A. W. C. T. U. Hall.

At their regular meeting yesterday afternoon the ladies of the Salem W. C. T. U. again discussed the proposition of raising funds for the construction of a hall to be used as a temperance hall and free reading room. They have in contemplation a building that will cost not less than \$6,000. This money they propose raising by subscription, and already they report several hundred dollars promised. No canvass has yet been made, but indications are that those who are able to give would respond liberally to the call for assistance. Such a hall is just what Salem needs and it is trusted complete success may crown the efforts of the ladies.

The Firemen's Tournament.

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Northwestern firemen's association at Vancouver Monday afternoon, a proposition from Chief Rainey of Tacoma, to hang up a purse of \$420 if the convention and tournament were held there, was accepted. The convention will be held Monday, September 16th and the tournament will begin the following day, to continue three days. The association and tournament were declared open to all volunteer departments in the United States and Canada.

A Fine Season.

Eastern tourists who visit the Willamette valley at this season of the year, have much praise to lavish upon the climate. They are charmed—delighted. Coming from a land of far greater heat, they express themselves as considering this a paradise and make sport of Oregonians who complain of the heat. They also open wide their eyes at the sight of the immense yields of fine fruit and well they may, for this is soon to be the greatest fruit region on earth.

We Need a Box Factory.

There are hundreds and thousands of bushels of fruit here that must be shipped away and for these boxes are required. All of these boxes have to be shipped here from Southern Oregon or elsewhere, simply because there is not a box factory in the valley. Surely there is no better opening anywhere for any kind of an enterprise than for a box factory right here in Salem. It is a fact that home shippers would consume the output of a considerable factory.

At The Prison.

Although two prisoners were released from the state penitentiary to-day, there yet remains 289 men within the enclosure. Those whose time expired to-day were Tom Crowley and a Chinaman. They were both from Multnomah, convicted of larceny, the former sentenced to a term of five years and the latter twelve months.

Big Real Estate Trade.

Yesterday afternoon I. A. Manning sold all of Queen Anne addition, nearly six lots, to Mr. Krause of Illinois and his son O. E. Krause of this city. They have replaced the addition with Mr. Manning for sale, and he intends pushing it. This is a choice addition property and many improvements will be made there this fall.

Bought Salem Property.

Mrs. M. A. Williamson, at 35 High street, sold her beautiful residence property yesterday to G. W. Meeks of the Real estate and land exchange company, for \$2000. Mrs. Williamson will go to Portland and improve her property there the coming year.

Lots of Wheat.

It is estimated that there will be at least 250,000 bushels of wheat delivered at the Salem flouring mills this fall by wagon. It is now coming in at the rate of 5,000 bushels per day. The mill will start to grinding on Saturday and will in this way consume 2,000 bushels per day.

COUNTY SCHOOL MONEY.

Apportionment of State and County Funds to the County Districts.

County School Superintendent D. W. Yoder has just completed making an estimate of the August apportionment of state and county school funds for the different school districts of Marion county. The total amount apportioned is \$14,340.30 of which \$10,295.00 is state money, and \$4,045.30 is county money. The state apportionment is \$1.40 per scholar, and the county \$1.95 per pupil. The total enumeration is 7354. This apportionment will be made on Monday, August 19th, at which time warrants covering the amounts as stated will be forwarded to the clerks. Reform Organizations.

A call for a state conference has been issued by representatives of the various reform forces of the state, who, pursuant to an agreement reached through correspondence among the representative heads of the various political reform organizations, representatives of the grange, prohibitionists, union labor men and Knights of Labor, met in Salem Saturday afternoon last to consider the matter of consolidation of the reform elements for combined political action. The call earnestly invites all who are in sympathy with the said union reform movement throughout the state of Oregon, to unite in sending delegates to a union reform conference to convene at Salem, September 14, 1889, at 11 a. m. The conference will be composed of one delegate from each voting precinct in the state, to be chosen by a union primary, and one delegate from each labor organization, prohibition party and union labor club and one additional delegate for each 100 members of such organization or club. The object of the conference shall be to consider the practicability of the union of all the above named reform forces, and of all citizens not identified with these organizations, but who are in favor of better government in a political party that shall pledge itself for the settlement of the great questions now pressing for settlement by legislation, and of all kindred questions that may arise; and if such consolidation is agreed upon, to adopt a platform and to provide for thorough county and precinct organization of the state preparatory to the nomination of state and county union tickets.

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ANOTHER STABBING AFFAIR.

A Quarrel Among a Threshing Crew Which Ends in a Fight.

There was a stabbing occurrence this morning about six miles south of Salem in the Jory neighborhood. Fortunately no one was seriously wounded, although a young man named Matthews has several flesh wounds.

Two young men named Matthews, who live near Marion, were in the Jory neighborhood assisting their grandfather during his threshing. Yesterday one of the boys scared the team of Walter Mize, a well-known school teacher of this county. Mize got mad and a quarrel ensued, but all is said to have been settled. But this morning the quarrel was renewed or a new one started, and the Matthews boys stood together and each declared the other should not be touched. By eight o'clock this morning there was a fight in progress between the three.

There are two versions to the tale. One is that the Matthews boys threw Mize down and were pummeling him when he said he had enough. At this he was released, when he made for Will, the seventeen-year-old boy and slashed him with a pocket knife.

Another story is that only one of the Matthews boys was in the fight, but it is probable they were both on hands.

The boy who was stabbed is not seriously wounded, as the weapon was nothing more than a small pocket knife. Dr. Byrd was called to dress the wounds and found two cuts on the shoulder blade and one on the arm. They are not deep, nor over two inches long. The other wound is where the knife was punched between two ribs. This wound is neither deep nor large, being only the size of a knife blade and is not serious.

SPRING VALLEY NOTES.

Pony Valley's outfit from Dixie is threshing for Mr. Skaaf and others. This is the only one in the valley that runs a boarding house. It consists of a frame house on wheels. Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Gibson have charge of it. One day last week they threshed one thousand bushels of oats in two hours and forty-five minutes. Their average, however, is but two thousand bushels of wheat per day. The machine is an Advance and can be moved quite rapidly. They moved three miles in forty-seven minutes. The men are paid for twelve hours work and over time extra pay. Many of the ladies are visiting the cooking shanty as it is quite a novelty here.

Mr. Marshal's Attention.

There are a number of cows running at large in the streets and they do a great deal of damage to hedges and shrubbery. Yesterday afternoon four of these animals were seen feeding in the state house yard. The citizens have their fences down so hedges can grow. The cattle do a good deal of damage to their yards.
