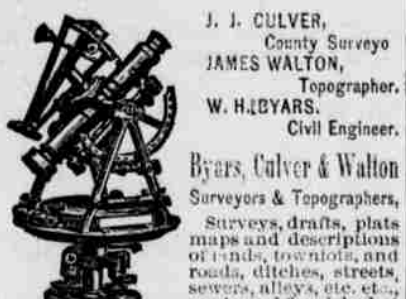

LATEST BY TELEGRAPH.

Albany Paragraphs.

ALBANY, Aug. 16.—Arrangements were consummated yesterday which will probably result in the building of a first-class hospital in this city,

under the management of the Sisters of Charity. Through the efforts of J. A. Gross, the Willamette

land company have offered to donate a block of land in the eastern suburbs of the city, or two

blocks, if necessary, as a site for the hospital buildings and grounds. This, Mr. Gross says, will be accepted,

and arrangements will be made to erect the hospital with all the necessary buildings, which with the grounds will occupy at least one

block. A proposition is on foot to establish a public park immediately east of Hackleman's grove in the eastern

suburbs of this city. It is proposed to connect it with the city by a street

car line, and improve it so as to make it an ornament to Albany.

Yesterday Wm. M. Hoag, A. Hackleman and Engineer Eckleson left for Eastern Oregon by way of the Lebanon road to look over the

route of the Oregon Pacific across the mountains.

Killed by the Elixir.

PARIS, Ky., Aug. 15.—Dr. Brown-Sequard's elixir of life has at last found a victim. Dr. Henry Res-

ding of Bank Lick prepared some of the fluid and injected the liquid into a decrepit old negro. The manifestations from the patient which followed showed that there was

something wrong with the "life elixir," as the darkey died in terrible agony. It is supposed that blood

poisoning was the cause of his death.

The negroes in the village became so incensed at the doctor that he had to leave the country immediately after the disastrous experiment. He cannot be found, and it is supposed that the friends of the deceased have killed him.

The Last Hope Gone.

LONDON, Aug. 13.—Justice Stephen, who had sat throughout the famous Maybrick trial, had a long private conference with Home Secretary Matthews. Public anxiety

was worked up to the utmost pitch, and a crowd gathered around the office in Leadenhall street as though they could in some way learn the

result of the conference.

The Home Secretary concurred with the Justice and the last hope of the unfortunate woman was gone.

The action is the one topic of conversation here, and every one sees now that there is no longer any possible chance of a stay in the execution, and that Mrs. Maybrick must hang.

Two Men Shot.

SPOKANE FALLS, Aug. 15.—Word by special messenger reached this city this afternoon of a probably fatal shooting affray at Colville Wednesday evening. From the information obtained here the trouble appears to have been among some railroad construction hands employed on the Spokane Northern railway, in the course of which John Mahony was shot in the abdomen by

Fred Adams, and a man named Charley Gopher, was shot in the arm. The indications were that the bullet had passed completely through Mahony's intestines, causing injuries necessarily fatal.

A Warrant for Justice Field.

STOCKTON, Aug. 15.—A warrant has been issued and placed in the hands of Sheriff Cunningham for the arrest of Justice Field. It was issued by the district attorney on complaint of Mrs. Terry, who charges Judge Field with complicity in the killing of her husband.

The attorneys who have been engaged to conduct the defense of Deputy Marshal Nagle promised that Justice Field would appear when wanted, but Mrs. Terry's complaint was made against both.

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
