This Year's Hop Crop.
A Washington Territory exchange says though the hop crop is a large one a little rain would certainly do no harm. A peculiarity of hops this season is that in some places the old yards look well and the new ones poor. In other places the new yards look well and the old ones poor. This peculiarity is noticed in yards that lie alongside each other. The growers are at a loss to account for this peculiarity, unless it be that the soil is heavier in spots, and therefore retains the moisture and produces a better crop than where the soil is lighter and where the moisture evaporates sooner. Hops can be delivered aboard the cars at a cost to the producer of from 8 to 9 cents per pound. At the present time they are being contracted for by wholesale at from 13 to 15 cents per pound. This leaves a fair margin of profit to the grower.

Oregon Wheat Samples.
The Oregon land company is preparing 10,000 sacks of wheat to be sent to the Milwaukee G. A. R. encampment. These sacks each hold three ounces and are neatly labeled. The wheat is plump and nice, weighing sixty-five pounds. This will be a fine advertisement for Oregon. The reverse side of the sack bears an engraving of the state capital.

The Principal Tutor.
Prof. M. G. Lane of this city, his many friends will be pleased to learn, has received his appointment as principal instructor at the Indian training school at Chemawa. Prof. Lane's well known abilities are an assurance that the management of the school will be a success. Prof. Lane is a resident of Salem and is receiving the hearty congratulations of his friends upon his appointment.

An Injury to Newport.
Returning tourists are all registering complaints against the outrageous charges assessed against them by the shark management of the steamer Richardson. They declare that such actions are certain to do Newport a great injury. Many persons declare that they will never return there so long as such a scheme of robbery is countenanced by the residents of the Bay.

A Base Canard.
A sensational news item read after this fashion: "Yesterday morning near Salem two men in a hack, in broad daylight, near Lewis Petty John's farm residence, stole several sacks of wheat and drove off with them." The whole business is a base canard, bearing no semblance to the truth.

Fire in the Mountains.
Parties who left Salem several days ago for Silver Creek Falls have been unable to reach that resort on account of the prevalence of fire in the mountains. They could go but a few miles beyond Whiteaker and had to stop to await the will of the flames. Mrs. W. H. Cook of this city is en route to the Falls.

The New Business College.
The new Capital business college of Salem will open up soon. Their rooms in the bank block are being made in readiness for the commencement of the school year. This new enterprise promises much for Salem. It will be first class in every particular, embracing an extensive course of study.

The Smoky Way.
Mack Monteith and Fred Ross have returned from a trip of several weeks to the Sulphur Springs, beyond Gatesville. They report forest fires beyond Gatesville in Marion county, covering considerable territory. Some of our superabundance of smoke came from there, and some of it from further north, even from the Columbia. —Democrat.

Caught in the Fire.
The George Woodthorp company, which will be in Salem during fair week, suffered to the extent of about \$2400 by the Spokane fire. The flames destroyed every piece of their lithographs and other paintings, and all their scenery. The wardrobe was saved.

Southern Oregon Melons.
George A. Jackson, the great watermelon man, has shipped from Southern Oregon a carload of fine melons for the Salem market. Mr. Jackson's melons are well known through this section and are expected to-day.

THE MOTOR LINE FRANCHISE.

The City Council Disposes of the Motor Question.

The city council met in adjourned session last night, for the purpose of granting the Salem and Silverton motor line the right of way into the city.

The committee on streets and public property reported in favor of granting the prayer of the petition of the Marion county improvement company, except as to Chemekete street, and also in favor of adopting, with amendments, a resolution offered by Councilman Skinner at the previous meeting. This resolution as amended, and conforming to the petition of the motor company reads as follows:

Resolved, That the prayer of the petition of the Marion county improvement company for the right of way for its steam motor line over certain streets of the city be and the same is hereby granted, and the said company is hereby granted the right of way for said motor line over Trade street, Front street and Commercial street south from Trade street;

Provided, That the track of said motor line shall be laid in such manner as to obstruct or hinder the passage of vehicles as little as possible, and the street commissioner shall supervise the construction of said track.

The report of the committee was adopted.

This gives to the improvement company right of way for their motor line for the full length of Front and Trade streets, and also that part of Commercial south of Trade. This will give the motor line entrance to the city easily, and all that now remains for them to do is to obtain right of way across the University grounds and the woolen mill site.

The committee on ordinances reported recommending that the chief engineer and the committee on fire and water be directed to consider and report on complaints that might be made to them of the existence within the city of injured buildings that may be dangerous and offensive. Report adopted.

A Misplaced Honor.

The following quoted paragraph is from the Boston Globe: "The oldest living Odd Fellow in the United States is James S. Irwin of Buffalo, who has been an active member of Niagara Lodge, No. 25, for forty-five years, and has been its secretary for forty years." The JOURNAL has long known that a Salem gentleman was entitled to this honor and to satisfy the world that the Boston paper was at fault, hunted up Father Armstrong, who is the genuine oldest Odd Fellow of the United States. He became a member of the fourteenth I. O. O. F. lodge that was organized Sept. 9, 1834, in Genesee county, New York. He has lived through many changing years, and witnessed the accomplishment of many things that in the beginning of the century were looked upon as utopian dreams, impossible of realization. This aged Odd Fellow came upon the stage of action on the first day of January, 1802, and is consequently nearly eighty-eight years of age. He has been an active member of the order for fifty-five years, thus distancing the New York man by ten years. Mr. Armstrong says he is well acquainted with the other old Odd Fellow, Mr. Irwin of Buffalo, and has sat in lodge many times with him.

A Noble Deed's Reward.

The management of the Southern Pacific railroad company last evening presented to Russell Coleman, the fifteen-year-old lad who discovered a railroad bridge on fire and flagged the train, a handsome silver watch as a token of appreciation. On the watch was engraved the following: "Presented to Russell Coleman by Southern Pacific company in appreciation of his services notifying the company of the burning of bridge No. 148 on July 29th, 1889."

Bricklaying Has Commenced.

Bricklaying on the new Commercial street, west side, blocks commenced this morning, and all will be bustle in that vicinity until the buildings are completed. These will be fine buildings, substantial, fire proof, and an ornament to the city as well as a monument to her business acumen.

The Jefferson Mills.

Work has commenced in the repairing of the Jefferson flouring mills. There are at present twelve carpenters at work and the mills will be fitted with new machinery throughout. The Jefferson warehouse is taking in a vast amount of wheat this year.

Feels His Injuries.

James Tucker, the old gentleman who was struck by the train Wednesday, is improving slowly. He feels rather sore and bruised up, but will recover. Yesterday his stomach bothered him, he not being able to retain any food on it.

Grows Steadily.

The Oregonian, under "Note and Comment," has the following regarding Salem: The Mountaineer alludes to the prosperity of Salem in the year past. It is true that our capital city has made very decided progress which appears to any on-looker by the aspect of the place compared with the past. Everywhere are new buildings. On the business streets many new fireproof blocks have gone up and literally hundreds of new residences are scattered through the old town and in what lately were considered "suburbs." No effort has been made to attract population by advertising, and the growth of the city is natural and permanent. Oregon has many such towns that are making healthy and positive growth. We receive into Western Oregon many people who possess some means and are anxious to improve their circumstances. These were originally billed to Washington, and when they reached there and found no way of investing in productive land they came on to Western Oregon and in many instances found what they wanted. Washington has "wonderful resources," but they are beyond the present reach of the laboring man, and the people who came there on representations made find they mean future development and not present income. The best of people can't live on undeveloped "resources," and most of them have no inclination to try to do so.

McIntire appointed viewers to assess damages; view to be made August 14.

In matter of the application of R. S. Wallace, et al, for the perpetual right to lay and maintain water mains through county roads of Marion county; denied.

In matter of the extension of Winter street into North Salem to the North Salem school house, William Waldo, Sampson Jones and J. L. Thompson appointed viewers and W. J. Culver county surveyor to meet at place of beginning Tuesday, Aug. 13, and make survey.

Articles of Incorporation.

Articles of incorporation were filed with the secretary of state to-day as follows: The Grants Pass and coast railroad company, with Harry Young, Arthur Conklin, and F. T. Flynn as incorporators. The capital stock is \$1,000,000. The Baptist church of North Powder, with the trustees as incorporators. The amount of capital on hand is \$3000 and the source of revenue is the contribution of the members.

Both Very Ill.

As the JOURNAL goes to press this evening the condition of Postmaster Richard H. Dearborn is considered dangerous. He has been ill for some days.

Mr. E. Strong, the aged father of Amos Strong, is also very low this afternoon and his recovery is a matter of serious doubt.
