A Destructive Storm

A Terrible Cloudburst in West Virginia.

THE ENCAMPMENT OF THE G. A. R.
Great Destruction of Wheat by Fire in Polk County.

A Terrible Disaster.

PARKERSBURG, W. Va., July 19.—The greatest disaster which ever befell the Little Kanawha valley came last night in the shape of a terrible cloudburst, which completely flooded the country, destroying many lives, carrying off thousands of dollars' worth of property, and ruining the crops for miles around.

The worst of the storm was on the lower side of the Kanawha. In three hours the Kanawha was raised six feet and ran with such velocity that it carried everything before it.

In the valley all of the fences and much stock were lost.

At Chesterfield, a small town about ten miles above here, half the residences were washed off bodily and left in a corn field. In the Clay district a fine church and three dwellings were wrecked. Several steamers on the river were wrecked.

The worst story of all comes from Morristown, a small village near the head of Tucker's creek, where the cloudburst was concentrated in all its fury, coming down on the village about midnight and totally destroying it, with many of its people. The first report gave the loss at eleven, but later news seems to fix it at a greater number. Houses are said to have been picked up and hurled against each other in such a short space of time that no chance to escape was possible.

It is impossible to estimate the loss, even here, as the river is still rising and tearing everything loose. A house-boat containing three or four persons went out during the night, and it is believed that all are lost.

Grain Fires in Polk County.

INDEPENDENCE, July 19.—Three hundred acres of wheat belonging to A. Nelson and the O'Bryon Bros., below Independence, was this afternoon destroyed by fire.

Fire is raging below Dixie, and it is rumored that several houses are on fire. One thousand acres or more have been burned over, and the Eola hills are now on fire.
