The Unfortunate.

Jasper Ellis, who had the misfortune to break his foot at Falls City a few weeks ago, is improving slowly. James Tucker, the old gentleman who was struck by the California express a short time ago, is able to go to work again.

A \$25,000 Purchase.

Surveyor Byars is now engaged in making the survey of the Parish lands recently purchased by H. V. Matthews, Wm. H. Phelps, W. F. Seaver and I. H. Barnes. This land included in the purchase is plat "B" in Parish's addition to Salem and the acreage lying east and north of the same, including the grove. In all there is something over sixty acres in this tract, the purchase price of which is \$400 per acre. Three of the purchasers are already residents of Salem and the fourth, Mr. Barnes, is a late arrival from Hastings Nebraska. This is most desirable property and will at once be opened up. It will all be platted into blocks and lots and the streets will be opened up through to the county road on the north. The Salem and Silverton motor line will pass directly through it, giving close connection with the business center.

The U. S. Marshalship.

Senator Mitchell's visit to Salem has revived the talk of who will be appointed United States Marshal of Oregon. Marion county comes to the front with two candidates, Messrs. John W. Minto and A. N. Gilbert, but who will be the lucky man—or if one of these—is not yet known. President Harrison takes no action in the matter of appointments of this kind until the state delegation unite and express their desires. There are five principal offices to be filled by appointment in Oregon, and Marion county being second in population and importance as well as returning good republican majorities, will be given favorable recognition.

To Be Fashionable.

Salem is heartily displeased with the manner in which L. Samuels illustrated the Capital city in his West Shore for August. Heretofore his illustrations of Salem have been satisfactory, the work having been executed in an artistic manner, but the last effort is a lamentable failure, and Salem is ready to join with the many other Oregon cities in one great kick. Of this August number the Board of Trade take \$10,000, and the Oregon land company the same number, but they are ashamed of them.

Salem Decorative Union.

The executive committee of this society met at the residence of ex-Governor Moody last evening. Considerable business was transacted. Through the efforts of this society a plan has been secured for laying out and improving Wilson avenue in connection with the state house block and the half-block east of the capitol, lately purchased by the state. As soon as the rains soften the ground, work will be commenced in laying water pipes for sprinkling and grading and filling in the west end of the avenue. A great deal of work has been done by this society, though mostly of a preliminary character, but the good results of their labors will soon begin to appear. Success to the Decorative Union.

The Deaf Mute School.

The regular session of the school for deaf-mutes, for 1889-90, will open on Monday, September 23, 1889. The opening is deferred to a date a few days later than usual, on account of extensive changes and improvements in buildings, that it has been impossible to complete sooner.

Independence Bug-Juice.

At Independence last evening, four drunken men were arrested. The marshal had two of them when the other two came up with clubs and endeavored to make him release them. The marshal knocked one of them down and with help lodged all four in jail.

They Are Now at Salem.

The Corvallis Times gives this little history of a delightful trio whose frail barque is now moored at Salem: "One day last week there arrived in our city a Spaniard by the name of Zoroni, with a woman he called his wife. Zoroni is a juggler and in the evening appeared on our streets. The next day Zoroni was drunk as a fiddler. His wife had made herself very attractive to a few, and while the juggler was being walked around by one or two of his new-made friends, to sober him off, others were looking after the welfare of his better half. They were a suspicious-looking pair. It was finally discovered that several things had been stolen from the hotel, including a five-dollar gold piece. The finger of suspicion pointed so strongly toward the woman that an officer was notified, and, although her guilt was neither proven nor admitted, they very willingly paid back the money to have the matter dropped. The officer notified them to leave town immediately. They procured a small boat, and accompanied by a young man who has made Corvallis his home for some months, pushed out into the Willamette and floated off for pastures new. It will be well for towns down the creek to keep an eye on them."

The company agrees to hire only white labor to build the bridge.

The Great Preacher.

Rev. DeWitt Talmage of Brooklyn, New York, arrived in Salem this morning, from the north. Many were apparently anxious to see the preacher whose name has been so much in the newspapers for the past ten years, and consequently there were many to greet his arrival. Time works changes with all the world and even the preacher has changed. The remarkably witty contortionist of a few years ago, who kept his audience or congregation excited by making startling personal and sensational efforts is beginning to look rather stout and aged, and it would seem much of the old time fire and gymnastic activity have given way to acts more mildly startling. But the gentleman is here and will entertain his hearers with "Big Blunders." The great divine this afternoon is in his room closely and is resting himself in sleep.

Salem's Government Buildings.

Senator Mitchell talks hopefully of the prospects of receiving an appropriation of \$100,000 for a government postoffice building in Salem. One of the first measures he will introduce at the next session will be a bill for such an appropriation and he feels as if they would be able to get it through. Representative Herman will pursue a like course in the House, and by a united effort it is thought the long-needed and wished-for aid may be gained. No city in the United States can need such a building more than Salem, the present quarter being wholly inadequate to the demands of the growing city.

A New Firm.

A new real estate firm is that of Manning & Diven, Dr. A. H. Diven having effected a partnership with Isaac A. Manning. Dr. Diven is already well known to Salem people, having come to this city a few months ago from Oil City, Pa.

Seats for Talmage.

There will be between three and four hundred seats for sale at the door for the Dr. Talmage lecture this evening. By some means the report has gained circulation that there will be no seats, but as usual the report is in error. Dr. Talmage can be heard anywhere in the house as no other man could, and although the sale of seats is large, still there will be room for many more.

ANOTHER STREET RAILWAY LINE.

From Commercial Street to the Penitentiary and Asylum.
The organization of a second street railway line in Salem is beginning to assume definite shape and the culmination of the plans which have for several days been discussed are about to result in the incorporation of and organization of a street railway company, the object of which will be to build, equip and operate a line of street railway from Commercial street to the state insane asylum and penitentiary.

The plans of the founders of this enterprise are not yet fully developed or determined upon, but a JOURNAL reporter learns that the intention is to build the line out either Chemekete, Marion or Center street, connecting with Asylum avenue for the asylum and penitentiary or State street for the penitentiary and asylum. Many of the arguments favor Chemekete street and State, but there are objections to them as well as to all the others.

Definite plans, it is expected, will be decided upon in a few days, when articles of incorporation will be prepared and the company will be organized. They will then ask for a franchise and construct as soon as the work can be done, a substantial line of street railway over the streets upon which they determine.

The line as projected will be two miles in length and will penetrate a thickly settled and rapidly improving section of the city. The cost of the line as proposed will be \$12,000 or \$15,000 and the company will incorporate for \$40,000, with a view to the extension of the line as found to be desirable.

The men at the head of this most important enterprise are reliable business men and their names speak for the success of their scheme. Such a line is bound to pay, as it will accommodate hundreds of people who are not now favored by the street railway line.

This line may assist the motor line to enter the city for passenger traffic. It might be that where the new street railway motor lines cross in East Salem that an exchange of passengers could be effected. In this way the motor line could land its passengers in the business center and continue along Trade street itself, landing its freight at the junction of Commercial and Trade. But this is mere speculation on the part of the scribe.

The JOURNAL will be awake to the interests of its readers and will note the progress of this scheme from day to day and report that progress.

Articles of Incorporation.

Articles of incorporations were filed with the secretary of state to-day as follows: The Fossil water company of Fossil, Gilliam county, T. V. Hoover, A. B. Lamb, W. W. Steiwer, Pat. Patterson and Sidney G. Hanson incorporators. Their business is to supply the town of Fossil with fresh and pure water by constructing and conveying from creeks, artificial wells and natural springs. The capital stock is \$3000, divided into shares of the value of \$25 each.

Salem and Silverton Motor.

Gen. W. H. Odell returned to Salem this afternoon, having spent the week among the different property owners along the route of the Salem and Silverton motor line. He speaks encouragingly of the outlook and has bright hopes that work may begin on the construction of the line soon. The manner of gaining entrance into Salem is a troublesome question which has not yet been settled to the satisfaction of all.

Another Purchase.

H. V. Matthews has purchased of Messrs. Albert and Scriber the Bonham place, of ten acres, lying north of the Parrish addition and immediately west of the John Baker place. The consideration was \$4500. Mr. Matthews will have this tract laid off at once, when it will be placed on the market.

Two Big Boys.

Isaac Durbin to-day sold his farm near Brooks, 1 6, r 3 w, Willamette meridian, to A. G. Perkins, the consideration being \$11,500.

Williams & England have also sold the Wesley Howell farm of 225 acres 17 s r 2 w Willamette meridian, to Isaac Durbin, the consideration being \$13,000.

Mrs. Scott Siddons, arrangements are being made for the appearance of Mrs. Scott Siddons in Salem early in October, at which time she will give one of her evening readings of Shakespearean readings.
