Salem Buildings.

OCCIDENTAL JOTTINGS.

The salmon canning season will begin about the first of August.

A large number of Tacoma and Astoria men are filing on Tillamook county timber claims.

Water in Snake river is so low that navigation is seriously interfered with.

The buildings and machinery of the Huronian gold mine, near Port Arthur, have been destroyed by fire.

Preparations have been made for erecting one mile of brick buildings in the burnt district at Ellensburg.

A fire at McMinnville destroyed a new threshing separator for Jerome Derby, besides burning up a large quantity of grain.

J. R. Byron of Polk county is the oldest man in Oregon. It is said that he lives until September 25, he will be one hundred years old.

It is reported that in excavating for the piers of the new bridge across the Santiam, a bed of the best quality of coal was discovered one day last week.

The report of the committee of fire adjusters declare that the city of Seattle is to blame for having an insufficient water supply and an untrained fire department.

There seems to be no end of fires this season. From nearly every part of Oregon and Washington Territory comes reports of fires, doing damage to timber, grain and land.

Five freight cars just completed, each of twenty tons capacity, for the Astoria and South Coast railway company, are being loaded with rails at St. Louis, Mo., for the A. and S. C. R. R.
