SPOKANE FALLS DESTROYED

The Fire Fiend Sweeps Away the Busy City.

FORTY BLOCKS BURNED TO ASHES.

The Entire Business Portion of the City Suffers Destruction.

SPOKANE FALLS, Aug. 5.—The entire business portion of the city, covering nearly forty blocks, was destroyed by fire last night. Fire broke out at 6 p. m., in a frame block near the depot. The water pressure was very weak, and the flames spread rapidly, sweeping the entire block in less than half an hour. A high wind sprang up soon after the fire started, filling the air with burning embers and starting fires in several adjacent blocks.

The Pacific hotel was the first valuable building to succumb. Adjoining it was the Russ house, a large frame hotel, which burned like tinder.

The fire communicated to the Northern Pacific passenger and freight depots, burning them to the ground. The Northern Pacific railroad's loss is variously estimated. The loss, including the freight in the warehouse, is estimated at about \$1,000,000.

The wind increased in violence, and shifted in all directions, creating a whirlwind of flames. It was then evident that the city was doomed, and the people became panic-stricken. The firemen lost all control over the mad demon.

The mayor ordered buildings to be blown up with giant powder. About a dozen large buildings and other small ones were blown up.

Every business house in the city, including eight banks, all the hotels but one, all the magnificent structures except the Crescent block, and every newspaper in the city except the Review is burned out.

The burned district includes all that part of the city from the Northern Pacific railway to the river, and from Lincoln to Washington streets, embracing over thirty blocks.

The fire exhausted itself at the river for lack of material to burn.

All the flour and lumber mills were saved.

It is impossible to estimate the loss at this hour, but it will run far into the millions.

All the provisions and supplies in this city were burned, and necessarily there will be much suffering for a few days until supplies can be shipped in.

While it is a terrible blow to thousands of people, the city will be rebuilt as speedily as men and money can do it.

She Defied Seizure.

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 4.—The greatest excitement prevails in this city over the arrival of the schooner Black Diamond from Behring sea. After her capture by the American cutter Rush, a seaman named John Hakanson was put aboard. He was appointed special officer, and was ordered to take the vessel to Sitka. Captains Owens of the Diamond, told the lieutenant of the Rush that he would not go to Sitka, and if he wanted her to go there, he would have to put a larger force than one man aboard.

The Rush took the sealskins, about eighty, and steamed away, and left the schooner's papers and everything else.

Great satisfaction is felt here over the Diamond's escape. It is thought it will bring a speedy settlement of the matter.

Saving Freight.

PORTLAND, Aug. 4.—William Reid has received information from the Pullman palace car company that the 25-ton flat cars ordered by him for the Astoria & South coast railroad will be started west from Chicago Thursday. Mr. Reid has also ordered a 324-ton locomotive. The flat cars will come here loaded with 50-pound steel rails for the Astoria & South coast road. Twenty of the cars will be loaded at Chicago and the remainder at St. Louis. The Pullman company will continue making flat cars for the Astoria road for the next eighteen months, and in all 225 will be turned out. As fast as finished they will be loaded with steel rails, of which Mr. Reid estimates that 5000 tons will be required to build the road to the Willamette valley. In this way \$50,000 in freight charges will be saved to the company.

Another Gigantic Combination.

FALL RIVER, Mass., August 4.—The evening papers will publish a letter from a committee representing an English syndicate addressed to the president of every cotton mill on Fall river. It proposes to form a cotton-mill trust. It is stated that foreigners have subscribed more than enough capital to buy the entire cotton manufacturing plants of the country. The Fall River mills alone have a capital exceeding \$20,000,000, and investments of probably \$30,000,000 or more.

Salt Lake to Los Angeles.

SAN FRANCISCO, August 4.—It is now said there are 800,000 ties, sufficient to construct 250 miles of line, stored at San Pedro, near Los Angeles, to be used for the construction of the Southern Pacific line between Salt Lake and Los Angeles. Rumor says the road would start at Mohave and as far as the Nevada boundary line could be built at the rate of three miles per day. The agitation to disfranchise the Salt Lake & Los Angeles railway company is taken as corroborative of the Southern Pacific's intentions.

Fires in the Cascades.

ELLENBURG, W. T., Aug. 3.—Forest fires in the Cascade range continue to spread, doing great damage to timber, saw mills, etc. There is no estimating the damage, but the timber is destroyed for miles on the upper Yakima and Cleelum rivers. Raucers are now engaged night and day in that section fighting fire. A dense smoke covers the entire country for a hundred miles.

Arrival of Minister Hirsch.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—Solomon Hirsch of Portland, new minister to Turkey, was among the president's callers yesterday. He was accompanied by Acting Secretary of State Wharton, and called to pay his respects and thank the president for his appointment.

Disastrous Storm in Canada.

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 3.—Late last night and this morning a terrific rainstorm passed over Ontario, accompanied by thunder and lightning. The storm also passed over Quebec. Grain is laid low in the fields and in many places totally destroyed.

Fighting in Sumatra.

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 3.—Intelligence has been received of a fight in Acheen, Sumatra, between natives and a force of Dutch troops. Nineteen Dutchmen were killed and twenty-two wounded.

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.

An artificial ice trust to cover the whole south has been formed.

Sullivan is in Mississippi in charge of the sheriff to answer for prize fighting.

All the breweries in Omaha have been sold to an English syndicate for \$1,500,000.

The Cherokee Indians are becoming excited over the negotiations of the government to buy their land.

Governor Penneyer has refused to commute the sentence of Chee Gong, and he will be hanged August 9th.

He Lives Here Too.

Any business man who cannot afford to take a daily paper at 15 cents a week, had better shut up shop and go and hire out to dig post-holes. There is one man on First street in this city to whom this rule applies very forcibly. It makes us tired to hear a business man put up the silly excuse that "he cannot afford to take it, times are too hard." Still these same fellows will bum the paper, and "cuss" it if it does not keep booming the town.—Baker City Reville.
