JUDGE TERRY'S TRAGIC END

He Slaps Justice Field and Is
Shot Down.

U. S. MARSHAL NAGLE DOES IT.

The Fend of Long Standing at Last
Ends Fatally.

[Special to the Capital Journal.]

LATHROP, Cal., August 14.—

When the north bound train arrived
here from Los Angeles this morning
United States Justice Field and
United States Marshal Nagle got
off to take breakfast. Judge David

Terry and his wife had boarded the
train at Fresno and left the train at
the same time.

Justice Field and Nagle proceeded
to the dining room, followed by Ter-
ry, who seated himself beside the Jus-
tice. The latter had just commenced
his breakfast when Terry slapped

him in the face, when Deputy Mar-
shal Nagle arose, drew his pistol
and shot Terry. One bullet went
through his breast in the region of

the heart and the other struck just
behind the ear. Terry fell dead.

After shooting, Nagle and the
justice left the dining room and
went back to the train. Mrs. Terry
in the meantime had procured her

satchel from the sleeper and on be-
ing searched it was found to contain
a pistol. There was some talk of ar-
resting Nagle, and holding his re-
volver firmly in his hand he defied

the crowd to touch him, saying that
he was a deputy United States
marshal and had only done his duty
in protecting Justice Field. No one

ventured to touch him, and he board-
ed the train, when it started for
San Francisco.

Constable A. B. Walker also board-
ed the train, saying that he would
arrest him at Tracy. When the
train reached the latter place, Walk-
er took Nagle into custody, and had

him jailed.

Mrs. Terry seemed to be greatly
affected by the tragedy. When in-
terviewed she said that she had feared
that there would be trouble if

her husband and Field met. She
tried to persuade him not to go in
the dining room, but he insisted on

doing so. She did however
succeed in getting him
to leave his pistol in

the car with her. She saw that
he was not armed when he went
into the dining room.

San Francisco is all excitement
over the tragic ending of this long
standing feud.

Defying Electricity.
LOUISVILLE, Aug. 13.—Dan J.
Phelps, an employee of the Brush
electric light company, who sus-
tained the full force of a 2,200 volt
current of electricity ten days ago,
returned to work this morning feel-
ing well. According to theorists a
current of this power is strong
enough to kill an elephant.

In an interview Phelps said: "The
shock made me unconscious almost
in an instant, but although I felt as
if I were being violently squeezed,
there was no pain.

"My muscles seemed to be going
to sleep, but the instant I felt the
current I threw myself backward
to escape from falling into the ma-
chinery.

"I believe the shock has been very
beneficial to my general health, for
I feel much better."

Phelps was thought to be dead
when picked up by his fellow work-
men, and remained unconscious for
an hour and a half. His hands were
burned by the wires which he held.

The Elixir of Life.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 13.—Two
reporters, who subjected themselves
out of curiosity to the Brown-Se-
guard elixir at the Medico-Chirur-
gical hospital yesterday, are both
laid up to-day, and one of them is
considerably alarmed about his con-
dition. He was compelled to keep
his bed to-day with a high fever,
pains in his head, a painful con-
fusion of ideas, and severe pains in the
groin and its vicinity.

Will See Her Son.
VIENNA, Aug. 13.—Ex-King Mil-
an of Serbia still refuses to allow
his son, the young Fulkling Alex-
ander, to meet his mother, ex-Queen
Natalie. The ex-queen is deter-
mined to start for Belgrade on
August 22d to visit her son. This
announcement causes excitement in
Belgrade.

Boulanger Guilty.

PARIS, Aug. 13.—The court this
afternoon found Boulanger guilty of
conspiracy.

The state council has annulled
the election for twelve counties in
which Boulanger was elected to the
council general, on the ground that
the general was not legally eligible
for the position.

A Remarkable Fast.

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 13.—Robert
Marvel, the Pike township octogenar-
ian, passed the fifty-eighth day of
his fast to-day and bids fair to live
another week, or perhaps longer.

For the past five days he has taken
no milk, and during the fifty-seven
of his fast he has taken not over
three quarts.

Cipher Telegrams.

LONDON, Aug. 13.—"United Ire-
land" has pleaded throughout
Dublin the announcement of the
discovery of many cipher telegrams
which prove that the forgeries of
letters attributed to Parnell origi-
nated with castle officials, and prom-
ises in the next issue to print full re-
velations concerning the crime and to
fasten it upon the guilty persons.
