A MAN FATALLY SHOT.

A Nightwatchman at Pendleton Shoots a Tramp.

AN INTERNATIONAL EXPOSITION.

A Rejected Laver Throws Himself on a Circular Saw.

A Tramp Fatally Shot.

PENDLETON, July 17.—Night-watchman Durham surprised a number of tramps attempting to break into a building Monday night. On his approach they fled. He commanded a halt. They didn't halt worth a cent, and he fired three shots. One shot took effect in the region of the kidneys in one man who will probably die. Durham surrendered to the authorities, was charged with assault with a dangerous weapon, and held in the sum of \$1000 for appearance Monday night. Bail was immediately furnished and Durham resumed his duties.

A Peculiar Fatality.

LINCOLN, Neb., July 17.—Four men lost their lives in this city this afternoon under peculiar circumstances. A watch was dropped in a cesspool, and the men were endeavoring to recover it. They had dug a large hole at the side of the pool, and this hole was filled with water by rain. One man stood on a ladder above the water and made an opening into the cesspool, and the foul air and gas rushed out and overcame him, and he fell into the water. A friend went to give him aid and was likewise overcome. Others came to help, and one by one seven men fell into the water, which was full of muck and lime from the vault. Three were rescued, some by men who afterwards perished in attempting to save the others.

Brutally Murdered.

DUBUQUE, Ia., July 17.—John Elkins and wife were brutally murdered last night on their farm in Elk township, Clayton county, this state. Elkin's second son, a boy of eleven, by a former wife, slept in the barn, and states that he was awakened about three o'clock by a rifle shot. Going into the house, a fearful sight met his eyes. His father was lying dead on the bed, with a bullet through his brain, and his wife was also on the bed with her head smashed in. The baby was still sleeping, the boy says, between them. Grasping the baby, he made his way to the neighbors and gave the alarm.

From Gilliam County.

ARLINGTON, July 17.—A cutting affray took place at Condon last Monday forenoon over a dispute about the price of a horse. Dan Rinehart, son of G. W. Rinehart, was seriously, though not fatally hurt by Brick Baldwin, son of J. C. Baldwin, the horse dealer. It seems Rinehart had bought a horse of Baldwin, and agreed to pay a certain sum for him. A settlement was had, and they disagreed with the above result. Baldwin has been bound over in the sum of \$1200 to appear before the grand jury.

A Peculiar Suicide.

BREWTON, Ala., July 17.—A stranger named Gaston committed suicide here to-day by throwing himself upon a circular saw in the saw mill. He was killed instantly. From papers found upon his person it was learned that his home was in Iowa. It is thought that the cause was disappointment in love, as he had a letter indicating that an engagement between himself and a Miss Smith, of Des Moines, Iowa, had been broken.

Alleged Salt Trust.

NEW YORK, July 17.—Speaking of the alleged salt trust, Franklin Woodruff of Brooklyn, one of the largest salt dealers in this section of country, denies that a trust has yet been formed. "Capital of \$20,000,000 is not needed to start with," he said, "and whether \$5,000,000 will be subscribed by English capitalists is more than anyone can say."

A Boy's Long Journey.

POMONA, July 17.—Edmund Wilkins, a boy of nine years, whose parents reside in Pomona, arrived to-day from Lincolnshire, England. He made the 6000 miles alone. His uncle planned a tag upon the boy's coat, giving directions for the journey. The boy brought \$300 in gold with him safely.

Many Horses Burned.

LOWELL, Mass., July 17.—The large stable of the Lowell horse railroad was burned to-night, together with 120 horses, four cars and much grain. The loss is about \$150,000.

Two Men Killed.

SHAMOKIN, Pa., July 17.—This evening a train on the Pennsylvania road carrying miners to their homes was wrecked near this place. John Roush, married, and Aaron Shippe, single, were killed. Twenty others were more or less injured.

An International Exposition.

NEW YORK, July 17.—Mayor Grant has issued a request to half a thousand of the most prominent men in this part of the country, representing over \$1,500,000,000, asking them to be present at a conference of representative citizens to consider the advisability of holding an international exposition in this city in 1892, and to arrange for the preliminary work, if it is deemed advisable. The meeting is to be held on the afternoon of the 25th inst.

A Candidate For Appointment.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 17.—Commander D. W. Mullan, who was in command of the U. S. S. Nipsic at Samoa during the trouble between the Germans and natives last December and January, and who also saved the Nipsic from destruction at the time of the hurricane in Apia harbor last March, will leave this city to-morrow to report to the navy department at Washington.

Mullan is an applicant for the position of chief of the bureau of equipment and recruiting, to be vacated by Commodore Schley in October.

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.

Shellock, Iowa, was totally destroyed by fire July 17th.

Six hundred freight handlers have made a strike for eight hours' work and more pay.

Comodore Slavin of New York has gone to Paris to complete a contract for the completion of the Panama canal.

The Russ House of Fresno, Cal., was totally destroyed by fire on the morning of July 17th. This was a large three-story hotel and the loss is estimated at from thirty to forty thousand dollars.

The supreme court of California has reversed the decision of Judge Sullivan in the famous Sarah Althea Sharon Terry case. The decision discloses the question as to what constitutes marriage, and virtually decides that the relations between the plaintiff and Sharon were not such as constitute marriage. The cause was remanded for a new trial.
