A Social Gathering.

It was the good fortune of one of the reporters of the JOURNAL to be present yesterday at a dinner given by a party of campers-out on the ranch of Mr. John Albert. The place selected for pitching their tents was away up in the Cascade range of mountains on the north fork of the Santiam. Oregon might be searched from one end to the other without finding a more lovely or romantic spot, the scenery being grand and beautiful beyond description, while the resources for enjoying one's self is without limit. In the mountains deer and grouse abounded while in the deep clear waters of the river plenty of fish could be found. Before breaking up camp it was decided that the whole party should unite in getting up one grand dinner. Accordingly a long table was constructed and loaded down to the ground with all the good things that a ravenous mountain appetite craves. These who partook of the feast were as follows: Mr. E. T. The Santiam Mines.

The Albany Democrat says nearly every miner who comes from the Santiam mines is loud in his praise of the mines, where the prospects are pronounced unsurpassed and equal to the mines of Montana and Idaho. The Albany mine is now down nearly fifty-five feet and expect to strike a rich ledge at seventy-five or eighty feet, when matters will boom. There is a big future for the Santiam. W. F. Road returned from the mines and is quite enthusiastic over the outlook. An old mine has been re-tunnelled deeper and an eight foot ledge of gold and silver ore struck, mostly of the former, of great richness. It is thought it will pay out \$180 to the ton, and already the company is fearful lest so much gold be secured that with the present facilities it will be impossible to bring it to market.

A Fruit Car Burned.

This morning when the overland train was within a half mile of Chemawa smoke was seen issuing from a fruit car that was attached next to the engine. The train was quickly detached and the engine hurried with the car to Chemawa, where it was sidetracked. By this time the car, which was loaded with muskmelons, was pretty well on fire inside. Water was put on it from the Indian school hose, but the seat of the fire was not reached and as soon as a hole was cut in the car to insert the hose a draft was created and a brisk blaze was fanned. The car was nearly a total loss before the flames were conquered. The engine returned for its train, being by that time an hour behind time. The yard engine went to Chemawa and brought the burned car back here this morning.

Change in Teachers.

Two changes have been made in the teachers of the Salem public schools for the ensuing year. Percy Willis resigned as principal of the East Salem school and the board of education elected J. B. Leatherman of Woodburn to fill the vacancy. Miss Mary Hill also tendered her resignation as principal of the South Salem school and Mrs. A. Dodd was chosen to the position. School will open very soon and everything is auspicious for a successful school year, with good attendance.

Those Burned Warehouses.

The warehouse fire as published in Saturday's JOURNAL was in error, the fire having been at Mt. Angel instead of at Downs' Station as reported. The JOURNAL's informant saw the fire from a distance and supposed it to have been at Downs, but investigation reveals the fact that the Mt. Angel warehouses were the ones that suffered. They were both consumed. One was the property of Mr. Clever. The losses were quite heavy, as there was much wheat stored in them.

Wheat is Lively.

Wheat is still at sixty-five cents and about 60.0 bushels per day are being brought in. Not much of it is being sold, but the farmers are bringing it in for storage.

The worthy trio, though taken unawares, proved equal to the emergency, and extended a warm welcome and a most cordial hospitality to their congratulatory visitors. The more elderly of the company laid aside the burden of their years, and in songs and social games "the minutes winged their way with pleasure" till the hour "of night's black arch the keystone" approached when the company dispersed, each and all aglow with the consciousness of having spent a most enjoyable evening.

A Suicide in Yamhill.

Abner Darr, who resides in South Salem, yesterday morning received a telegram from McMinnville, bearing this sad intelligence to him: "Addison Darr, who lives near Wheatland, committed suicide yesterday (Saturday) by hanging. Come immediately." The two men were brothers and Mr. Darr of this city left at once for the scene of the suicide and has not yet returned to this city. The deceased was a man of perhaps middle age and well fixed as to worldly possessions. He leaves a family to mourn him. He lived in Yamhill county, between Dayton and McMinnville. No reason is assigned for the rash act. He hung himself to a beam in the barn and his stepson, Joseph Moire, found him after supper, when taking care of the stock. He is supposed to have committed the act through fear of becoming a burden to his friends.

The Great De Witt Talmage.

Mr. Talmage, whose sermons are published by over 3000 newspapers every week, will speak at the opera house in Salem on Friday, Aug. 23d. Of him the Union Era says: "Mr. Talmage has proved that he can gather a regular Sabbath congregation of five thousand hearers, and that he can make himself effectively heard by a multitude of people. He is one of those preachers who really belong to mankind at large. Most people who try to describe Dr. Talmage begin by saying he is like somebody, or unlike somebody else. Now, the fact is he is not like any other person at all. He is just 'Talmage' all over, with as much marked individuality as ever was concentrated in any one man."

Tracing a Rumor.

Many persons thought Thursday night's fire was the work of an incendiary and rumors have been rife ever since as to this person or that person being suspected of having had something to do with it. But nothing has been discovered. Al. Heren thinks he heard parties running down the alley just before the fire was discovered, but he does not know who it was.

An Evaporator Burned.

Saturday afternoon about four o'clock a fruit dryer belonging to Barney Simpson of South Salem caught fire, but only small damage was done. No blame attaches to the dryer as Mr. Simpson says it was through their carelessness that the fire originated.

Mill Threshing.

The farmers are not through threshing yet but the rain yesterday has not done much damage. In many sections of this county wheat and oats are reported good, while in other places they did not turn out well. Oats will be a good price this winter.

Protection of the Courts.

[Correspondence of the Capital Journal.] It is rather amusing to hear the old familiar cry of states rights coming up from the marshes of San Joaquin county, that exceedingly unfortunate woman, Sarah Althea Hill —, D. S. Terry has made the latest discovery together with the very anxious officers of Stockton precinct, that states rights are being violated.

I suppose Sheriff Cunningham will marshal the posse comitatus and tattle Uncle Samuel about the beard should the U. S. make any pretense that said U. S. has any rights that should be respected.

Indecent haste of poorly informed and over anxious officers sometimes compel them to show ears that they would fain keep concealed.

Attorney-General Miller's order, "Protect the U. S. Judges at all hazards," shows that he is the proper metal for the important position. No order was ever more fitting, or fitted with more perfectness, for who can say when the judiciary is forced through fear from their duty that we will have anything but shotgun government. Intimidate (if such could be) the judges of our courts and shotgun is the inevitable result.

A great many condemn the shooting of Terry for the assault on Justice Field. The assault was made on the Justice on account of his decision, while on the bench, in the discharge of his official duty, for which official duty he was slapped or struck in the face the assaulting party standing behind him. That was a slap or stroke in your face, my face, and every American's face. A villainous indignity, and great outrage to the highest judicial tribunal in the land, and to all American citizens wherever they may be, and for which outrage the perpetrator was promptly and properly smitten to the earth.

If Stephen D. Field and D. S. Terry had been fighting game cocks, or playing keeps with marbles, or betting on a base ball game and fell out about the short-stop for not doing his duty, and had a knock down, and the said D. S. T. had mopped the earth with Stephen D., not a word would have been said through the length and breadth of this America. But when you assault a judge for doing his duty, I know no language to give the act sufficient coloring. And when the force of U. S. marshals is not sufficient to give ample protection to the courts or the justice of the courts, I say order out regiments of regulars with positive orders, and when the regulars are exhausted, call out the volunteers. Lotteries.

[Correspondence of the Capital Journal.] It is rather strange that certain laws of the State can be repeatedly violated and no notice taken of it, while some poor fellow makes but a slight mistake and is prosecuted to the full extent of the law. Chapter forty-nine of the general laws of Oregon as compiled by Hon. M. P. Deady treats of "Crimes against public policy" and Section 646 on page 562 says: "If any person shall advertise any lottery ticket or share in such ticket, or any writing, token or other device, as is mentioned in section 644" (describing lotteries) "for sale either by himself or another, or shall in any way invite or entice another to purchase or receive the same, or shall set up or exhibit any sign, symbol or any emblematic or other representation of a lottery, where such ticket, share thereof, writings, token or other device can be purchased or obtained, such person, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail, not less than one month or more than six months, or by fine of not less than twenty dollars or more than two hundred dollars."

This provision of the statute is to the point and is intended to reach such swindling schemes as the Louisiana Lottery. Oregon, so far, has in a manner kept out of the clutches of these swindlers from the fact that no state paper would take the responsibility of violating the state laws, to urge the citizens thereof to send their hard earned coin to these Southern gamblers. These unscrupulous wretches have longed for a portion of the wealth of Oregon, and knowing the laws that are prevalent in the state against their nefarious business have offered exorbitant prices for advertisements in state papers. These have been rejected in the main, until quite recently the Statesman has been accepting some of their advertisements, and I see yesterday (Sunday) morning it boldly publishes nearly a half column of their advertisement. The manager of that journal should be at their own business.

Articles of Incorporation.

Articles of incorporation were filed with the secretary of state to-day as follows: The West Shore land and investment company. The business is to buy and sell city and country property; the capital stock is \$10,000, and principal office in Portland, with Lafayette Hughes, Geo. Vanderbach, Geo. H. Brown and Willis Brown as incorporators. The Gold Mountain and Dry Gulch consolidated gold and silver mining company. The capital stock is \$2,000,000, divided into 40,000 shares of the value of \$50 each.

A Big Mining Enterprise.

Articles of incorporation of another big Santiam mining enterprise were to-day filed. The name of the company is the Gold Mountain and Dry Gulch consolidated gold and silver mining company, and its principal office will be Salem and the active operations will be carried on up on the Santiam. The incorporators are known here. Their business will be the mining of gold, silver and mineral. They incorporate for \$2,000,000.
