SHOCKING DEPRAVITY

A Child Sacrificed to an Alleged Messiah.

A HOOSIER FASTED FORTY DAYS.

English Wool Admitted Practically Duty Free.

A Negro Child Sacrificed.

SAVANNAH, July 24.—A child sacrificed to a pseudo Messiah, who has been working among the negroes of Liberty county, has just been discovered in a remote part of that county. The child is black. Its throat is cut and its ears missing. The negroes are possessed of a religious craze, created by Orth's or Bell's preaching, and will believe that the parents did the killing. They are disciples of the false Christ who preached frequently of human sacrifice. The coroner is investigating and the negroes are in a lamentable state of religious frenzy. Edward James, who has been acting as leader of the congregation since Orth was sent to the asylum ten days ago, appears before an audience almost perfectly nude when he preaches.

Mrs. Heron Not in Danger.
WASHINGTON, July 24.—D. T. Allen, secretary of the Korean embassy called at the state department this morning and talked with Acting Secretary Wharton about the case of Mrs. Hattie G. Heron, the missionary reported to be under sentence of death for preaching the doctrines of Christianity in Korea. Dr. Allen stated to Wharton his entire disbelief of the story. Even if the lady had been charged with the offense, she would be under the jurisdiction of the consular courts, and the emperor, except by the exercise of arbitrary power, could not order her execution.

An Aged Crank.
INDIANAPOLIS, July 24.—Robert Marvel, aged eighty-five years, of Pike township, has completed the fortieth day of his abstinence from food and drink. Hundreds of curious people from all parts of the country have visited his house, and the medical fraternity have thoroughly awakened to the marvelous nature of the case.

Dr. Hasby says that this marvelous fast is even more wonderful than that of Dr. Tanner's. Marvel is growing quite weak, and owing to his age the probability is that he cannot survive much longer.

The Samoan Treaty.
NEW YORK, July 24.—The Herald prints a special from Washington this morning to the effect that the Samoan treaty may be rejected by the senate, on the ground that Phelps and Kasson sacrificed their country's interests to their personal interests, both wishing to get a foreign mission and desiring to accomplish something definite. The Herald declares that the United States commissioners were outwitted by Bismarck, but does not point out any specific instances.

English Wool.
SAN FRANCISCO, July 24.—A special from Pittsburgh says: At the suggestion of the surveyor of the port of Philadelphia, the Pittsburgh appraisers have decided to admit English wool at 10 cents per pound, instead of 30 or 60 cents, according to classification, as heretofore. This will make English wool cheaper than American, and raises fears that the local wool industry will be ruined.

A New Knapsack.
WASHINGTON, July 24.—A knapsack by which the weight of the burden carried is transferred to the hip from the shoulders, has been under trial by the authorities of the war department. So favorable have been the reports received from the ordnance bureau has been ordered to manufacture 2000 of them for use in the army.

Literary Money Forfeited.
CHICAGO, July 24.—Mrs. Lena Lurie last week filed a complaint in the circuit court claiming a half interest in a lottery ticket which won \$15,000, and to-day State's Attorney Longenecker filed information demanding the forfeiture of the entire amount to the state, under the statute prohibiting gambling in lottery tickets.

A Large Grain Fleet.
SAN FRANCISCO, July 24.—For the cereal year ending 30, 1889, there were loaded and cleared from San Francisco 281 sailing vessels with flour and grain. This is ninety-three more than for the previous year. Most of these vessels were laden with wheat and cleared for Europe. There were three full cargoes of barley to New York, four full cargoes of wheat for Rio de Janeiro, three to Callas and one to Valparaiso, and six full cargoes of wheat, one of barley and one of wheat and oats to Australia, and one cargo of flour to Hong Kong. The other 290 vessels took flour and grain to Europe. These 291 vessels went out under charters varying from 10s to 43s 6d.

A Tragedy in High Life.
COPENHAGEN, July 24.—A great sensation has been caused in the highest circles by the suicide of Count Sparre, a member of a prominent Swiss family, after he had killed his mistress. Count Sparre had been carrying on a liaison with Elvira Madegan, a circus performer on the island of Tansigne, and becoming involved in a quarrel with his mistress, drew a pistol, shot her and then shot himself. Count Sparre was married and his wife moved in the most aristocratic circles in Copenhagen.

Railroad Officials Arrested.
NEW ORLEANS, July 24.—A special agent for the state of Mississippi came here this morning from Baton Rouge, having an order from Governor Nichols in response to the requisition from Governor Lowry, of Mississippi, for the arrest and delivery of R. Carroll and Edward L. Tyler, railroad officers. They will be arraigned at Purvis on the charge of aiding and abetting the recent prize-fight.

Given Up For Lost.
SAN FRANCISCO, July 24.—News from Oonakaska, by the steamer Bertha, confirms the recent reports of the loss of three whaling schooners, James A. Hamilton, Otho and Annie. No trace of them has been seen in the Arctic, and it is generally believed they are lost. The vessels carried about sixty officers and men.

To Take Up Land.
A number of citizens of South Salem have gone to take up land on the Siuslaw river. There were at least six of them, and they all will take up a section or more of land before returning to this city.

Too Cut Off.
This morning about 9 o'clock a Chinaman by the name of "Yot" had the misfortune to cut his big toe so badly that it was necessary to have it amputated. Dr. Hall performed the operation and the Celestial was taken to the Chinese restaurant on Liberty street. He was cutting wood for Mr. E. Snell, about two miles south of this city.

The Japanese.
In listening to a recent lecture on Japan and the customs of the country, one of the audience was heard to remark that he did not see why we should not ask them to send us a few missionaries and see if they could not improve our manners a little, and also our morals. Their religion may need looking after, but they are said to be extremely kind and gentle with their horses and dumb animals, which certainly could not be said of Americans of the present day, or the society with the extended appellation would not be kept so busy.

The Japanese are exceedingly polite and have a great respect for the aged of all classes. Children of the higher families are sent to school in plain clothes that the poorer ones may not feel the difference. The stores in Japan are not locked, neither are the houses, which shows them to be honest. A man may leave his fruit stand and go about town and make a few calls, and go back to his place of business, knowing that everything is just as he left it. Or should any customers wish to purchase his wares they make their own change from the small pieces of money that the proprietor has left in sight in case of such an occurrence. On the whole, it seems that they are far ahead of us in many things.—Boston Traveler.
