An Abandoned Mine. JUNEAU, Aug. 5.-The Bear's Nest people find that its discovered ledge is no ledge, only a series of stringers of no value. They shut down, paid off and discharged all hands. The buildings are all finished, the 120 stamps alone remain unused. Over 1200 feet of tunneling fall to reveal anything of value, so now all labor stops to wait for the ore to grow. The amount of wealth so far expended on this enterprise cannot be learned here, though it necessarily must run into hundreds of thousands.

Bob Ingersoll's Opinion. NEW YORK, Aug. 18.-When Colonel Robert G. Ingersoll received a dispatch announcing that the friends of Judge Terry wanted him to come out to California to prosecute Judge Field and Deputy Marshal Nagle, he said: "I will not go. There is not enough money in California to take me out on such an errand. Why, we might as well banish our courts of law if our judges are to be terrorized and assaulted for rendering honest decisions."

Nagle Turned Loose. SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 18.-David Nagle, who killed David S. Terry, at Lathrop, Wednesday, was brought here from Stockton in pursuance of a writ of habeas corpus granted by the United States circuit court on the ground that his arrest was illegal, as the killing was done in performance of his duty in protecting a United States supreme justice, and that he was at the time of his arrest under the jurisdiction of federal authorities.

Sullivan Sentenced. PURVIS, Miss., Aug. 18.-John L. Sullivan, convicted of prize fighting, was sentenced to imprisonment for one year. Sullivan accepted his sentence with a smile, but he is very bitter in his denunciation of his arrest. Sullivan says he will not go to the penitentiary, and if he does, he will never serve out the time. He has wired Boston friends of the sentence and asked for help.
