They are not disturbed by the tramp of progress, their blood pulsates free and their eyes sparkle when in the midst of the stir and whirl of progress.

Mr. Webb evidently fully realizes the advantages and benefits to Salem and Marion county that will come from the building of a motor line from Salem to Silverton; he sees in this a continuous village between these two points; a densely populated district of gardens and orchards, sending out train loads of fruits and vegetables to distant markets. Fruit and vegetable canneries giving employment to hundreds of busy hands. He sees with the coming of the busy through new industries springing up; varied employment to now idle hands; our fair city keeping pace with the advancing tide of progress; her broad streets echoing with the tread of a busy populace.

We want no surly dogs in the manger, no creeping sloths on the track, no mossbacks clogging the way but we want liberality, life and push infused into every department of business with such a spirit so that soon Salem and Marion county will be known as the "Garden Spot of the World."

Fall into the procession, put your shoulder to the wheel, this is not a time to sleep and no place for laggards; the future is assured; let the doubting Thomases and the lovers of ease fall in the rear while progress and prosperity reign supreme.

Sad Accident.

Last night some gentleman from Fairfield arrived in this city to procure a casket for the nine-year-old son of David Hess, who was crushed to death yesterday afternoon by a water tank falling on him. Mr. Carr, a gentleman near Fairfield, was hauling water for a steam engine which was running a threshing, and when he started for some water this little boy climbed on the tank and as Mr. Carr passed the house, he asked the lady where they got the water, and she told him the boy would show him, and they then went to the river, which is a very difficult place to get water. After filling the tank they started to leave the river, and the gentleman remarked that if he could get out without an accident he would never come back there again, but the wagon tipped over, and the tank full of water fell on this little boy, killing him instantly. His neck, arm, leg and two ribs were broken. The tank was taken off of the boy, but he was then dead. The funeral took place this afternoon. The gentleman arrived in this city about two o'clock last night, bringing the sad news with them.

Large Wool Shipment.

In conversation with a prominent wool grower, says the Baker City Democrat, it is learned that large consignments of wool were arriving daily and being shipped to eastern markets. Since the middle of June over \$100,000 have been paid out for wool. The Democrat further says that a wool exchange has long been needed. The exorbitant rates charged in the large cities for storage, and especially when it is held for any length of time, works a hardship on the producer. Mr. Heilner sold 600 bales of wool averaging 825 pounds, to eastern parties at from 15 to 20 cents per pound. The gentleman handles wool on commission or pays the cash for it.

A Satisfying Place.

Up at Spokane Falls the weather is very unpleasant, almost hot enough to roast eggs; there is no let up even when the evening shades begin to fall, but the heat continues right along. The water is bad, the climate is bad and it is not a very desirable place to live. Why people select such places to spend the short life that is allotted to man is a mystery. Why not come down in the valley of the Willamette where pure fresh air, cool water, cool nights, refreshing and invigorating breezes are the order of the day?

ONE MORE REASON

Why Oregon is the Best Place For the Actual Settler.

When a man comes here and settles down to business either in field, shop or store, he does not have to depend on eastern money, as the California boomers did, for their support, for right at his back, in front, and in every direction is spread out a rich country that produces everything that mortal man desires, and that too in the greatest abundance. Frank Pixley, a noted Californian, and a man who has traveled all over the eastern states and from the Atlantic to the Pacific, has his say about Oregon, which is as follows: "One of the incidents that will remain longest and most pleasantly in my mind will be the trip to Oregon. Oregon is more beautiful than California. * * * Oregon produces apples superior to any that come to our market; they are hard, crisp, luscious and juicy; plums, pears, prunes, potatoes, roots of all kinds, grains of all the coarser varieties, onions and other vegetables were presented at several of the villages through which we passed. We saw most excellent and well-cared corn. Oregon ought to be, and we believe is, a first-class dairy state. It is a country of grass from the beds of its creeks to the summits of its hills—of rich, nutritious grasses, with strong sod, that never dies down under the burning sun; grasses that must be cut, dried, turned to hay, and covered from rain to carry the milking stock through the winter. The grasses of Oregon are like those of New York—timothy, red top, herds grass and clover—and by reason of the frequent rains, crops of great abundance are produced. We can imagine no better country for the production of stall-fed beef, as hay, oats, grains and cattle feed of all kinds are cheap and abundant.

"There is a vast wealth of profit to the Oregon farmer if he will send us his butter and cheese, his chickens and eggs, his apples and cider, and all the lesser productions of his industry in good and cleanly condition. There ought to be no device of cheese making practical in Switzerland or France that the Oregon farmer could not improve; there ought to be no trick in butter making that the Oregon dairymen does not understand. There is a fortune to be made in fat chickens and barn yard fowls, for, as a rule, our chickens are lean and unfit to eat. We import cider in bottles from New Jersey, and make it from dried apples with acids. We should get it fresh and pure from Oregon orchards. The average Oregon sheep is, we think, better bred, larger and finer-fleeced than our California flocks; at all events they look cleaner and more comfortable on their green meadows than on our brown, dusty plains. There are no large landed estates in Oregon, so far as we know; at all events, the country through which we passed is divided into small holdings, and the farms look as though they were occupied and tilled by the men and women who owned them.

"Oregon seems to supplement all that California lacks, and each state appears to the other a market in which to exchange its productions. Oregon should supply California with hams and bacon, as the country seems admirably adapted for the raising of swine, and its climate is better than ours for curing pork.

"There is no rigorous climate in Oregon, and though its grander mountain ranges, with their loftier peaks wrapped in mantles of eternal snows present a landscape that is most attractive, there is very little ice or snow in the lower valleys. Cattle unhoused do very well during the winter months, and sheep unsheltered during lambing time do not yield to the inclement season. Water is, of course, abundant, for Oregon is a country of frequent rains, and abounds in rivulets, brooks and larger streams. In every part of Oregon, in the lesser and greater valleys, all are abundantly supplied with living streams of the kind that furnish constant ample power for running all kinds of mills and machinery. Sawmills, flouring-mills, woolen-mills abound, furnishing cheap dwellings, cheap food and cheap clothing and bedding. Oregon is a safer country in which to farm, and offers more attractions than California."

Articles of Incorporation. Articles of incorporation were filed with the secretary of state as follows: The Pacific Medicine Company of Albany, Or., with Geo. W. Gray, J. B. Hughes, W. H. Rowland and Peter Hume as incorporators. The capital stock is \$3,000, divided into shares of \$10 each. The principal office is in Albany.

Sale of Longnecker. Yesterday R. B. Duncan sold his famous bay gelding racer, Longnecker, at a handsome figure to a recent arrival from Germany.

OCCIDENTAL JOTTINGS.

The land office at Yakima has been allowed two additional clerks.

Portland claims to have the toniest and finest appearing Salvation army on the coast.

Several fire brick stores are now being built in Corvallis, which indicates a healthy feeling in that city.

The Washington Press association is in receipt of an invitation from Mayor Wheelwright to hold its coming meeting at Tacoma, and has accepted.

A little child of J. M. Hamlin of Wallula was burned to death one day last week. The child attempted to light the fire with coal oil with the usual result.

H. C. Beck, while intoxicated at Pendleton, broke into the house of Mrs. Howells, his mother-in-law, severely choked her and fled. He has not yet been captured.

On July 1, 1887, the deposits in the Bank of Pullman were \$80,000; in 1888 they were \$14,000; while this year they are \$41,000, or over five times what they were in 1887.

A slaughter house and cold storage system, with a capacity of 100 sheep, 100 cattle and 100 hogs, and employing a large number of men is about to be erected in the vicinity of Tacoma. A glue factory will be run in connection with it.

While Charley Caldwell of Walla Walla, was tacking lath on the residence of Henry Frazier, in South Milton, a portion of the scaffold gave way, and he was precipitated to the floor below, a distance of twelve feet. His left leg was broken and the ankle thrown out of joint.

Seattle is overrun with carpenters from the east who started for the city immediately after the fire, thinking there would be plenty of work. Owing to the fact that the business portion of the city will be rebuilt with brick and stone, there is not much work for carpenters at present.

The Sulphur springs in Benton county, about eight miles from Corvallis, it is said are becoming a very popular resort. It is claimed that the sulphur water has performed some cures, and has been of great benefit to invalids who have gone there to recuperate. The water is strongly impregnated with sulphur and is said to be equal to the White Sulphur springs in Virginia.

There is trouble over the fire department at Tacoma, owing to the council providing for a paid department.

Dr. T. J. Dean has recently located a mining claim in the mountains above the lake about six miles from Joseph. A test of the ledge matter shows it to be free-milling, and there are at least 5000 tons of ore in sight.

The Benton Leader says the sort of booming that tells is when big brick stores are going up. People may sometimes talk humbly, but they don't put money in brick stores without confidence in the place.

The dry weather in Eastern Oregon has burnt up the crops. After all there is no place like the Willamette Valley. It has fewer disasters than any other part of the world. Its crops never fail. Its climate is good. Its soil is rich.

The city of Eugene has for some time been lighted with incandescent light, but now the electric light company are making a proposition to light the streets with arc lights, because the others are not so good a light.
