LATEST BY TELEGRAPH

Not a Fish Story. ASPEN, Colo., Aug. 12.—The Minnie mine on Aspen mountains was the scene of a discovery that produced more excitement than the richest strike in the district. Three miners drilled two holes in a 500-foot level and touched it off before coming to the surface. Upon returning it was found that the blast had blown a passageway into a beautiful cave that rivalled in magnificence the wildest dreams of Higgard. They were started to find a petrified stone man with a flint axe and bow by his side. Other stone men were found all in the same position. They were seated with their heads on their knees and arms around their legs. They carried one out with the loss of his feet and hands and turned it over to physicians from Glenwood Springs. The figure was pronounced, not that of an Indian, but are supposed to be the people who preceded the Indians on this continent.

Warm For Mormons. NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 12.—Mormon troubles in Wilson county looked very threatening Sunday, but are believed to have temporarily quieted down now. The Mormons are on the alert, and the anti-Mormon party grows more indignant at every "revelation." Just now, however, the elders have hidden under fear of tar and feathers. In preaching to one of the congregations Sunday, one of the elders told his sympathizers that this country belonged to them; that they were preparing to take it by force if necessary, and would have it if they had to take blood out of every man in the country, and that the church was preparing an army for that purpose.

The Territories Excluded. WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—First Comptroller Matthews has decided that the appropriation of \$600,000 made for "agricultural experiment stations" can be used for the benefit only of forty stations in each of the thirty-nine states and in the territory of Dakota, and at the agricultural department, and that no part of the appropriation can be used in the territories, with the exception of Dakota, that being the only one included in the estimates upon which the appropriation was based.

Dining Cars to Portland. SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 12.—There was considerable of a stir in railroad circles to-day over the announcement by the Union Pacific road that, commencing August 18th, it will run dining cars through between Omaha, Ogden and Portland. They will be Pullman cars, the same as were in use on the Golden Gate Special. This improvement of the overland passenger service is considered important as foreshadowing its adoption by all the overland companies.

It Might Blow Up. SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 12.—A statement is made that a compact has been signed by representatives of the different California powder companies, to control the compact for five years. It is stated that these companies have also entered into a combination with all Eastern and Western companies in the United States, and also with all dynamite manufacturing companies in Europe, regulating the prices of all foreign trade. The number of companies thus interested is over one hundred, and the combination is said to be the most gigantic on record. Prices have advanced five cents per pound, and take effect immediately.

A Warning to Greece. LONDON, Aug. 12.—A dispatch from Constantinople says that it is semi-officially stated that the Sultan has notified Greece that he will regard any attempt by that country to land troops or incite rebellion in Crete as a casus belli. None of the flower, the telegram states, will support an aggressive prime minister. The grand visor of Turkey charges Greece with fomenting riots in Monaster and Rethyma.

Minister Hirsch Arrives. PORTLAND, Aug. 12.—Hon. Sol. Hirsch, the recently appointed envoy extraordinary to Turkey, arrived home this morning from Europe. He is not in the best of health. He has been granted a six weeks' leave of absence, and will leave with his family for Europe at the expiration of that time.

Wilson Waives Examination. ALBANY, Or., Aug. 12.—Bernard Mezin, alias Barney Wilson, who was arrested at Montague, Cal., for shooting Mick Zimmerman in this city, waived examination in Justice Humphrey's court to-day, and was held in \$200 bonds. The prisoner is a youth of 17. Zimmerman is still in a critical condition, with no probability of recovery, the ball being lodged in his lung.

Another City Destroyed. A Large Portion of Truckee, Cal., in Ashes. TRUCKEE, Cal., Aug. 13.—A disastrous fire occurred yesterday evening, burning all east of Bridge street and north of the railroad to the round house. The flames were first discovered in the residence of Engineer Dille, which was a frame building, and before assistance arrived the sparks had attacked the neighboring houses. The Southern Pacific railway company's fire train, which was stationed at Summit, was dispatched to the scene, and lent much assistance in suppressing the fire. Among the buildings burned were the public school house, two churches and the American hotel. The property is understood to be covered with insurance. No railroad property was burned. The fire started from a defective flue in the house of C. B. Dille on Church street. Heroic efforts were made by the citizens to stop the fire, but a fierce wind was blowing.

Burke Identified. CHICAGO, Aug. 12.—Burke, the Cronin suspect, has been identified by Mr. and Mrs. Carlson, owners of the cottage in which Dr. Cronin was murdered, as the man who rented it from them, giving the name of Frank Williams.

Mrs. Maybrick's Execution. LIVERPOOL, Aug. 12.—Monday, August 26, has been fixed upon as the day for the execution of Mrs. Maybrick. A Story About Jim Rice. When General Black was commissioner of pensions he met Colonel James H. Rice of Indiana, a robust gentleman weighing 230 pounds. During the war the Colonel was a noted fighter. He went into the army as thin as a razor-back hog, and came out as large as the late lamented Jumbo. But he was wounded by a spent ball and the bruise on his flesh remained some two weeks. However the general did not know the nature of the colonel's wound, so one day he asked him why he did not apply for a pension. The colonel is not only wealthy, but a born joker, so he put on a serious look and said in a whisper to the commissioner: "I do not wish this to get out. I went into the army with a bad case of bronchitis and came out well. If the Government hears this, I am afraid I will have to pay it a pension."
