LATEST BY TELEGRAPH.

WOODEN BUILDINGS FORBIDDEN.

Spokane Falls Pluckily Comes Up To Build.

SPOKANE FALLS, Aug. 6.-Last Sunday night's fire will not fall short of \$14,000,000. Insurance about one-fourth that amount. Banks have already opened temporary quarters. Several have opened business. Work of cleaning debris has already commenced and the work of rebuilding will commence at once. The dangerous walls are being torn down. The militia company is guarding the burned district, while more guards patrol the whole city. The local company will be relieved to-day by a company from Walla Walla. The city council held a meeting and discussed a resolution prohibiting the erection of wooden buildings in the burned district. A mass meeting of the citizens sustained it with a unanimous voice. It will be passed at the regular meeting Wednesday evening. The council passed resolutions revoking the license of all hotels, restaurants and dealers in provisions who advance prices. Only two saloons remain and they have been closed by order of the mayor. The council ordered the committee on fire, water and sewers to investigate the cause of the absence of the superintendent of the water works, as the men left in charge were incompetent. A hopeful feeling prevails, although the destruction will retard the progress of the city for some time. Spokane Falls will rise grander and better than ever before, and will still claim its position as the commercial center of Eastern Washington.

SEATTLE'S GENEROSITY.

SEATTLE, Aug. 6.-The following dispatch sent yesterday, pursuant to the instructions of the citizens' meeting held this morning explains itself: "To Hon. Fred Furth, mayor of Spokane Falls.-Our whole people sorrow over your great calamity and extend their earnest sympathy. Seattle wires you \$15,000 and ships you a car load of bacon, and we hope that you will at once rebuild, even more substantially and grander than before. Signed, Robert Moran, Mayor.

Electric Railways.

Electric railways are of such recent origin that comparatively a small portion of the people of the United States have ever seen one in operation, and yet it is surprising to learn that 59 electrical street railways having an aggregate mileage of 309 miles and operating 440 motor cars, were in existence in America last month, while the number is still rapidly increasing. A very considerable number of such roads are also in operation in other countries. If the construction of electrical roads goes on as rapidly in the future as it has been in the past few years electricity will soon have received a wonderful demonstration of its possibilities in connection with locomotion.

Japanese Enterprise.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6.-Among the passengers of the City of Peking, which arrived yesterday from China and Japan, was Kentaro Kaneko, accompanied by four young Japanese, who are on a tour of the United States, England, France, Germany and Austria, to study the legislative details of those countries with a view to the establishment of a parliament in Japan, of which Kaneko is to be made chief secretary. Kaneko is not a stranger in this country, having received his education here and graduated with high honors from Harvard college.

Food in an Egg.

Professor Fresenius of Wiesbaden, after a long series of chemical analyses, declares that an egg contains as much nourishment as a pound and an ounce of cherries, a pound and a quarter of grapes, a pound and a half of russet apples, two pounds of gooseberries and four pounds of pears, and that 114 pounds of grapes, 127 pounds of russet apples, 192 pounds of pears, and 227 pounds of plums are equal in nourishment to 100 pounds of potatoes.

War in Egypt.

CAIRO, Aug. 6.-General Grenfell is returning to Cairo. The campaign is over. A body of Egyptians were left at Surrah. Cavalry is in pursuit of Emin, who survived the battle Saturday. He is lurking in the hills above Hellana with 200 men.

The Recent Seizure.

TORONTO, Aug. 6.-A special from Ottawa to the Empire, the government organ, says: "There was considerable chuckling here at the news from Victoria of the safe arrival of the sealer Black Diamond, although there is naturally much excitement still extant at the outrageous conduct of Captain Sheppard in boarding the vessel and breaking the ship's lockers. Sheppard's action and that of his government affords a remarkable contrast to the treatment extended to the United States fishing vessels seized or detained for trespassing on Canadian fishing grounds in the Atlantic."

Coming Across the Border.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6.-A correspondent writing to this city from Ruby City, W. T., says that since the abandonment by the United States inspector of Oyoos lake, a place not far distant from Ruby City and on the boundary line of the United States and British Columbia, a large number of Chinese have come into the country from the British Columbia side. He says that at least 1000 have entered at the point named and that it is a favorite place for moving opium into the United States without paying duty.

Boats Ghastly Loaded.

SEATTLE, Aug. 6.-At 4 o'clock yesterday the tug Vigilant, off Blakes, eight miles from Port Blakely, picked up a boat containing the dead body of John McCall, head sawyer in Blakely mill, and the nearly lifeless form of George W. Curtis. They were taken to Port Blakely. Curtis is unable to speak and will probably die. McCall, Curtis and a half-breed, whose name is unknown, left Blakely to go to Clam Bay. It is supposed that the boat was capsized in a squall, and that the half-breed was lost overboard.

A \$75,000 Fire.

SELMA, Cal., Aug. 6.-This morning fire was discovered in the Barcan brick block. It started in the southeast corner of the Barcan building, and rapidly spread to all the other parts. The frame buildings next caught fire, and went like a flash. Some of the goods were saved. The total loss is \$75,000; insurance, \$32,000.

The cause of the fire is not known yet, but it is believed to be incendiary.

From Yamhill.

MCMINVILLE, Aug. 6.-The first week of threshing is over, and the indications are that Yamhill will have her accustomed yield. Although there has been no rain for months it is a common thing to report thirty to forty bushels to the acre, and in some few instances, fifty bushels of fall wheat. Very little spring wheat has been threshed yet, but the yield will be good where the land has been properly farmed.

President to Visit this Coast

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6.-A Chronicle special from Washington says that in an interview with M. H. De Young, proprietor of that paper, President Harrison said that he was very desirous of visiting the Pacific coast within the near future, and it was his intention to make the trip not later than next summer. He anticipated much pleasure from his proposed visit.
