ADDITIONAL LOCAL NEWS.

A Fireman's Play.

"One of the Bravest," to be presented in Salem Saturday night, is a comedy once seen never to be forgotten. The plot is laid in New York's numerous docks, the denizens of which represent the "exclusiveness" of dock society. In the second act occurs the great fire scene in which Mr. McCarthy as "Larry Howard" vividly portrays the life of a fireman engaged in his heroic work. As the flames leap up and around the doomed building a jumping net is brought into requisition and the occupants quickly drop from the windows and are saved, while "Larry Howard" rapidly climbs up the building with the Pomper ladders, makes a successful and daring turn around the corner of the structure, fastens the life line and descends to the ground with a young lady in his arms.

The Terry Tragedy.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 16.—The Terry tragedy continues to dwarf all other news in the popular mind in this city. Public interest in the affair has been increased by the action of the district attorney of San Joaquin county in issuing a warrant for the arrest of Justice Field on a complaint of Mrs. Sarah Althea Terry. A legal conflict threatens to grow out of this demand. The warrant orders Sheriff Cunningham of San Joaquin county to take Justice Field to Stockton, the former home of Judge Terry, in which city Nagle is at present under arrest. The sheriff arrived here last night and expected to make the arrest at 1 o'clock this afternoon, it first being necessary to have a writ of approval by the judge of San Francisco county. Judge Field arrived at his chambers about noon accompanied by Judge Sawyer and Judge Brower. Sheriff Cunningham, Chief of Police Crowley and Captain Lees went to the marshal's office in the same building as soon as Judge Rix had signed the warrant. From there the party, accompanied by Marshal Frank and several other persons, went to Judge Field's chambers. The latter rose to respond. Sheriff Cunningham presented the warrant formally and made the arrest.

LATEST BY TELEGRAPH.

The Terry Tragedy.

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A writ of habeas corpus was at

once sworn out before Judge Sawyer, of the circuit court, and heard by him in the chambers. The writ was granted and a hearing ordered for next Thursday afternoon. The bail was fixed at \$5000.

The supreme court of the state of

California, of which he late David S. Terry was formerly chief justice, this morning refused to adjourn out of respect to Terry's memory. This decision was announced from the bench. The reason was that Terry resigned his judicial position to fight a duel and that he was killed while in the act of assaulting a justice of the United States supreme court.

Life in the Elixir.

ST. LOUIS, August 16.—Dr. A. B. Shaw, who has been making microscopic examinations of the Brown-Sequard elixir, discovered, while experimenting that the fluid is alive with countless bacteria, although but three hours had elapsed since the elixir was prepared. Bacilli (tuberculosis, the bacilli that is supposed to be the cause of tuberculosis, were found in great quantity, thousands being in a single drop of the mixture.

The Doubtful Story.

SAN DIEGO, Aug. 16.—A small boy named Helm, living on a ranch in the western part of the county, rode to the store on Warner's ranch yesterday, and reported that his brother had been shot by a stranger, whom he described as a ragged Dutchman. He said that the Dutchman had fired five more shots at him without result.

Old Black Joe.

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—The original "Old Black Joe" died at Mount Holly, N. J., yesterday. His real name was Joseph Queen. He was undoubtedly the oldest man in the state, being 112 years old. He was a runaway slave and came to New Jersey in 1827.

Seattle News Item.

SEATTLE, W. T., Aug. 16.—Seattle is overrun with criminals. Half a dozen burglaries were committed last night, and foot-pads held up a citizen on Jackson street. This afternoon the police raided three gambling houses and one Chinese lottery game, and the inmates were freed.

A Heavy Sentence.

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—Eben S. Allen, the defaulting ex-president of the Forty-second & Grand street ferry railroad company, who pleaded guilty to the over issue of over \$100,000 worth of the stock of the company, was sentenced to-day to fourteen years' imprisonment at hard labor.

Killen Convicted.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 16.—Pat Killen, prize fighter, was convicted to-day of violating the ordinance regarding sparring exhibitions. Tom Anderson, who sparred with him, W. E. Gooding, his manager, and Ed. Holman, manager of the theatre where the exhibition was held, were also convicted. They will be sentenced to-morrow.

American Wheat Prospects.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—The reports received here this morning by the superintendent of agriculture show highly encouraging prospects for American wheat this year. India will produce 6,500,000 tons of wheat, which is 35,000,000 bushels less than last year, the crop of which latter year was 25,000,000 bushels less than that of the previous years. This gives India little more than sufficient for her own consumption. The crop of Russia is 15 per cent. short, and Austro-Hungary has a crop 25 per cent. short of last year's crop. The United States will have 100,000,000 bushels for export.

A New Papal Scheme.

LONDON, Aug. 16.—Cardinal Lavigne will shortly appeal, in the name of the holy father, Leo XIII, to the nations of Europe to purchase from the infidel defilers the holy city of Jerusalem, and as much of its surroundings as will be necessary to form a small province, to be forever independent and to guarantee its integrity.

If successful, this victory for the cause of civilization, it is considered by the cardinal and Pope Leo, would be the greatest triumph ever achieved by the Catholic church and would endear it to the affections of many now alienated from its teachings and prestige, and would do much toward creating a general desire for the restoration of its temporal power.

Married an Indian.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—Miss Stella Cox of this city has followed the example of Cornelia Feltows and has married Nathaniel Paterson, a full-blooded Seneca Indian of Cattaraugus reservation in New York. The groom is well known among his white neighbors. They unite in voting him an upright, honest, sober and industrious Indian. He is a farmer and owns the best team upon the reservation.

Albany Points.

ALBANY, Aug. 17.—The two street cars are finished and are a credit to the manufacturers, as well as to Albany. The track is being graded and will be ready for the cars in a few days. The date for starting will be formally announced, and everybody will be expected to take a ride.

The surveying party are completing the preliminary survey of the Albany & Astoria railway, having passed the summit of the Coast Range.

The Cherokee Commission.

MUSCOGEE, I. T., Aug. 16.—All negotiations between the Cherokee and the commission is at an end until the council meets in November, Chief Mays holding that if he had authority to appoint the conference committee their action would not be binding without the ratification of the council.

A Strange Wolf Story.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Aug. 16.—A Mexican boy was bitten by a mad wolf in the San Andreas mountains recently, and died in great agony. The scene around the little fellow's bed was heartrending, for he acted like a wolf, and, although small, it took several men to hold him down.

OCCIDENTAL JOTTINGS.

A short time ago some would-be sensational writer put in circulation the report that four dead infants had been discovered in the reservoir of the Dalles water works. As a matter of course, the gruesome lie was copied right and left, far and near.

The foundation for the new woolen mills at Albany is nearly finished. The brick work was commenced last week. The plans of the building have been changed so as to make the wing three stories high, the same as the main building. The mills be in operation by the first of the year.

The city council of McMinnville has finally decided to take the water from the Yamhill river for city water works, and have advertised for bids for a system of pumping complete, to cost not more than \$25,000. The work is to begin by August 20th, and be pushed to completion.

By the faulty manner of allowance to Sheriff Smith of Clatsop in his capacity of boarding house keeper to the county delinquents, the fewer he has the more he makes, proportionately. Up to four, he is allowed \$5 a week for the board of each prisoner. For any number above four he gets \$4 a week.
