Will Be Settled Soon.

In speaking of the false alarm and water works test Superintendent Martin of the Salem water company said to a JOURNAL reporter that the only solution to the water problem was the construction of a series of cisterns, as the fire boys had their hearts set upon such and nothing short of cisterns would satisfy them. And to such end he said he would donate \$50 with others toward the construction of the first cistern. This may all be very well, but the JOURNAL does not think the firemen of Salem are crying for cisterns nor that they will not be satisfied until cisterns are provided. They have \$2500 worth of fine apparatus and what they want is water—and lots of it—no matter whence it comes.

The council meets on Tuesday evening and it is probable that at that time an effort will be made to make some disposition of the water question. It is possible another test may be deemed advisable, in which case the result will be anxiously looked for and carefully reported by the JOURNAL.

Lively On the Oregon Pacific.

Sheriff Croisan yesterday afternoon returned from Galesville, on the Oregon Pacific, where he had been to conduct the attachment sale of Fleischner, Mayer & Co., of the property of Searl & Dean which had been levied upon. This personal property was bid in at \$1300 by the plaintiffs and the will dispose of it at private prices.

Sheriff Croisan says work is being pushed on the contract of Antonelli & Doe, who have a large force of men on the front. Everything is moving along nicely and all reports of cessation of work on the eastward extension are canards. In the vicinity of the tunnel all is activity. This is at the summit and there will be much blasting, for which purpose fifteen tons of giant powder lie at Galesville.

Mail for Yaquina Bay.

The people of Yaquina Bay are put to great inconvenience by the failure of the mail between Salem and Bay points to arrive the same day as sent. In conversation with a JOURNAL reporter on the subject, the business men of Newport were one voice in a request that something be done to better their mail facilities. As the matter now stands four days are required in which to write to Newport and receive a reply. As trains make close connections at Albany each day this should not be. Passengers can make the trip in two days and mail should not be slower. Letters mailed in Salem for the eleven a. m. train do not connect at Albany for Yaquina, as is generally supposed, but lie in Albany until the next day. As yet mail accommodations on the Oregon Pacific are crude, and in sore need of improvement.

These birds increase very rapidly and the fields will soon be alive with them.

A BIG FIRE AT DALLAS.

A Quarter Block Burned Last Night—Loss \$12,000.

Dallas, the county seat of Polk county, barely escaped total destruction by fire at an early hour this morning. Shortly after one o'clock fire was discovered in the rear of the bank building and the alarm bell was quickly sounded. By the time the hand engine could be brought upon the scene the flames were leaping high and it was evident a great conflagration was to result. Some who first saw the fire think it had origin in the bakery, while others think it started in the rear of Crider Bros' grocery store. But by the time aid arrived the flames had made such progress that it was impossible to locate the scene of the origin.

The engine worked well and with a will, but the water supply was soon exhausted and the fire burned until it had exhausted itself or was checked by the brick fire walls on adjoining sides. The fire was kept from spreading only by hard work, as the lots back of the burned business houses were covered with cord wood, boxes, lumber and rubbish.

Among those who sustained losses were the following: Crider Bros., stock and building \$9000, insurance \$1000; bank, fixtures; J. D. Ellis, building \$1500, no insurance; Lawton, barber shop, \$200; J. C. Hayter, loss \$500; postoffice, loss by removal, \$200; Fenton & Truitt, damage, \$200; Faulk & Nies, hardware, \$1500; insurance \$500. There were several other losses, which will make a total of nearly \$15,000.

This seems to be an unfortunate year for fires and while the larger cities are being destroyed around us, the smaller ones are no less unfortunate. The origin of the Dallas fire is not known.

The Motor Line.

When speaking of the objections raised by certain persons to the motor line being allowed to traverse the streets of Salem, Seth R. Hammer voiced a popular sentiment when he said: "A few object. That should be expected, for there are always some who think the town sufficiently large. They are afraid competition will get in and drive them away from the grass, and they will have to go hungry or rustle, and they hate like the devil to rustle." He further says: "Give us motor lines or any other railroad lines through half the streets or more if they want, for they will rustle up the business. They have my permission to lay a double track on Court street with side tracks, switches, depots, etc., etc. Bring on the railroads or any other good road."

In speaking on the same subject Capt. Pratt said if the motor line wanted to pass his door he would not object to its passing on his side of the street even. Why, really, these objections to granting a franchise to the motor line are not just. The city turns in and gives the street car line a franchise to lay their tracks in the center of the finest, busiest streets. Salem wants the motor line and it should be permitted to run where it chooses.

A Salomite Abroad.

The Omaha Daily World-Herald of July 23d has the following compliment for a citizen of Salem, who is at present in Nebraska: "Prof. M. V. Rork of Salem, Or., who officiated as an instructor in York county's institute, which closed last Friday, and who proved the most powerful instructor that ever taught in the county, delivered a discourse at the opera house Sunday on 'The Immorality of Religious Error.' He talked for two hours, and every word uttered was appropriate and fell with the weight of sledge-hammer blows."

The Willamette Valley.

The St. Paul Journal of Commerce, whose representative was in the valley several weeks ago, writes up the country in a pointed, pushing, discerning manner, showing that he understood the situation, as the following extracts from the paper's issue of July 20th, indicate: "The Willamette valley is the principal valley in Oregon, and comprises the wealthiest portion of the state. There are four principal cities in this valley—Salem, the capital of the state; Albany, Eugene and Corvallis, all located on the Willamette river."

Quint Guthrie, the fireman who was so badly burnt in the railroad accident at Albany Sunday, is improving nicely and hopes of his complete recovery are entertained. He is at Portland, where the best medical attendants are in constant service.

News of the River.

The Modoc came down the river from Albany yesterday evening. She was delayed ten hours on the Eola bar. She left for Portland last night.

The government snag boat Corvallis came down this morning and goes to scrape a bar this side of Portland.

The Three Sisters arrived from up the river this afternoon, bringing about sixteen tons of general freight. She left Albany at 7:30 this morning and arrived in Salem at two o'clock to-day.

The river is very low and good time can not be expected.

A Tramp Did It.

Under this headline the Portland Evening Telegram says: "There is no doubt existing now regarding the cause of the accident to the Southern Pacific southbound passenger train near Albany. Mr. Brandt, superintendent, says that he feels satisfied that the switch had been tampered with. The switch bar was found to be broken, and a nut had been taken off on the fireman's side of the track. When the engine ran into the switch it moved over to the left and let the engine through."

The road as located there will be, at the nearest point, about one mile due west of Independence. It will run within four miles of Dallas and on to a point near McMinnville, when it will head directly for Tillamook.

The special funeral train, bearing the remains of Jack Miller, the dead engineer, and his mourning friends and relatives, passed southbound through Salem at 9:30 this morning. The interment was at Crosswell, Lane county.
