Pioneer Drowned.

Issue Stants of Airline, the terminus of the West Side division of the narrow gauge, was drowned near his home Friday evening at about five o'clock. The particulars are as follows: He had milked his cow, when he took her down to a spring near by to water. The spring is about eight feet deep, and it is three feet to the water. He had his hand resting on a plank, reaching down for a bucket of water, when the plank broke and he fell in, and being unable to get out, was drowned. He was seventy-six years of age and an old pioneer of Oregon.

Grains and Grasses.

D. D. Prettyman, who is employed by the Oregon land company to gather up specimens of grain, has a very nice collection. Among this collection is some barley raised on E. P. Walker's farm. It measured fifty-two bushel to the acre. He has about sixty varieties of wheat, besides a nice lot of oats and grasses. Mr. Prettyman states that the only rust that he has found this season was on Mission bottom and this is not very bad. He also has some wheat measuring eight to ten feet to the bundle.

At The Fair Grounds.

Work is progressing rapidly at the grounds of the State fair association. The new stables for the speed department which are being built by Briggs and Graham are nearly completed and about twelve horses are now there for training. The track is still in a bad condition, but they will have it worked down long before fair time. The fair this fall promises to be a good one and a larger crowd is expected than ever before.

Building the Road.

The Transcript says it is reported that the Astoria & South Coast railroad will employ about one thousand laborers within the next thirty days to work on the road. The survey will be completed for the second twenty miles by that time and the work of grading commenced. This will give employment to fishermen at the close of the season and probably furnish steady work all winter.

Fire in Folk County.

Saturday afternoon fire broke out on the farm of Mr. Hastings, near Smithfield, on the line of the narrow gauge railroad, burning over about ten acres of ground, but fortunately he had just his grain threshed. Had it not been for a north wind it would have burned considerable grain for Danl. Gibson. Mr. White's machine was close and the threshing crew soon subdued the flames.

Almost A Runaway.

Saturday evening as Charles Harold was getting ready to return home and when near the post office he went to turn around when the wagon tongue caught in the wheel of a buggy which was standing near. The buggy was upset. Mr. Harold jumped from his wagon to right the buggy, when his horses started to run away but were caught before any damage was done.

Scarlet Fever Epidemic.

The Stayton correspondent of the Silverton Appeal says: It is feared that scarlet fever will become epidemic hereabouts. Mr. Bass, near Sublimity, has lost one of his children, and another, Dr. Kitchen thinks, cannot live. One of Mr. Zimmerman's, near Mr. Bass' Dr. Hunter, says, is very low and its recovery is extremely doubtful.

The Wrecked Engine.

About 4:30 yesterday evening the engine that was wrecked at the Lebanon switch one week ago passed through Salem, enroute to Portland for repairs. The locomotive was in a bad condition, but will not be a total loss.

A Very Low River.

The river is now down to the low water mark. This is about as low as was ever before known. The boats will try to run as it is, but they may not arrive promptly on time.

Cheap at Newport.

Some pessimist is objecting to the price of living at Newport. Really, the truth is, a person can live as cheaply at Newport as he can at home. Groceries and the necessities of life are to be had there at as reasonable rates as could be asked. It is doubtful if there is a watering place in the world where living is as cheap as at Newport. The only extortionate persons you will meet there are the transportation men and the hotel keepers. It does Newport a great injustice to say that her prices on all goods are at the summer resort notch.

Runaway at Turner.

Yesterday morning a lively runaway occurred in the vicinity of Turner. T. S. Walker was driving a team and climbed from the wagon to open a gate when the team took fright and ran away. Mr. Walker caught them by the lines but they were under such headway that they could not be stopped. Mr. Walker was thrown against the fence and bruising him up considerably, hurting his arm.

A Narrow Escape.

There was a narrow escape of serious loss by fire Saturday in a wheat field up by Suver. The threshing crew were in a field that had panned out 4075 bushels and had but one acre more to thresh when a fire started. That acre of grain was consumed and the crew had hard work in keeping the fire from the thresher and threshed grain.

More Cement Walk.

A new cement walk is being placed in front of the saloon just south of the postoffice. The gentleman who has the contract says he does not know whether the gentleman who owns the postoffice building will have a walk built or not. The owner of the building will arrive in the city to-day and he may decide to have a walk built in front of his building.
