MURDER WILL OUT. A Mysterious Tragedy Being Unearthed. KILLED BY THE KICK OF A HORSE. The Gold Brick Dodge Successfully Worked on a Banker.

The Johnstown Sufferers. JOHNSTOWN, Pa., July 18.—The distribution of the \$500,000 which the state commission said should be made to the flood sufferers, began to-day. Judge Cumming will take the district by wards to enable him to handle the matter systematically. The treasurer of the commission will be ready to cash the drafts as issued, if required. The disposition of the funds already disposed of is still the subject of comment, and yesterday a gentleman presented to the Johnstown finance committee a telegram from James Gordon Bennett demanding an accounting for the New York Herald fund, amounting to about \$25,000. The Johnstown committee claim that the claim is unwarrantable. It is hardly to be expected that actual misappropriations will be shown, but the belief is general that there has been extensive carelessness.

Notes From the Capital. WASHINGTON, July 18.—Walker Bialne returned this morning from Bar Harbor and reports his father quite well. The postmaster-general to-day opened the proposals for furnishing the postoffice department with postal cards for four years, beginning October 1st next. Twelve bids were submitted, and a material reduction in the price from the present contract, was obtained.

The Whitechapel Murder. LONDON, July 18.—At the inquest on the body of a woman murdered in Whitechapel yesterday the fact was developed that there were sixteen wounds in the body.

A Murderer Arrested. SPOKANE FALLS, July 28.—Michael Sebald was brought here from Moscow, Idaho, by the chief of police of this city, who arrested him for the murder of his former employer, Thomas Fallon, May 24, 1887. Fallon at that time was the proprietor of the Montana Exchange saloon in this city. Sebald was his bartender. Sebald and Fallon's wife became quite intimate and were frequently seen out at night together. On the night of the 24th of May, 1887, they were out late, and about an hour after they had returned to the saloon a shot was heard and Fallon was found in the back room dead. An inquest was held and the verdict was suicide, but murder was strongly suspected. Five days later Sebald and Mrs. Fallon were married, and went to California, where she died suddenly. He returned, claimed Fallon's property and went to Idaho. Chief of Police Warren has been working up the case since October, and has just got evidence to warrant the arrest of the man. Sebald is now in jail awaiting his examination, which will occur Monday.

A Farmer Killed. OREGON CITY, Or., July 18.—Elias Edwards, a farmer living five miles south of town, was killed last night by the kick of a horse. He had been working in the harvest field during the afternoon, and was watering his horses when one—a three-year-old colt—is supposed to have kicked him. He walked about twelve rods up the hill to a small gate, and called to his brother-in-law that he was hurt. He was helped to the house and in fifteen minutes he was dead. Several ribs were found to be broken on the right side, but death is supposed to have been caused by internal injuries. He was an exemplary neighbor and citizen.

The Gold Brick Dodge. LANSING, Mich., July 18.—A sharper named Streeter worked the gold brick dodge to a successful issue here last night, upon William McKellops, a wealthy gentleman of Perry, Shiawassee county, and president of the First National bank of Corunna.

An appointment was made last night and as a result McKellops was made the owner of two supposed gold bricks, valued at \$20,000, and the sharper was richer by \$4000. When McKellops' grandson was shown the bricks the fraud was discovered.

A Missing Husband. SACRAMENTO, July 18.—On May 8th last Joseph N. Bates, a carpenter of this city, left his wife and four children and \$250 in the bank to their order. He told them that he was going to Seattle to better his health, and that when he found a suitable place he would send for them. Since then he has not been heard from, and Mrs. Bates thinks her husband was burned to death in a hotel in the Seattle fire.

Affairs at Johnstown. JOHNSTOWN, Pa., July 18.—Two unidentified bodies were recovered to-day. One hundred of the two-story houses which Contractor Hughes has engaged to make were allotted to-day, and he will begin work at once. He expects to complete about ten houses a day.

Articles of Incorporation. Articles of incorporation were filed before the secretary of state as follows: The Springwater Presbyterian church of Clackamas county, Or., with James A. Shibley, Wm. J. Lewellen, G. Cunningham, Sam'l. H. Perry and J. F. Myers trustees. The amount on hand at present is \$500 and the sources of revenue are the voluntary contributions of the members.

Lone Rock association of the Methodist Episcopal church, with R. M. Johnson, L. L. Nielsen, J. Henshaw and D. Hable, as trustees and incorporators. The amount in hand is \$300 and the sources of revenues are the contributions of the public.

The volcanoes of Western Washington have been in action so recently that it is a question whether Baker Rainier and others are to be classed as extinct or active volcanoes. East of the Cascades, around Lake Chelan and Okanogan, is to-day a region of changing level and almost continuous earthquake trembling.

It is proposed that in the new city of Ellensburg not more than two dram shops shall be allowed to each block. One would be too many.
