One Thousand Dollars Per Acre.

"I was looking through T. E. Patton's blackberry vineyard this week," said W. M. Stover, "and what I saw there and learned from Mr. Patton himself would astonish the small fruit culturist of any land. Mr. Patton raises a quantity of blackberries to the acre sufficient to produce 800 gallons of wine. This wine he sells readily at \$1.25 per gallon and could sell thousands of gallons more just as readily. A thousand dollars to the acre is a tremendous yield but he who doubts it can verify these figures by visiting Mr. Patton. I was also told by another farmer that he gathered 8000 pounds of blackberries from a one-acre vineyard this year and that he would realize an average of twelve cents a pound for them. These men are prominent farmers of this valley, where their word passes unquestioned. But there are hundreds of people refuse to believe these figures, truthful as they are."—Orring Oracle.

LATEST BY TELEGRAPH.

Mrs. Maybrick Must Hang.

LONDON, Aug. 21.—Home Secretary Matthews has decided not to interfere in the case of Mrs. Maybrick, sentenced to be hanged next Monday for murder by poisoning her husband. The decision was based on the conflict of medical testimony as to whether the poison found in the deceased's stomach was sufficient to produce death. After a prolonged consultation between eminent lawyers and Home Secretary Matthews a conclusion was arrived at that Mrs. Maybrick administered poison to her husband with intent to kill. No further appeal, either for her release from prison or for mitigation to life imprisonment will be entered on.

LONDON, August 22.—Mrs. Maybrick's sentence has been commuted to penal servitude for life.

Oregon Hop Crop.

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 22.—A prominent wholesale merchant, on being interviewed on the hop crop of Oregon and Washington for the season of 1889, says that owing to an extremely long dry spell the yield will be scarcely two-thirds of a crop, but the quality is good. The statement is subject to weather changes. Hop pickers will be plenty this season and most of the picking will be done by the whites, as very few Chinamen will be employed.

Dakota Stock Epidemic.

YANKTON, Dak., Aug. 22.—Yankton county stock raisers are excited over the outbreak of contagion among their herds. Over 500 head of cattle died within two days, also 150 hogs that fed on the carcasses of the cattle. The territorial veterinarian and a corps of twenty assistants are now here and on the way. The local force is entirely inadequate to check the epidemic.

News From Victoria.

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 22.—Much indignation is expressed here at the seizure of the sealers "Pathfinder" and "Minnie." The owners of the sealing schooner here are much depressed at the long continued delay in settling the question of jurisdiction over the Behring sea. The general feeling among sealers is that the owners of schooners will act in their own defense and resist seizure in the future.

Fire at North Powder.

NORTH POWDER, Aug. 20, 1889.—Fire caught this 12:30 in the barn of the Oregon lumber company and from there communicated to the lumber yard and is still burning. If the gristmill gets on fire the town will go. A strong wind is blowing from the south.

The Convention Adjourns.

OLYMPIA, Aug. 22.—The president announced the business of the convention finished and briefly but feelingly returned his earnest thanks and extended his best wishes to the members. He then declared the convention adjourned sine die, and as his gavel fell for the last time with its familiar rap the constitutional convention of the Territory of Washington passed into history.

Rebuilding at Spokane.

SPOKANE, FALLS, W. T., Aug. 22.—Goetz & Baer, owners of the Frankfort block, which met the fate of all other fine brick blocks in the late fire, have leased the fifty feet in width across the deep gulch in the rear of their present quarters on Riverside avenue for ten years, and are building a high trestle, on which will extend a temporary building through the entire block, pending the restoration of the Frankfort.

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.

The senate committee on irrigation are now in the west.

The Eiffel tower was struck by lightning, but no damage was done.

A famine was threatened in Montenegro, owing to the failure of the crops.

The police of Chicago are still pursuing new clues and theories in regard to the Cronin murder case.

Conflicting rumors still come from Hayti. The latest is that notwithstanding recent successes Legation is preparing to leave the country.

It is stated that not more than people from the Pacific coast have gone to Milwaukee to attend the National G. A. R. encampment.

A Virulent Epidemic.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Aug. 22.—An epidemic of flux has prevailed in this city and county during the past thirty days. The disease is virulent, and has proven fatal in about fifty cases. The deaths are most prevalent among young children.

An Exercise in Pronunciation.

The following rather curious piece of composition was once placed upon a blackboard at a teachers' institute, and a prize offered to any person who could read and pronounce every word correctly. The prize was not carried off, however, as twelve was the lowest number of mistakes in the pronunciation made: "A sacrilegious son of Bellal, who suffered from bronchitis, having exhausted his finances, in order to make good the deficit, resolved to ally himself to a comely, lenient, and docile young lady of the Maylay or Caucasian race. He accordingly purchased a callopo and coral necklace of a chameleon hue, and securing a suite of rooms at a principal hotel he engaged the head waiter as a coadjutor. He then dispatched a letter of the most unexceptional calligraphy extant, inviting the young lady to a matinee. She revolted at the idea, refused to consider herself sacrificable to his desires, and sent a polite note of refusal; on receiving which he procured a carbine and bowie-knife, said that he would not now forge letters hymeneal with the queen, went to an isolated spot, severed his jugular vein and discharged the contents of the carbine into his abdomen. The debris was removed by the coroner."

A Shutter and a Moral.

The shutter the crowd eagerly inspected, for it was a relic of the Seattle fire. In its prime, adorned with gaudy paint, it had protected a window in Frye's opera house, Seattle. When that city was recently a mass of flames the same shutter battled nobly to protect its charge, as the record seared on its surface shows. Built of wood and encased in tin, it held on when an iron shutter would have curled up with the heat and deserted its post. The underwriters claim that had this shutter been carefully built according to the instructions issued by the inspection bureau, it would have been "better than new" after the fire. This historic window covering now leans against the pillar, a disreputable looking affair, like the awful example of a temperance lecturer, and the lesson it teaches is one that should be kept well in mind: It is, don't let your building stand next to one on fire, but if you do so, see that the windows and doors are well protected by shutters of wood sheathed in tin. They are the safest.

Ancient History.

Judas died in the horrors of a loathsome suicide; Caiaphas was deposed the year following; Herod died in infancy and exile. Stripped of his procuratorship very shortly afterwards on the very charges he had tried by a wicked concession to avoid Pilate, wearied out by misfortunes, died in suicide and banishment, leaving behind him an execrated name. The house of Annas was destroyed a generation later by an infuriated mob, and his son was dragged through the streets and scourged and beaten to his place of murder. Some of those who shared in and witnessed the scenes of that day, and thousands of their children, also shared in and witnessed the horrors of that siege of Jerusalem which stands unparalleled in history for its unutterable fearfulness.
