United States attorney of
the killing of Robert Dalton, a
deputy United States marshal, in
Oklahoma, on Sunday afternoon.
Dalton was in the act of arresting
Lee West, a notorious criminal, for
being a "moonshiner," or whisky
peddler. Before Dalton expired he
shot West, killing him instantly.
